
One Sunday during the Season of Creation 2024 we spoke at all Masses about the loss of biodiversity crisis and the small – but important actions we could take. We asked for volunteers to help plant 1,000 crocuses in a grass bed at the entrance to car park and were delighted when 24 turned up. The crocuses have bloomed and were tangible signs of hope, lifting our spirits and, also very importantly, provided an early supply of nectar and pollen for hungry pollinators emerging from hibernation. The crocuses have made an impact, many people have commented on them and there have been new opportunities to talk about Care of Creation. We look forward to them returning each Spring. Well done to all...

Ballymore Eustace Parishioners bid to preserve historic church

Parishioners of St John the Evangelist Church in Ballymore Eustace have launched a fundraising drive for major restoration work to preserve the historic building for future generations.

Part of the Blessington Union of Parishes in the Diocese of Glendalough, the church was built in 1820 on an ancient religious site dating back to 1192. The restoration works will be carried out in phases under professional supervision.

Among the works identified under the plans is a new energy–efficient electrical heating system to replace the outdated oil boiler.



Roof refurbishments are imminently critical and works include replacing slates, treating timbers, repairing leadwork and fixing gutters.

External plasterwork will be surveyed and repaired, and once weatherproofing is complete, interior redecoration will follow.

Additionally, plans include repairing stained glass windows when funds allow. Fundraising efforts are ongoing to support the restoration.

St John's is home to a number of historically significant features. The church contains a 12th century granite baptismal fond and a 16th century stone effigy of a chain mailed knight, Sir Thomas FitzEustace of Castlemartin who died in 1454.

In the grounds of the church are two high crosses.

Vatican launches new pastoral guide to strengthen advocacy for human life

Amid ongoing global challenges that threaten human dignity, the Vatican has introduced a new pastoral resource titled "Life is Always a Good: Initiating Processes for a Pastoral Care of Human Life".

The initiative, released to mark the 30th anniversary of "Evangelium Vitae", seeks to inspire a renewed commitment to the defense and promotion of life in all circumstances.

Cardinal Kevin Farrell, Prefect of the Dicastery for Laity, Family, and Life, highlighted the urgency of this initiative, emphasizing that every human life must be valued and protected. In his introduction to the resource, he drew attention to contemporary crises—including war, violence, poverty, and discrimination—that make a pastoral approach to life more necessary than ever. He also referenced the

Vatican's recent declaration "Dignitas Infinita", which reaffirmed the inalienable dignity of every human being, regardless of their condition or circumstances.

The document is the result of extensive dialogue with bishops from around the world, many of whom expressed their concerns during their "ad limina" visits to Rome.

According to Archbishop Dario Gervasi, the Dicastery's Adjunct Secretary, this collaboration reflects a collective desire to enhance the Church's efforts in defending human life at all stages.

A webinar held in 2024 with representatives from episcopal conferences laid the groundwork for this process, ensuring that the pastoral strategy aligns with the Church's latest teachings.

A Synodal Approach to Defending Life The new resource offers a method for applying synodal discernment to liferelated issues, helping dioceses develop tailored pastoral programs suited to their specific cultural and geographic contexts. Rather than providing rigid guidelines, it encourages an open and dynamic approach, allowing local churches to adapt their strategies according to their needs.

Bishop Gervasi underscored the importance of collaboration in this endeavor, stating that the goal is to equip dioceses with the tools necessary to train laypeople effectively and engage younger generations in the defense of life.

The hope is that the resource will inspire a broader movement, reaching not only clergy and religious leaders Church News Ireland Page 9

but also parents, teachers, and youth. Free Access and Global Distribution To ensure widespread accessibility, the document has been made available for free in Italian, English, and Portuguese on the Dicastery's website (www.laityfamilylife.va). French and Spanish versions are set to be released soon.

The Vatican urges clergy and laypeople alike to study the resource and take active steps toward integrating its principles into pastoral work

Mock and awe as Campbell College pupils take second spot at Royal Courts of Justice

Aspiring solicitors and barristers get taste of legal drama in London Contest, Mark Bain reports in the Belfast Telegraph.

