Irish Army chaplain injured in stabbing at barracks

An army chaplain has been stabbed several times during an attack at Renmore Barracks in County Galway.

Fr Paul Murphy, who is in his 50s, was taken to University Hospital Galway and his injuries are described as serious but not life-threatening.

In a Facebook post, the chaplain with the Irish Defence Forces thanked the public for their prayers and said he was awaiting surgery. Gardaí said a teenage boy was restrained by soldiers and then arrested. They also said a terror motivation was one line of enquiry.

The special detective unit is involved in the investigation.

"At this time it is not believed this incident is part of a wider conspiracy," police added.

The Defence Forces said shots were fired by personnel during the incident.

"Soldiers on duty responded to the immediate threat with appropriate force to ensure the safety of personnel and secure the area," they said.

"The assailant was quickly detained and handed over to An Garda Síochána.

"The injured Defence Forces member was provided with immediate first aid at the scene before being transported to hospital for further treatment."

Members of the Garda's armed support unit were also sent to the incident on Thursday n

able to open a new chemotherapy center this week.


It was originally scheduled to launch last December.



Queen's University Open Learningprogramme

This autumn/winter, the Open Learning programme at Queen's University Belfast (QUB) features a rich and diverse range of courses.

It includes one that explores the extraordinary life of social activist Mary Ann McCracken and other remarkable Belfast women.

The programme also offers courses on creative photography, Belfast's ties to slavery and abolition, and Italian, from the language of fashion to living life compassionately, catering to a wide variety of interests.

Speaking about the programme of courses on offer, Professor Tess Maginess, director of Open Learning at QUB, said: "We are always keen to highlight topics of contemporary importance. For example, we have a course on the history of the Labour Party and another on the American presidency in the 20th century.

"John Hewitt wrote a poem called Once Alien Here and, bearing this in mind, we offer a set of courses to help support those who are now strangers to our shores, including teaching English to migrants, asylum seekers and refugees (in partnership with Belfast Centre for the Unemployed), the Intercultural School (in partnership with the Educational Authority) and understanding refugee and asylum issues."

There are courses programmed for daytime, evening and weekends and the style is informal and accessible.

"People don't need any prior qualifications and our learners appreciate the friendly atmosphere, as well as the opportunity for debate and questioning," added Professor Maginess.

The Open Learning programme offers a range of language courses, where participants can learn about other cultures, as well as increase their brain power and memory.



Anniversary of Father Willie Doyle, S.J.

Yesterday Friday, 16 August 2024, was the anniversary of Fr Doyle's death serving as a Chaplain in the first World War.

William Joseph Gabriel Doyle was born in Dalkey, near Dublin, on March 3, 1873. He was the youngest of seven children, among whom there were four religious vocations.

Willie (as he was called) was ordained as a Jesuit priest in 1907 and his fame as preacher, confessor and spiritual director spread far and wide.

In 1915, during World War I, Father Doyle was appointed as chaplain of the 16th Irish Division, serving with a number of units, but, having fulfilled his priestly duties in an outstanding fashion for almost two years, he was killed in the Battle of Ypres on August 16, 1917, having run "all day hither and thither over the battlefield like an angel of mercy." This good shepherd truly gave his life for his sheep. Fr Doyle's body was never recovered.

Books have been written about him, and a movie made, and the Diocese of Meath has opened the Cause for his Canonisation, but today, we simply pray for him and offer thanks for his service, and, if he be with God, we ask his prayers



for us and for all who serve on the battlefields of the world or in peacekeeping missions, and for military chaplains too.

Bishop's comment on nationalist bonfires being lit in Londonderry

Bishop calls for 'calm' ahead of nationalist bonfires being lit in Londonderry

Bishop of Derry Donal McKeown called for calm before bonfires were lit in some nationalist areas of the city last night, Staff Reporter writes.

The fires are associated with the August anniversary of the introduction of internment without trial during the Troubles, and also coincide with the Catholic Feast of the Assumption.

