# GCSE Religious Education still popular despite teacher shortages in GB

The Religious Education Council is once more calling for a national plan for RE, after GCSE results were published.

They show that 223,034 students took RS GCSE (full course) in England, an increase of 0.3 per cent. The RE short course rose in England by 9.5 per cent to 20,627. Overall, 72.7 per cent passed above grade 4, and 31.4 per cent above grade 7, remarkably similar grades to the previous year.

The high success rate and increase in numbers, comes despite a shortage of specialist teachers, with the National Association for Teachers of RE saying 51 per cent of those teaching RE mainly teach another subject.




Deborah Weston, chair of the RE Policy Unit, said: "Poor quality, tokenistic RE taught by non-specialists without subject training, has a knock-on effect on not just our communities, but the depth and quality of a young person's education.



Properly taught, GCSE RS provides invaluable academic and life skills that enables young people to think meaningfully about life's big questions in relation to their own beliefs and those of others". There were more dramatic results for Wales, where 10,254 students took the full course, a rise of 6.4 per cent. But short course entries fell by 27.1 per cent to 2,201.

# Bishop "hugely disquieted" by custodial sentences on young people involved in riots

The Bishop leading on prisons for the Church of England, Rachel Treweek, has told the Church Times that she is "hugely" disquieted by the sentencing of



## young people involved in the summer's riots across the country.

She said rioters "need to bear the consequences" of their actions, but expressed concern about whether custodial sentences were helpful in the long term. And she called for a more creative and effective approach to criminal justice, as Britain's prisons were already overcrowded even before severe custodial sentences were passed after the riots.

### **Lord Lieutenants in UK**

### Lord Lieutenant always takes precedence in UK: with uniform similar to British Army General.

This is because Lord Lieutenants once commanded the county militia, so they have silver braid, where a General wears gold, they are also represent the authority of the reigning monarch within their county, or lieutenancy area.

A lord-lieutenant is the British monarch's personal representative in each lieutenancy area of the United Kingdom. Historically, each lieutenant was responsible for organising the county's militia. In 1871, the lieutenant's responsibility over the local militia was removed. However, it was not until 1921 that they formally lost the right to call upon able-bodied men to fight when needed.

Lord-lieutenant is now an honorary titular position usually awarded to a retired notable person in the county, and in

recent times has been opened to female candidates. During the Cold War, the Lord Lieutenants also played a role in Civil contingencies and were part of "War Plan UK" where ceremonial responsibilities such as liaising with the local military, law enforcement, magistrates etc could have become actual responsivities as such they had priority communications and phone lines and could have been deployed to a county HQ.


# High level tour of Ely

# Church in Wales clergy told to keep breakaway bishop at arm's length - Church Times

The consecration of the Revd Stuart Bell as a bishop in the breakaway Anglican Convocation in Europe (ACiE) last week (News, 10 March), has prompted the Archbishop of Wales, the Most Revd Andrew John, to instruct his clergy not to receive communion at ACiE services. - Church Times 28 March 2023

ACiE, the umbrella group for the Anglican Mission in England and the Anglican Convocation in Europe, is allied to Gafcon. Bishop Bell was appointed bishop-elect in October last year, with primary responsibility for Wales, where he had been a cleric in Aberystwyth. His consecration was delayed while he honoured a previous commitment.

The Church in Wales passed a Bill in 2021 to allow samesex couples to have their civil partnership or marriage blessed in church (News, 6 September 2021). In a

statement following the Church of England's General Synod meeting last month, the Anglican Network in Europe (ANiE) described as "lamentable" the C of E's decision to allow the blessing of same-sex marriages, characterising it as "the abandonment of the sufficiency and supremacy of scripture which has until now been the bedrock and rule of the Church of England."

The statement went on: "We especially feel the pain of those who continue to make costly stands for godliness and have been abandoned by those who were meant to shepherd and protect them."

Archbishop John told his clergy last week: "While many of us have held Stuart in enormous respect for his ministry, the Bench of Bishops cannot receive or accept his episcopal ministry, founded, as it is, on a repudiation of the Bishops' own ministry and a breaking of communion with the Church in Wales.

"In these difficult circumstances, sadly there now exists some distance, not sought nor desired by the bishops of the Church in Wales, between us and the Anglican Convocation in Europe [ACiE], which is a group to which Stuart is now affiliated."

The characterisation of same-sex blessings as a repudiation of biblical authority was not an interpretation which the bishops of the Church in Wales could accept, he said, "although we have been clear that clergy, leaders, and members of the Church in Wales have a diversity of opinions on this matter, and have sought to provide space in our common life for freedom of conscience and difference".

The Archbishop makes the change in relationship clear. "A decision by members of ACiE to stand apart from the oversight of the bishops of the Church in Wales, and of the churches of the Anglican Communion in communion with us, means that Church in Wales clergy should stand back from receiving communion at services held under the auspices of the ACiE."

Similarly, he says: "No ministers affiliated with the Anglican Convocation in Europe should exercise ministry or leadership in a Church in Wales context, unless the explicit written permission of the appropriate Church in Wales diocesan bishop has been given."

The letter concludes: "We would like to be as generous and open in our relationship with former colleagues and brothers and sisters in Christ in the future but we have to recognise the reality of the step which has been taken. We will be happy to address any further questions or perspectives that arise in people's minds."

A press release issued last Friday by the bishops of the Anglican Network quotes Bishop Bell's description, at his consecration, of the emergence of ACiE in Wales as "a tragic necessity in the face of the false teaching of the national Church". The release says: "The Archbishop and his Bishops may sincerely believe that all Anglicans in Wales should simply accept what has happened and live with difference. But this is not the view of the vast majority of the Anglican Communion. . .

"Contrary to what Archbishop John and his Bishops have said, it is the Church in Wales which has placed itself out of communion with the majority of Anglicans worldwide by departing the historic, orthodox, biblical faith. . . As ACiE develops in Wales under Bishop Bell's leadership, its members will continue to make plans for the future together."

Archbishop John declined to comment further when approached on Monday.

### by Seamus Heaney

Between my finger and my thumb The squat pen rests; snug as a gun.

Under my window, a clean rasping sound When the spade sinks into gravelly ground: My father, digging. I look down

Till his straining rump among the flowerbeds Bends low, comes up twenty years away Stooping in rhythm through potato drills Where he was digging.

The coarse boot nestled on the lug, the shaft Against the inside knee was levered firmly. He rooted out tall tops, buried the bright edge deep To scatter new potatoes that we picked, Loving their cool hardness in our hands.

By God, the old man could handle a spade.

Just like his old man.

My grandfather cut more turf in a day
Than any other man on Toner's bog.
Once I carried him milk in a bottle
Corked sloppily with paper. He straightened up
To drink it, then fell to right away
Nicking and slicing neatly, heaving sods
Over his shoulder, going down and down
For the good turf. Digging.
