Cullybackey, Rieu in Maastricht and Newcastle


Cullybackey Pipe Band recently played at 12 concerts for André Rieu in Maastricht.

The Bishop of Tuam, Limerick and Killaloe, the Rt Revd Michael Burrows, has announced the appointment of the Revd Vicki Lynch as Priest

in Charge of the Drumcliffe with Kilnasoolagh Group of Parishes.

Vicki was born and brought up in Cumbria in the north west of England and moved to London to attend university. While living in Kent, she met her husband, Steve and they moved to the west coast of County Clare with their three children in 1995.

Over the years Vicki has worked in a variety of social care and community development roles, including managing Clare Haven Refuge and designing and delivering youth personal development programmes. Vicki trained in the Church of Ireland Theological College and was ordained in St Columba's church, Ennis in 2009. From 2007 she was Church News Ireland

the Youth and Community Development Officer for the Diocese of Limerick and Killaloe and assisted in the parish of Drumcliffe Union with Kilnasoolagh.

In 2012 she was appointed minister of Christ Church United Methodist and Presbyterian Church, Limerick and completed an MA in Consultancy and Leadership for Mission and Ministry.

In 2019 Vicki became priest in charge of Fiddown Union in the Diocese of Cashel, Ferns and Ossory, combining parish ministry and PhD research in practical theology and community development.

Commenting on her appointment Vicki said, 'I am delighted to be appointed priest in charge of Drumcliffe Union with Kilnasoolagh and look forward to working together with the parish. It feels like coming home.'

Following this appointment Bishop Michael Burrows welcomed Vicki saying, 'After some years of fruitful parochial ministry in the diocese of Lismore, we look forward to welcoming Vicki 'home' to Killaloe and to Co Clare, and we know how much we will all benefit from her many gifts, her imaginative approach and her pastoral diligence. Victims' group SEFF celebrates 25 years with service in St Macartin's Cathedral in Enniskillen

A service was held in St Macartin's Cathedral in Enniskillen on Sunday to reflect on the years of work the South East Fermanagh Foundation (SEFF) has done in supporting victims and survivors of violence in Northern Ireland.

The event is not being held on August 13, as had been intended, as the group did not want to distract from a service being held to mark the 25th anniversary of the

Omagh bomb, according to the group's director, Kenny Donaldson.

He also accused the UK and Ireland of overseeing "a process of appeasement of terrorism for 25 years plus" which has "brought us to where we are today".

Mr Donaldson said that SEFF, formed on August 15 1998, had grown from one full-time staff member in 2003 to 33 staff more than two decades later.

"Many of the innocent victim/survivor-focused support groups were established in the same year as Omagh, which was also the year of The Belfast Agreement, signed on Good Friday," he said.



"Omagh was said to mark a watershed moment when society moreover understood the absolute need for violence not to grip our society as it had in the past.

"Twenty-nine innocent people from across the community and unborn twins had their lives prematurely ended, never able to experience the relative peace that came to Northern Ireland and that is an issue that grieves us, but particularly their families – and, of course, sadly others continued to be murdered post the events of Omagh with terrorism seeking to enforce its will upon the community of this place and beyond."

He cautioned against dividing society into Protestant and Catholic camps and instead look at those who seek to use or justify violence and those who oppose it.

"Northern Ireland is a tale of two sets of experiences. Some have enjoyed a significant 'peace dividend' and life is undoubtedly better across many measures and criteria. "In this Northern Ireland people are increasingly at ease with themselves and each either, integration is becoming commonplace and they feel they are in a post-'conflict' time.

"However, for others, Northern Ireland has not changed substantively. For those innocents who been directly impacted by the violence there has been reduction in the cycle of injustice that they have experienced."

He added: "Many don't want to talk about this second Northern Ireland which has been allowed to persist and for those of us who dare, the unscrupulous and naive seek to portray us as anti-peace, problem children and bitter."

He reiterated his group's opposition to the UK government's Legacy and Reconciliation Bill, stating that it is the "opposite" of victim centred.

It would also prevent future civil cases and inquests. The controversial legislation would give immunity from prosecution for Troubles-related offences to people who cooperated with the ICRIR (Independent Commission for Reconciliation and Information Recovery).

The bill is opposed by all major Stormont parties, the Irish government and victims' campaign groups, prompting several protests against its passage through Westminster.

Mr Donaldson said: "The legislation as promoted could well disempower the individual and many have indicated that it Church News Ireland Page 11

would turn back time in redefining their status as 'victim' once more, for to be a survivor and to thrive there must be the existence of hope and an assuredness that right will prevail.

"Our message is clear as we mark 25 years of service to innocent victims and survivors of terrorism and other Troubles-related violence, but also the broader community – there is much more to be done and we need people prepared to journey with us."



Closing youth festival in Portugal, Pope shares 'old man's' dream of peace

Pope Francis closed an international festival of Catholic Youth on Sunday with a huge outdoor Mass and his own "I have a dream" speech, saying it was for world peace, especially for Ukraine.

About 1.5 million people attended his closing Mass at a riverside park in the Portuguese capital, the Vatican said, quoting local authorities. Many of the faithful slept outdoors, having attending a vigil there on Saturday night, and they gathered in sweltering heat.

Speaking after the Mass, the 86-year-old Francis urged the young people to take the fraternal experiences of the sixday jamboree back home and apply them to their daily lives.

