Cardinal Dolan to mark 150 years of Armagh's St. Patrick's Cathedral

Cardinal Timothy Dolan, Archbishop of New York, will celebrate Mass at St. Patrick's Cathedral in Armagh to commemorate 150 years of its dedication on 24 August 1873.

For the special occasion, the American prelate from St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City, will be the main Church News Ireland

celebrant and preacher at a Mass of Thanksgiving in the cathedral tomorrow, Sunday, 27 August, at 11 am.

All are welcome to attend the Mass that will be a celebration, "to give praise and thanks to God for the faith expressed within the cathedral," the Archdiocese announced.


The Archdiocese of Armagh, from Thursday to Sunday of this week, is celebrating the historical event.

The foundation stone of the cathedral was laid by Archbishop and Primate William Crolly on Saint Patrick's Day, 1840, but all building work was later suspended due to the famine, and funds raised were distributed for the relief of the poor.

In 1854, work on the cathedral resumed after Easter under the leadership of Primate Joseph Dixon. But it was Primate Daniel McGettigan who oversaw the completion of the building, and declared Sunday 24 August 1873, as the day of its opening and dedication. Massive crowds from all over Ireland, and beyond, attended the opening.

Pope Francis' message for Methodist and Waldensian Synod

Pope Francis has sent a message to the annual meeting of the Synod of the Union of Methodist and Waldensian Churches, which meets in Torre Pellice, Piedmont, from 20 to 25 August.

The Pope's greetings were conveyed in a telegram from the Cardinal Secretary of State to the local Catholic Bishop.

The message expresses the Holy Father's prayer that "the days of the meeting may be for each person an opportunity



for a profound experience of Christ, who welcomes, guides and leads us to the fullness of communion with him and with our brothers and sisters."

The Pope's message makes specific reference to progress made in the quest for Christian Unity, "raising a prayer of praise to God the Father for the gifts bestowed through ecumenical dialogue, as well as for the harmonious collaboration between the Churches".

The message continued by stating that Pope Francis wished to unite himself spiritually with the Synod gathering, "so that we may grow in mutual knowledge in order to witness together to the Gospel of Jesus".

The Union of Methodist and Waldensian Churches, founded in 1975, is comprised of the Methodist Evangelical Church in Italy and the Waldensian Evangelical Church, which will mark its 850th anniversary in 2024.

Gardai were monitoring dissidents within minutes of data breach: Harris

Belfast Telegraph - Intelligence officers in An Garda Siochana had "eyes and ears" in dissident republican circles within minutes of receiving the news about the PSNI's catastrophic data breach, the leader of the Republic's police force has said.

Details of more than 10,000 officers and police staff were mistakenly released to the public as part of a response to a Freedom of Information (FOI) request earlier this month.

The incident will be the subject of an independent review led by City of London Police Assistant Commissioner Peter O'Doherty.

Garda Commissioner Drew Harris, who formerly served as deputy chief constable on this side of the border, said the force had been in regular contact with the PSNI and UK security services since the breach.

Mr Harris added his officers had reacted to the news "within 10 or 15 minutes".

"We started putting eyes and ears \[out], just to see what was being said in dissident republican circles, frankly," he told the Irish Times.

"We have kept a watching brief and would exchange information constantly with the PSNI and the British security services, MI5.

"That is just ongoing, everyday cooperation."

Mr Harris said dissident republicans were the biggest domestic threat faced by An Garda Siochana, branding them a "small lunatic fringe", and insisted cooperation between his force and the PSNI was seamless when required.

GCSE results: Northern Ireland students still ahead of counterparts in the UK

News Letter - While GCSE results may be down this year, Northern Ireland students remain ahead of their UK counterparts, Graeme Cousins writes.

Of the 30,800 GCSE students in the Province who received their results yesterday, 86.8% received grade C or above – a standard pass.

The proportion of UK students getting at least a pass grade – C in NI and Wales and a grade 4 in England – fell from 73.2% last year to 68.2% this year.

Northern Ireland was well ahead of England, where 70% of students got a pass grade, and Wales on 64.9%.

In Scotland, the national results for the National 5 qualifications were published earlier in the month and showed that the pass rate was 78.8%.

In terms of top grades – A or above in Northern Ireland and Wales and 7 or above in England – Northern Ireland was in second place behind Scotland.

In Scotland 38.6% of students got top grades while in Northern Ireland the figure was 34.5%, England was on 22.4% and Wales on 21.7%.

Meanwhile this year's GCSE results suggest some subjects are flourishing while others could be heading for extinction.

The top 10 subjects with the most GCSE entries is unchanged this year – as it has been every year since 2018, with the science double award in first place, maths in second place and English third.

There is a new entry in the top 15, however. Computing has been climbing the chart in recent years and is now in 15th place, up from 16th last year and 20th place in 2016.

Design and Technology has been moving in the other direction for some time. It was the sixth most popular subject in 2012, but slipped out of the top 10 in 2018 and is now out of the top 15.

Scappaticci probe cleared for publication without change

Belfast Telegraph - A £37m investigation into over 20 murders carried out by the informer known as Stakeknife could be released as early as next month, by Alison Morris

The report has now gone through strict national security checks and has been cleared with no redactions.

Operation Kenova was headed by former English chief constable Jon Boutcher.

The focus was to ascertain whether there is evidence of the commission of criminal offences including murders, attempted murders or unlawful imprisonments attributed to the IRA.

Kenova also looked at whether there was evidence of criminal offences having been committed by members of the Army, the security services or other government personnel.

The report was commissioned by former Director of Public Prosecutions Barra McGrory and ex-PSNI Chief Constable George Hamilton following the quashing of convictions of a

number of republicans who claimed to have been entrapped by the high ranking informer.

Freddie Scappaticci has been linked to around 20 murders, but may have been indirectly involved in a number of others.
