



Image of the day - St Nicholas Carrickfergus

St Nicholas' Church is a Church of Ireland church and a popular visitor attraction in Carrickfergus, County Antrim. It was built in 1182 AD by John de Courcy, an Anglo-Norman knight, and is one of the oldest churches in Ireland. The church has been rebuilt and renovated several times over the centuries, but it retains many of its original features, including a Romanesque doorway and a chancel arch.

The church is dedicated to Saint Nicholas, the patron saint of sailors and children. The interior of the church is simple and elegant, with whitewashed walls and a stone floor. There are a number of interesting monuments in the church, including a tomb effigy of Sir Arthur Chichester, a Lord Deputy of Ireland in the early 17th century.

St Nicholas' Church is a beautiful and historic building that is well worth a visit. It is a place of worship for the local community, and it also offers guided tours for visitors.






Teenagers from Belfast go to MOVE in Kildare

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God's Welcoming Church project impacts on Carlow's Entente Florale 2024

St Mary's was part of Carlow's Entente Florale / European Flower Festival submission and was visited by the team of judges as well as local garden and civic dignitaries, on Friday morning.

Rev Paul & Carolyn met the team welcoming everyone and bringing them on a tour of the garden and historic building. Carolyn talked about the Sunday Club and how the children led the way in our God's Welcoming Church project. This project started in 2017 as the brainchild of Rev David White and built on an existing interest in the environment encouraged by Rev Olivia Williams. The project drew



heavily and cooperatively on the recommendations of the National Biodiversity Centre. Theproject grew in incremental steps, building, developing and winning awards from Carlow County Council and the Diocese of Cashel, Ferns and Ossory.

In 2019 two self guided, contemplative and experiential Prayer Walks were added, one for children and one for adults. In the last year Rev Paul Fitzpatrick and Rev Ger James have facilitated and encouraged the child and adult gardeners and have helped themselves too! The project allows us to explore the fifth of the Anglican Marks of Mission, "to strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth". The project also meets a number of the European Sustainable Development Goals.

The judges and visitors enjoyed visiting the church. As they walked through the gates, passing the Mo Mow section of the graveyard, the willow structure and the sacred space, campanologists William Griffin and Rowan Stanley played "Ode to Joy" the European Anthem. Then Rowan and William's young grandson Craig Griffin gave a



demonstration of how to play the carillon or chimes. Organist Sena Harenburg then treated the visitors to beautiful music while Carolyn and Rev Paul explained how the Select Vestry had purchased the neighbouring house in 2009 to create an onsite parish centre. The footpath from the church to the house is now a riot of colour and bordered either side by a very impressive floral display.

In the Community House there was a photographic display showing the growth of the church garden from dense tree planting in the 1950s, to broad grassed areas in 2011 to the diverse planted gorgeous garden we have now, a place of quiet, reflection and calm.

Catholic Church split on women deacons, Vatican document shows

The global Catholic Church is split on whether to allow women to serve as deacons, a Vatican document showed on Tuesday, just weeks after Pope Francis ruled out any opening on the issue.

Giving women a greater role in the male-dominated Church is one of the issues up for the debate at a summit of bishops known as the synod.

A first, inconclusive session was held last year. On Tuesday, the Vatican released a working document due to inform discussions at a second and final session in October.

"While some local Churches call for women to be admitted to the diaconal ministry, others reiterate their opposition," it said.

Noting that women deacons will not be on the synod's agenda, it said "theological reflection (on the issue) should continue, on an appropriate timescale and in the appropriate ways".

Deacons, like priests, are ordained ministers, and as in the priesthood, must be men in today's Church. Women deacons existed in early Christianity, but it is unclear what role they had.

Current-day deacons may not celebrate Mass, but they may preach, teach in the name of the Church, baptise and conduct wedding, wake and funeral services and even run a parish.

However, the Vatican document stressed the need to "give fuller recognition" to women in the Church, saying that "by virtue of Baptism, they enjoy full equality".

Known as "Instrumentum laboris", the document was presented after consultations with national bishops' conferences and Catholic institutions and associations from around the world.

Turning to another hot-button issue, the text did not include any specific references to LGBT people, but called for more inclusivity.

"A need emerges in all continents concerning people who, for different reasons, are or feel excluded or on the margins of the ecclesial community or who struggle to find full recognition of their dignity and gifts within it," it said.

In an interview with U.S. broadcaster CBS' "60 Minutes" programme recorded in April and aired in May, Francis responded with a flat "no" when asked if he was open to women deacons.

But he added that women were often playing deacon-like roles, without formally having that title. "Women are of great service as women, not as ministers," he said.

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