Pupils from a Belfast grammar school have said it was a thrill to visit the Royal Courts of Justice in London where Church News Ireland Pag

they finished as runnersup in a nationwide Bar Mock Trial competition.

The aspiring lawyers from Campbell College were narrowly beaten by The Boswells School, Essex, after seeing off 212 other schools to make the final two of the



prestigious nationwide event.

The Campbell College pupils competed against 24 school teams from across the UK in the final stage of the competition.

Also travelling from Northern Ireland to compete in the final were teams from St Patrick's Academy, Dungannon and Banbridge Academy.

Founded in 1991 by the national education charity Young Citizens, and supported by the Bar of Northern Ireland, the Bar Mock Trial Competition is a legal education programme in which state school pupils compete in mock criminal trials, taking on roles such as barristers, witnesses, defendants and jurors to impress a judging panel of legal experts. Supported by professional judges and barristers, the team from Campbell College first won a virtual competition heat against 11 other schools in January in order to progress to the national final in London.

Some 214 schools and over 3,000 students took part in the competition this year, with thousands more having taken part since it was founded nearly 35 years ago.

Campbell College student Matthew (15) said: "To be in such historical and prestigious surroundings as the Royal Courts of Justice was inspiring and exciting.

"The wigs and gowns made it feel so real and totally made me believe that I could do this for my career one day."

Noah (14) was playing the role of a witness in the mock trial. "Being a witness was so fun," he said. "I totally believed in my story and I enjoy drama, so couldn't wait to get into the actual witness box." Joshua (15) added: "The judges were really helpful. It's hard to believe they are the same judges who hear real barristers in the highest courts in the land every day. It has definitely inspired me to be a judge in the future."

Oscar (14) said: "I'm so glad to have been part of our school team. It felt good to be part of this. Church News Ireland Page 14



"I've made a lot of new friends and learnt many new skills, and used my critical thinking." Prizes in the competition were presented by the Attorney General, Lord Hermer KC, who called on young people to "come and be brilliant lawyers" because "the country needs you".

"Many of you want to pursue careers in law, and I think that's a wonderful thing to do", he said.

"I was state educated, and the first person in my family to go to university, and I want you to know that law is a career for you. Don't let anyone tell you otherwise. By taking part in this mock trial competition, you have committed to the process of the rule of law, and I would like to thank you for

that. To see so many engaged young citizens has given me a huge sense of optimism."

Ashley Hodges, Chief Executive at Young Citizens, the competition organisers said: "To achieve a thriving democracy of active citizens, young people need to know how our legal justice system works and why it matters. "We are proud that every year the Mock Trial Competition gives thousands of students an immersive way to understand their rights and our systems integral to the rule of law. This knowledge is fundamental to a fair society in which all can play their part."

Cathedral Calls

Durham to host Royal Maundy Service

Durham Cathedral has announced it will be hosting the Royal Maundy Service this year on 17th April. The King and Queen will be attending the Royal Maundy Service.

Royal Maundy takes place each year on the Thursday before Easter Day and is a special service in which the King expresses his gratitude for those who serve and volunteer in their communities. The service is rooted in the tradition of

Jesus washing his disciples' feet in the Upper Room the night before his death and goes back to medieval times.

During the service His Majesty will present 152 recipients, 76 men and 76 women (signifying the age of the Monarch), with specially-minted Maundy money to thank them for their outstanding Christian service and for making a difference to the lives of people in their local communities. These recipients have been selected from the Diocese of Durham and other dioceses across the Province of York and from Wales and Scotland.

The Very Revd Dr Philip Plyming, Dean of Durham says, "We are both honoured and delighted that The King and Queen are coming to Durham for this year's Royal Maundy Service. All of us at Durham Cathedral look forward to welcoming them and being part of this special celebration of volunteering in the local community. Maundy Thursday is about remembering the service and sacrifice of Jesus and it will be so special to celebrate in such a memorable way those who live out the example of Jesus today."

The King's first Maundy Service as Monarch took place in 2023 in York Minster, however the tradition of hosting the service outside of London, came from the late Queen Elizabeth II.