Before being lit, the bonfire at Meenan Square in the city on Thursday morning featured an Israel flag with the names of US president Joe Biden and Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu on it.

There was also a king's coronation flag, numerous Union Jacks and an image of a PSNI vehicle on the pyre.

The bonfire at Meenan Square has been the scene of incidents in recent years after police investigated shots being fired near the site and the burning of items that could be treated as potential hate crimes in 2022.

The year previous, the name of Constable Ronan Kerr, who was murdered by dissident republicans in Omagh in 2011, was clearly visible on the side of a pyre, as was former PSNI Chief Constable Simon Byrne.

Speaking to BBC Radio Foyle's North West Today on Thursday, Bishop McKeown said: "I hope we have calm, this is a very dignified city, it has been through terrible decades, centuries in the past.

"It has found ways of coming to terms with those and we have got to find ways of recognising the pain of the present Church News Ireland Page 19

and the past, and actually building a future rather than building something that destroys people."

Mr McKeown also stated on the show that he would like to speak to those behind the bonfire to find "a better way forward" and that those who wish to burn effigies or other hate crime items to think again.

Apex Housing Association, which owns the land that the bonfire is being built on, told the BBC that it "not authorised the current activity" by the builders who forced entry onto the site.

Furthermore, Apex stated that no contractors were willing to help due to "health and safety concerns".

Actions of minority should not be used to tarnish an entire city

The Bishop of Derry put it succinctly yesterday when he said that Derry as a proud city does not want to wake up this morning "feeling embarrassed" about sectarian displays on nationalist bonfires.

While I understand what Bishop McKeown was saying, the actions of a small minority should not be used to tarnish an entire city.

The focus of all citizens in the city should be for the betterment of lives here, especially for those in deprived working-class communities.

The Bogside bonfire in Derry, built by young people, does little to move that noble cause forward.

Alternative entertainment exists nowadays, in the shape of Féile Derry which this year started on August 10 and will finish tomorrow.

Like its upmarket cousin, Féile an Phobail, it is supposed to divert young people away from bonfires to more familyfriendly, safe and fun activities — and is successful at doing that in many respects. Unfortunately, such events don't manage to capture the entire target market and there are some young people, and adults, who remain supportive of the pyre.

The reason the Bogside bonfire draws considerable attention is firstly because it is one of few nationalist pyres remaining in the city; secondly, it is right in the heart of a busy tourist area, overlooked by the historic walls so is much more visible than others; thirdly, it often contains overtly sectarian material.

It should be said that some Protestant bonfires in the city do not garner the same media attention despite containing similarly offensive material.

While there is a temptation in some quarters to paint Derry, a majority nationalist city, as being openly hostile to unionists, like all parts of Northern Ireland, there are those who seek to divide in both communities.

The Bogside was right at the heart of the Troubles in Derry where 13 people were killed on Bloody Sunday. Church News Ireland Page 21

The area has seen progress with, for example, development of the Museum of Free Derry.

Meenan Square, on the other hand, is emblematic of the lack of investment in Derry.

It is a derelict eyesore, which was supposed to be regenerated years ago.

Given the Bog has that long-standing tradition of republicanism, nationalism and socialism, there are those who feel disenfranchised by the current political system.

Speaking of the bonfire builders, one source in the community said: "They believe they should have the same rights to have the traditional bonfire on

August 15 without being criticised, demonised especially by those groups, political groups and churches that for generations organised the August bonfires for their own objectives."

Many may not want to admit it, but another source on the ground said these sectarian displays are part of the "tit-for-tat" society we still live in.

And it is perhaps naïve to think that sectarianism can be completely eradicated.

Rather than throwing money at projects which keep people divided, it's time NI started addressing underlying issues that will make a real difference: an integrated education system; a police service that is truly reflective of both communities; a government which has regional equality at Church News Ireland Page 22

the heart of its programme for government; and moving to a place where all 'peace walls' are removed.