"Dear friends, allow me, this old man, to share with you young people a dream that I carry within me: it is the dream of peace, the dream of young

people praying for peace, living in peace and building a peaceful future," Francis said.

"As you return home, please continue to pray for peace. What is more, you are a sign of peace for the world, showing how different nationalities, languages and histories can unite instead of divide. You are the hope of a different world," he said.

He asked them to think of the young people who could not come to the event because of the world's many armed conflicts and wars, adding: "In thinking of this continent, I feel great sorrow for beloved Ukraine, which continues to suffer greatly".

Francis, who was returning to Rome on Sunday evening after an event to thank volunteers at the World Youth Day festival, met a delegation of 15 young people from Ukraine during his trip.

Sunday's Mass was concelebrated by 700 bishops and 10,000 priests, who distributed communion to the huge crowd.

The pope announced that the next World Youth Day would be held in Seoul, South Korea in 2027.

One of the recurring themes of the pope's visit was social media and its potentially negative effects on young people.

During the week, Francis urged them to beware the false happiness lurking in the virtual world and at another event, the young people themselves reflected on their anxieties, enslavement to the "tyranny" of social media and yearning to save the planet.

The trip took place in the shadow of a report six months ago by a Portuguese commission said at least 4,815 minors were sexually abused by clergy - mostly priests - over seven decades in the country.



The next World Youth Day will be Seoul, South Korea in 2027 and there will be a Jubilee for Youth in Rome during the forthcoming Jubilee Holy Year of 2025, with the overall theme of "Pilgrims of Hope".

It was just one in a series of reports around the world that have exposed clerical sex abuse and rattled the Catholic Church in recent years.

Francis said on Wednesday the Church needs a "humble and ongoing purification" to deal with the "anguished cries" of victims of clerical sexual abuse, and met privately with 13 victims.

Many of the young people at World Youth Day walked for over four hours to be with the Holy Father



Everyone without exclusion can enter church, Pope Francis says in Fatima

Thousands of Catholics congregated from before dawn on Saturday (August 5) at Portugal's Fatima shrine where Pope Francis prayed the rosary with sick youngsters, people with disabilities and inmates.

At the huge outdoor sanctuary, one of Europe's most famous, Pope Francis said, just like the Fatima sanctuary, the church has no door and is open to all without exclusion :

"The small chapel in which we meet. This is such a beautiful image of the church. Cosy, no doors. The church does not have doors so that everyone can enter. It is. And here we can also insist that everyone can enter because it is in the mother's house. And a mother always has an open heart for all her children. Everyone, everyone, everyone without exclusion."

Francis arrived in the Portuguese capital Lisbon on Wednesday (August 2) for World Youth Day, a huge gathering of the faithful every two to three years in a different city.

The visit ended with a papal Mass on Sunday (August 6).

BBC NI's £500k bill for high-profile dispute cases it 'could not win

Belfast Telegraph - TWO long-running workplace disputes have left the BBC facing a legal bill of almost £500,000 after the cases were settled.

Ex-Newsline anchor Donna Traynor had claimed she had been discriminated against, while freelance producer Lena Ferguson had sued over alleged bullying. So far, the BBC's legal costs for defending the cases, each of which ran for three years before being settled, stand at £464,115, not including VAT.

DUP MP Gregory Campbell queried why the BBC keep "paying significant sums of money fighting cases they know they have little prospect of winning".

"You have to ask why the BBC keep ending up paying significant sums of money fighting cases that they know they have little prospect of winning — in these cases, almost half a million pounds," he said.

The BBC has previously settled a number of equal pay cases, including one taken by presenter Samira Ahmed.



Organisers to clear South Korean Scout jamboree site early as typhoon looms

Site has been plagued by issues including heatwave that left hundreds ill last week

All participants at this year's World Scout Jamboree in South Korea are to leave the event's campsite before the scheduled end date of 12 August due to an incoming typhoon that is expected to make landfall over the Korean peninsula in the coming days.

In a statement on Monday afternoon, the World Organization of the Scout Movement (WOSM) said it had received confirmation from the South Korean government that, due to the expected impact of Typhoon Khanun, an early departure will be planned for all participants at the global youth event in the south-western county of Buan.

Choi Chang-haeng, the secretary general of the jamboree's organising committee, said organisers had secured more than 340 evacuation venues, including community centres and gyms, in regions near Buan. Local governments and cities across the country, including Incheon, North Gyeongsang Province, and Gyeongju, were convening emergency meetings to support the young scouts with accommodation and experience programmes. https://www.theguardian.com/world/2023/aug/07/world-scout-jamboree-to-end-early-as-typhoon-khanun-looms-in-wake-of-heatwave?utm

Sinn Fein MLA slammed for 'shameful' tweet honouring hunger striker who killed Ballymena mother

Belfast Telegraph - Sinn Fein's national chairperson has been criticised after sharing a social media tribute to a hunger striker who killed a young mother.

South Antrim MLA Declan Kearney took to Twitter to share photographs of himself at a memorial for Thomas McElwee on the 42nd anniversary of his death, writing he was "filled with hope and aspiration" and "ambitious for himself and community."

In 1976, McElwee was charged for manslaughter for his involvement in an incendiary bombing of a shop in Ballymena which killed a worker, mother of three, 23-year-old Yvonne Dunlop.

She shouted a warning to her nine-year-old son who escaped, but she could not get out and was burned to death.

The Bellaghy republican died on August 8, 1981 in prison at the age of 23, after 62 days on hunger strike.
