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Festival of Cloaks impresses Derry Mayor

Lilian Seenoi-Barr the Mayor of Derry City and Strabane District Council visited St Columb's Cathedral this week and was more than impressed by the current Festival of Cloaks.

The Festival of Cloaks at St Columb's is an incredible exhibition. It commemorates the patroness saint of Ireland, St Brigid of Kildare, who died 1,500 years ago this year.

The 'Festival of Cloaks' features around 40 ceremonial garments, with the four cloaks of St Brigid – representing the four provinces of Ireland – as the centrepiece. These were made by artists Lorna McCormack and Michelle Hickey Legge and are beautiful works of art.

There are a wide variety of cloaks on display including ecclesiastical garments such as the Armagh Cope of the Church of Ireland in Armagh and Mrs Cecil Frances Alexander's cape.

The Mayor recently made history by becoming Northern Ireland's first black mayor.

Mayor Seenoi-Barr said "I really enjoyed my visit and would recommend you go along to check it out before it finishes at St Columb's Cathedral on 31 August".

Rededication service for Derry officer who died in WW1

A rededication service was held on 11 July 2024 at the grave of Captain (Capt) Valentine Knox Gilliland in the Commonwealth War Graves Commission's Cemetery on the outskirts of Ypres.



The service was attended by members of the extended Gilliland family who had come to pay their respects.

Capt Gilliland arrived on the Western Front on 18 January 1915 where he joined 2nd Battalion The Royal Irish Rifles in Belgium. On 21 April 1915, Capt Gilliland was wounded when a periscope he was looking through was hit by a sniper's bullet. Fragments of the glass smashed into his face cutting his nose and chin. He recovered and returned to duty. He was later killed in action on 22 March 1918.

Unfortunately Capt Gilliland's grave was lost during the war. But his remains were later recovered and buried as those of an unknown captain of The Royal Irish Rifles in the Divisional Collecting Post Cemetery and Extension. Because he was listed as missing, he was commemorated on the Menin Gate Memorial.

The discovery of Capt Gilliland's grave came about after a researcher submitted evidence to CWGC to suggest that his

final resting place had been identified. After further research by CWGC, the National Army Museum and the MOD's Joint Casualty and Compassionate Centre (JCCC), also known as the 'MOD War Detectives' their findings were confirmed.

The service was attended by serving soldiers of The Royal Irish Regiment

Valentine Knox Gilliland was born on 15 February 1889 in Londonderry. He was the youngest of three sons born to

George Knox Gilliland D.L. and his wife Frances Jane of the Brook Hall Estate.

Valentine was educated at Lockers Park Prep School in Hemel Hempstead and Foyle College in Londonderry before attending Trinity College Cambridge in 1907, where he studied Mechanism and Applied Science. He was a keen sportsman and is said to have owned one of the first sports cars in Donegal. Upon his graduation in 1910, Valentine was apprenticed to a London grain merchant. In the spring of 1912, he travelled across Canada to Vancouver.

Whilst at Cambridge Valentine was a member of the Officers' Training Corps and he received a commission into the Reserve of Officers in 1912. He joined the Ulster Volunteer Force and commanded a company within 5th Donegal Regiment. On 10 January 1915, Valentine was posted to the 3rd (Reserve) Battalion The Royal Irish Rifles, in Dublin. He was promoted to the rank of Captain.

A week before the death of Capt Gilliland, news reached the family of the death of his cousin, Lieutenant William Millar M Gilliland of 2nd Battalion The Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, who was killed in action in the Dardanelles on 30 April 1915. On the day that Capt Gilliland's mother, Frances, learned the news of her son's death, she had received a letter from him informing her that the battalion was going into action.

Meet the New Curate of St Bartholomew's

'Excited and humbled to be returning as a newly ordained priest'

The Revd Dr Mathew McCauley was ordained to the Priesthood in Christ Church Cathedral, Dublin, on Sunday 23 June 2024 by Archbishop Michael Jackson. Here, he writes about his experience as an Intern Deacon in St Matthew's Irishtown and his hopes for his Curacy in St Bartholomew's, Clyde Road.

"And so, we know and rely on the love God has for all of us. God is love. Whoever lives in love, lives in God, and God in them." 1 John (4:16)

The love and holiness of God is at the heart of my calling to the priesthood, a call which began as a teenager. Although I went on to pursue a career in psychology, academia, and military healthcare, my faith never left me. I eventually responded to God's calling, completing five years of formation and training, and I was ordained to the holy priesthood last month. Through this humbling honour, I am reminded of the words from Isaiah (6:8), 'Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I; send me."

Prior to my ordination, I was blessed to have served my diaconate internship at St Matthew's Church, Irishtown. I am extremely grateful for the incredible support and prayers of the rector, the Revd Canon Leonard Ruddock and the congregation. The experience allowed me to engage with the diverse and dynamic life of a vibrant parish. Over the past year, I grew in my understanding and abilities concerning liturgical worship, whilst assisting and leading a range of services. This included preparing and delivering homilies, along with planning and participating in formal and informal worship.

In addition, I contributed as a cleric to various ecumenical and community events. Canon Ruddock also supported my involvement in baptisms, funerals, confirmation classes, parish school events, pastoral visits to residential nursing facilities, home Eucharist services, and select vestry meetings. It was furthermore a great honour to represent the parish as a homilist at Christ Church Cathedral, Dublin. St Matthew's will always hold a special place in my heart, and I will keep the rector and congregation in my prayers.

It is now an immense pleasure to join the Revd Canon Andrew McCroskery as a member of the ministerial team at St Bartholomew's Church, Ballsbridge. I was privileged to have completed one of my ordinand placements at this parish and I have since undertaken my MTh dissertation research on the liturgical tradition associated with St Bartholomew's. I am excited and humbled to be returning as a newly ordained priest and my curacy will be a time of further formation. I look forward to growing in my sacramental ministry as a servant leader, whilst accompanying the congregation in their faith journey, with and in Christ.

Thus, with the grace of God and your prayers, I seek to serve the congregation at St Bartholomew's and advance the Kingdom of God in love and faith, mindful of the words of the late Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Revd Michael Ramsey: 'Today the ordained priest is called to reflect the priesthood of Christ and to serve the priesthood of all the people of God, and to be one of the means of grace whereby God enables the Church to be the Church.

Everyday Faith is now available to download for iOS and Android. If you already have the Watch & Pray app installed, you will automatically get the update.


Everyday Faith is the new daily devotional app from the Church of England designed to inspire, equip and encourage you in your faith every day of the week, not just on Sundays.