Early in her reign, Queen Elizabeth II decided Maundy money should not just be distributed to the people of London, and so she began travelling to various cathedrals or abbeys to give gifts to local people. She visited every cathedral in the country over the course of her reign, a tradition which has been continued in the current King's Church News Ireland Page 17

reign. The last Royal Maundy Service to take place at Durham Cathedral was in 1967.

Each recipient of Maundy money is given two small leather purses by The King, one red and one white. The first contains a small amount of ordinary coinage which symbolises the Sovereign's gift for food and clothing. The second purse contains Maundy coins up to the value of the Sovereign's age (which this year is 76p). The coins are legal tender but recipients normally prefer to retain them as a keepsake.

The 152 recipients have recently been notified and plans are already underway to ensure a successful Royal Visit to Durham this April.

Canterbury reclaims its medieval legacy as England's premier Pilgrimage Centre

Canterbury Cathedral has appointed a Pilgrim Officer to help re-establish itself as England's leading pilgrimage site.

Once as significant as Rome and Santiago de Compostela, Canterbury attracted many pilgrims in the Middle Ages. Torin Brown, the new Pilgrim Officer, first came to the city through the Camino de Santiago and later studied theology at Christ Church University.

While working part-time as a shepherd at the Cathedral, Brown engaged with modern pilgrims by stamping Pilgrim Passports, offering blessings, and taking photos at the

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Cathedral's Pilgrim Stone. Fascinated by their journeys, he began collecting data, which revealed that spirituality is the primary reason for the growing interest in pilgrimage.

This insight is shaping Canterbury's pilgrim mission, with Brown collaborating with other cathedrals to share pilgrimage data across the UK.

Speaking about his appointment, Brown said: "Pilgrimage as a religious ritual to a sacred space is an ancient practice that appears to be enjoying quite a renaissance in our postpandemic, climate-sensitive era.

"There seems to be an undeniable spiritual thirst for what religious people experience as transcendent realities – that characteristic of pilgrimage which can bridge the gap between the sacred and the profane in extraordinary places where the veil is believed to be especially thin.

"It can provide a space where the big questions of life, death, and suffering can be offered up for profound contemplation, and cathedrals and shrines can represent an axis mundi for this meaning-seeking".

Projects are already underway, including Canterbury's involvement in the city's pilgrimage-themed Medieval Pageant this summer.

Clergy and ministry

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Revd Ken McGrath becomes rector of Gilnahirk

Monday 31 March and a very happy evening in St Dorothea's, Gilnahirk, as the church regained its full parochial status and Revd Ken McGrath was instituted as rector having served almost three years as Bishop's Curate.

Ken was baptised, raised and confirmed in the parish making this a particularly special occasion.

In his welcome and introduction, Bishop David invited the congregation to celebrate the achievements of the last few years and to look ahead to the future:

"As we celebrate your full parochial status and institute Ken as rector you know even better than I how much of that has been due to Ken's leadership and the hard work of you as a congregation. So, this is an evening for thanksgiving, for celebration and an evening to acknowledge that there are different gifts which have been pulled together to



bring this church to this point, and to launch you for the next stage of mission and ministry here.

The preacher at the service was Revd Uel Marrs, Global Director of Mission for the Presbyterian Church in Ireland and a longtime friend from the McGraths' time in Kenya.

Speaking from Exodus, Uel drew a parallel between Moses and ourselves. As God responds to Israel's cry for help, he takes Moses' very ordinary shepherd's staff and steps in with his presence, power and provision to make extraordinary things happen. **Church News Ireland**

He reminded us that as Christians, we have the Son of God in our hearts. He is our light in the days of opportunity and in the days of darkness. His presence goes before us lighting the way ahead.

Uel encouraged us in these days to take hold of the Son of God himself and allow him to take who we are and the gifts we give him in service of the kingdom of God.

Ken said of his appointment:

"It is very special to become rector of the parish where I was baptised and confirmed. However, this evening reflects the hard work and commitment of so many people, especially the Select Vestry. There is still much to do, but with God's help, I trust that the parish will continue to be renewed and be a blessing to the whole Gilnahirk community."
