

Timothy Dudley-Smith, hymn-writer and bishop, has died

The celebrated hymn-writer the Rt Revd Timothy Dudley-Smith died in the early hours of Monday morning in Cambridge, aged 97.

Bishop Dudley-Smith wrote the lyrics of about 400 hymns, among the most familiar of which are "Lord, for the years" (1967) and "Tell out, my soul" (1962). John Betjeman described the latter as "one of the few modern hymns that will truly last".

Timothy Dudley-Smith was born in Manchester on Boxing Day, 1926. He attended Tonbridge School, from where he went to study at Pembroke College, Cambridge. After training for ordination at Ridley Hall, Cambridge, he was




ordained deacon in 1950 and ordained priest in 1951. He went on to serve as Archdeacon of Norwich from 1973 to 1981, and as Bishop of Thetford from 1981 until his retirement in 1991. He was awarded an OBE in 2003 for services to hymnody.

During the 1950s, he edited Crusade magazine, started as an offshoot of the Billy Graham campaigns. He was a close friend of the Revd Dr John Stott, at whose memorial service he preached, and whose biography he wrote.

August 14, 2024

A House of Praise: Collected hymns 1961 to 2001 was published by Oxford University Press in 2004 (Books, 30 July 2004). The Church Times columnist Ronald Blythe wrote "Word from Wormingford" that year: "Timothy Dudley-Smith has given me A House of Praise, his collected hymns, and its magnitude has simply amazed me. Also its revelations, such as his having originally written 'Tell out, my soul' as a poem with no thought of its being sung."

In an article to mark Bishop Dudley-Smith's 90th birthday in 2016, Canon David Winter described him as "one of the outstanding hymn-writers of our generation" (Features, 23 December 2016). "Hymns written by 'TDS' are to be found in books of every denomination and tradition throughout the English-speaking world, and translated into a dozen other languages."



His last book, A Functional Art: Reflections of a hymn writer (OUP), was published in 2017 (Books, 21 July 2017).

Garrison Keillor on Episcopalians

"Many Episcopalians are bred from childhood to sing in fourpart harmony, a talent that comes from sitting on the lap of someone singing alto or tenor or bass and hearing the harmonic intervals by putting your little head against that person's rib cage. It's natural for Episcopalians to sing in harmony. We are too modest to be soloists, too worldly to sing in unison. When you're singing in the key of C and you slide into the A7th and D7th chords, all two hundred of you, it's an emotionally fulfilling moment. By our joining in harmony, we somehow promise that we will not forsake each other.

I do believe this, people: Episcopalians, who love to sing in four-part harmony, are the sort of people you could call up when you're in deep distress. If you are dying, they will

comfort you. If you are lonely, they'll talk to you. And if you are hungry, they'll give you tuna salad!

And they will raise him up...

Major revamp for 'Inst' looks set to get green light this week

A planning application for a major redevelopment of one of Belfast's most prestigious schools is due before councillors this week.

Royal Belfast Academical Institution (RBAI), widely known as Inst, is proposing to build a new wing featuring 15 classrooms and a 25-metre swimming pool.

Inst dates back to 1814. The school site is bordered by College Square East, College Square North, Durham Street and Athol Street.

Over the years it has seen several changes and expansions to cope with the growing number of pupils (now 1,100-plus) and to update to modern standards.

Now there are plans for a new south wing at the campus, as well as refurbishment and an extension to the main Soane Building, named after architect Sir John Soane, who designed it.

Historic building in south Belfast that houses prep school proposed for listed status

An historic building in south Belfast which is now a preparatory school is among the latest buildings in the city to be proposed for listed status.

The building which houses Inchmarlo Prep School dates back to 1881 and was constructed by a businessman with the proceeds of Belfast's burgeoning linen industry.

Buildings can be proposed for listing if they are of special architectural or historical interest. Once listed they have a degree of protection, such as from demolition or major alteration without prior approval.

There are currently around 9,000 listed buildings across NI. The Historic Environment Division (HED) of Stormont's Department for Communities frequently puts forward buildings to local councils for listing.
