Newcastle Cathedral cancels visit by the Archbishop of York

Most Rev Stephen Cottrell had been scheduled to speak there on 18th September as part of his Lord's Prayer Tour visiting cathedrals, churches and schools across the north of England.

But following criticism of the way he has handled historic disclosures of abuse, the Cathedral's Dean and Chapter voted unanimously to cancel his visit.

In a statement to Premier News, Very Rev Lee Batson said: "As Dean of Newcastle, I am deeply proud of the Cathedral's ongoing ministry to those who have suffered abuse in their lives. It was this that informed the unanimous decision made solely by the Dean and Chapter to inform the Archbishop that we will not be hosting him as part of his Lord's Prayer tour. This decision was made independently by the Cathedral's governing body and applies specifically to this event. The well-being of survivors remains our highest priority, and Newcastle Cathedral will always strive to put them first."

The Bishop of Newcastle has been an outspoken critic of Archbishop Stephen since the Makin review into the Church of England's handling of abuse by the late Christian barrister John Smyth.

Earlier this year, Rt Rev Dr Helen-Ann Hartley called for Archbishop Cottrell to resign saying she believes he is the "wrong person" to be leading the church in the wake of ongoing safeguarding scandals.

The archbishop is in temporary charge until a successor to Justin Welby is appointed in the Autumn. Bishop Justin resigned in November after fallout from the Makin review.

The cancellation means that Archbishop Stephen will now visit eleven, rather than twelve cathedrals across the North of England this year. The tour is part of his vision for his 'Faith in the North' project and will see him speaking and sharing the importance and relevance of the Lord's Prayer, encouraging people to pray and live by this as part of their missionary discipleship **Church News Ireland**

Myanmar Emergency response update

From The Most Revd Stephen Than Myint, Archbishop of Myanmar via USPG

Myanmar has recently experienced a devastating earth quake, resulting in significant loss of life and widespread destruction. In response to this tragic event, the Church of the Province of Myanmar (CPM) is making an official and urgent appeal for your support.

The crisis has led to a severe shortage of rescue workers, essential supplies, medical personnel, and healthcare professionals.

Among the affected regions, two dioceses of the Church of the Province of Myanmar – the Diocese of Mandalay and the Diocese of Taungoo – have suffered extensive damage. According to current reports, approximately 36 Anglican church buildings, including one cathedral, along with eight church halls, have been destroyed.

Since 29 March, the Disaster Management Committee of CPM, in coordination with diocesan bishops and local disaster management teams, have been actively engaged in relief efforts.

C of I Bishops' Appeal supports Christian Aid's response to South East Asia earthquake

Following the devastating earthquake last Friday (28th March) in South East Asia in which over two thousand lives have been lost, the Bishops' Appeal Advisory Committee is sending emergency assistance of €10,000 (currently equivalent to £8,400) to Christian Aid's appeal for Myanmar.

Parishes and individuals are encouraged to donate directly to Christian Aid to ensure that what we can give reaches those affected as swiftly as possible.

Bishop Ferran Glenfield, who chairs Bishops' Appeal, remarks: "Myanmar is one of the most closed countries in the world, and generally doesn't welcome international aid, but the monstrous earthquake has presented an opportunity for organisations such as Christian Aid to offer help to those whose lives have been devastated. Bishops' Appeal always works with trusted partners on the ground and Christian Aid is one of those partners."

Examples of aid are shared below to show how donations can make a direct difference:

£10 / €12 could help fund access to safe drinking water. £20 / €24 could support a family to eat for a week by offering a food parcel of essentials such as oil and rice. £20 / €24 could buy hygiene supplies for a family of five for two weeks.

£50 / €61 could buy a food parcel for a family of five.
£140 / €170 could provide blankets, mattresses and alternative sources of heating material for a family of five.
£200 / €240 could fund an emergency shelter for a family who've been made homeless.

£1,000 / €1,200 could fund emergency shelters for five families who've been made homeless.

£5,000 / €6,000 could buy food parcels for 100 families, meeting their urgent nutritional needs.

£10,000 / €12,000 could provide vital cash assistance so that 70 families can access shelter, food and safe drinking water.


Methody's first ever German House Spelling Bee

Sister Valerie's in tune with stories of band life - News Letter

Church Army evangelist Valerie Thom is a tireless champion of the marching bands community in Northern Ireland and the driving force behind a series of booklets that recount the personal insights of members.

With a fifth volume of the "Marching On" booklets now in preparation, Sister Thom says: "There are plenty more stories to be told of band members' experiences. Every person's story deserves to be heard."

The booklets are produced under the auspices of the Zacchaeus Outreach Project, with the Royal Black Institution funding the cost of printing.

A committed Christian, Sister Thom believes that faith and marching bands can walk hand in hand. Church News Ireland Page 23 "Many people involved in bands are Christians, in the true meaning of the word," she says.

"Contrary to opinion, a lot of tunes bands play on parades are hymns, and hymns can be sung to what would be considered loyalist tunes; for example, 'What a Friend We Have in Jesus' can be sung to the tune of 'The Sash'.

"Many members are members of the loyal orders, and faith plays a large part in both those groups."

Sister Thom's café bus is a joint venture between the Church Army and the Church of Ireland Diocese of Armagh, attending parades to which it has been invited and reaching out with a Christian message "and a listening ear" to those in the bands fraternity.

She says: "When I'm on the bus, we are visited and supported by born-again Christians who are members of the marching band community.

"I think bands are still being judged, not by what they are, but by what the Press perceives them to be."

Marching bands "have always been part" of Sister Thom's life, with "my earliest memory of playing bands with my brother and sisters".

At the age of 13 she joined the Star of Tyrone Accordion Band, learning to play the button-keyed accordion, and attending parades all over the country.

She says: "I think people are drawn to membership in bands for many reasons – for many, it is that the band membership has been part of their family for many generations; also, for the friendship and fellowship it offers, to learn a musical instrument, and to enjoy performing."

Sister Thom believes band membership provides "discipline, freedom from technology, friendship, meeting new people, and having fun".

"I believe that, for many, wearing a band uniform gives them pride, a sense of belonging, and an identity with their culture."

She describes the band fraternity as "a very caring community, full of great musicians, teachers, and carers for the younger members of their bands".

She adds: "One person told me, if it hadn't been for the bandmaster in his band at the time, he wouldn't have been there that day.

"He said the bandmaster had helped him through one of the most difficult periods of his life."

Sister Thom says: "Over the last 12 years of running the Zacchaeus Outreach Project, I have personally experienced the love and care from members of the marching band community.

"One example is that I was preparing to speak at a meeting about my work, and a band was also playing at that event.

"I got a call from the conductor of the band asking me what my favourite hymn was, and they said they didn't play it. But at the meeting, this lady and her two sons stood up and played my favourite hymn.

"They had learnt it in two days, just for me. I was moved to tears."

Sister Thom believes the Marching On booklets "are an important way of acknowledging what people do for the marching band community and how that community is part of a Protestant culture".

She adds: "I think the best way to explain is to tell a story: Pride of the Birches were in Canada for the 12th of July celebrations in 2024 – their big drummer Jack Coffey had written his story in the last book.

"He just told me last week that, while on parade in Toronto, a man walked up to him and said, 'Are you the person who wrote their story in that book'.

"People must value them to send them to someone in Canada, and also, we are now on our fourth reprint, thanks to the help of the Royal Black Institution." Courtesy - Royal Black Institution Chapter Chat in Belfast Newsletter 31/03/2025
