
Newcastle organ

Clogher parishioner appointed to House of Lords

A prominent member of Magheracross Parish Church, Ballinamallard, in Clogher Diocese, Tom Elliott MLA, has been made a life peer in the House of Lords.



Mr Elliott, from Tullyrain, Ballinamallard, was nominated by the Ulster Unionist Party of which he is a former leader and is a UUP member of the Northern Ireland Assembly representing Fermanagh and South Tyrone.

He was one of 19 new peers announced by the government in the dissolution honours list just before the General Election polls closed on Thursday night.

New life members of the House of Lords are appointed by the King on the advice of the Prime Minister.

Mr Elliott, a farmer and former member of the Ulster Defence Regiment, served as MP for Fermanagh and South

Tyrone between 2015-2017 and was previously UUP party leader from 2010-2012.

Mr Elliott said he felt humbled and privileged to be appointed to the House of Lords and says it is recognition to the people of his constituency.

The Rector of Magheracross Parish Church, Revd Lorraine Capper, said she was delighted that Mr. Elliott was rewarded for his dedication and huge commitment to the people of Fermanagh and South Tyrone.

She described him as a humble man with a great willingness to help others.

In addition to being a member of the Northern Ireland Assembly, he is currently the UUP's spokesman for agriculture and the environment and is Chairman of the Agriculture, Environment and Rural Affairs Committee at Stormont.

In his spare time, Mr. Elliott is Chairman of Ballinamallard Football Club.

Archbishops welcome new Prime Minister

Archbishop Welby said in a statement on Friday morning: "My warmest congratulations to our new Prime Minister, Sir Keir Starmer, and my prayers for you and your family as you take on this role of great

responsibility for our country. I thank Rishi Sunak and the outgoing Government for their service.

"I also give thanks today for our democracy, and for the peaceful and orderly transition of power it gives us. I pray for our new Government entering office; for its members to have humility, wisdom, and integrity as they begin their new roles."

Archbishop Cottrell wrote on social media: "Warm congratulations to our new Prime Minister, Sir Keir Starmer. Offering prayers as you take on this role, and for the well being of the nation you will lead."

Cardinal Vincent Nichols commented "On behalf of the Catholic community of England and Wales, I congratulate Keir_Starmer on his victory in yesterday's general election. I assure him of my good wishes as he takes up his new responsibilities in forming and leading a government._

"The Catholic Church has a long record of partnership with the Government, not least in education where we run over 2000 schools in conjunction with the state. We look forward to this continuing & to working constructively in this & other areas with him, his ministers & officials.

"His previous comments about wanting a government which works with churches and faith communities have been most welcome, and I want him to know that we stand ready to play our part.

"I know that the road ahead is, perhaps, not the easiest one but I wish Sir Keir well as he embarks upon it. I will keep him and his family in my prayers".

Church of England York General Synod Presidential address

The Archbishop of York, Stephan Cotterill delivered the presidential address to the meeting of the General Synod in York.

He said, "We are invited to love one another. To find ways forward that honour everyone. Like those who have gone before us we must not look for any reward other than that knowing we have done our best to be faithful."

Men in churches are under-represented Synod told

The Church of England has admitted men are "underrepresented" in congregations as attendance at Sunday services remains below pre-pandemic levels.

In a question submitted to the General Synod, the Church's legislative body, about what it is doing to encourage evangelism among men, a Church officer said men are under-represented in many parishes.



Revd Will Pearson-Gee of Buckingham Parish Church asked the Synod: "What resources has the Church developed to help people think about and practise evangelism amongst men?"

A representative of the Archbishops' Council responded: "Within the Church of England as we seek to be a church which represents the communities we serve in age and diversity; we recognise that in many churches men are under-represented in the congregation.

"The council encourages dioceses to consider this as they develop their mission plans for future funding."

The spokesman added that the Church and surrounding organisations have developed resources to "help people think about and practice evangelism amongst men". The Church last estimated its male and female membership in 2014, when the ratio of women to men was thought to be about 59:41.

That is despite the gender balance among clergy weighing heavily in favour of men, with 2018 figures showing just 30 per cent of the estimated 20,000 active clergy in the Church of England are female.

The number of male clergy is also in decline. Figures show that while the number of female clergy rose steadily from 5,310 in 2013 to a record high of 5,690 in 2016, the total for men declined by about 860 in this time.

It comes as the Bishop of Oxford accused Christians threatening to breakaway from the Church over an vote on blessings for same-sex couples of "catastrophising" and causing "hurt" to LGBTQ Christians and their familes in a letter seen by The Telegraph.

Bishops have proposed that gay and lesbian couples could receive blessings from Anglican priests in standalone church services as part of a pilot, before a formal vote is held on whether the change should become permanent.

However, more than 25 church leaders have written to leading bishops warning that such a change could amount to "unlawfulness" and have threatened to create a separate autonomous grouping within the Church. Courtesy Camera Henderson, The Daily Telegraph

These charming pieces were written by J.S. Bach for his son Wilhelm Friedemann. On the autograph copy, dated 1723, Bach titled the collection: "Forthright instruction, wherewith lovers of the clavier, especially those desirous of learning, are shown in a clear way not only to learn to play two voices clearly, but also after further progress to deal correctly and well with three obbligato parts...". The works are, in essence, Bach's teaching manuals which have given pleasure for 300 years, and are still very much in use today.

Eco Congregation Ireland has launched a new small grant scheme for churches and congregations.

Thanks to generous sponsorship from church supplies companies RPD Ltd and Logos Publications, churches across Ireland can apply for a grant to support biodiversity or energy conservation projects. The grants will be between €100/£90 and €500/£450, and the ECI committee will be looking for small scale practical projects which are either already running or will begin before the end of 2024. The church or congregation must have already registered with ECI (a very simple process) and begun their Eco Congregation journey. The closing date for applications is 31st July.
