
Carlow Christmas Tree Festival launch

Archdiocese's response to the disruption of Mass in St Patrick's Cathedral, Armagh

Statement in response to a group of protesters disrupting Mass yesterday in Saint Patrick's Cathedral, Armagh, a spokesperson for the Archdiocese said:

"While we are very sympathetic to the plight of the people of Gaza, and of all victims of war and violence throughout the world, it was very disappointing that a group of protesters chose to disrupt the celebration of Mass in Saint Patrick's Cathedral, Armagh, on Sunday morning, just as parishioners had received Holy Communion. At a personal level, and together with the other Irish bishops, Archbishop Eamon Martin has spoken out strongly and frequently on the issue of the horrific devastation and loss of life in Gaza, most recently in the Bishops' Conference's pre-election statement* of two weeks ago (a simple internet search will provide access to these statements).

"The bishops have also encouraged humanitarian help for Gaza and the Middle East through locally based charitable outreach, and through Trócaire's ongoing special appeal. In his 2024 New Year Peace message, Archbishop Martin highlighted this issue urging the international community to consider if war crimes are being committed with the merciless bombardment of civilians and the effective blocking of humanitarian aid to the defenceless people of Gaza.

The appalling situation in Gaza needs prayers and concrete action at all levels to end this inhumane conflict. Disrupting the sacred liturgy in any way is upsetting and an inappropriate form of protest." Ends.

War, militarisation and the proliferation of arms, is a stain on our humanity. Pope Francis reminds us that throughout the Bible, justice, peace and faith go together. He invites us to oppose a culture of cruelty and war and, instead, always promote a culture of peace and bear witness to human solidarity and love.

Irish peacekeeping troops operate in many troubled areas of our world. As a nation we contribute also in the area of human development through a number of agencies operating from our country. We ask all political parties to ensure the budget for overseas development aid is maintained and increased over the coming mandate.

Pope Francis welcome for members of the 'Hidden Christians Research Association' in Japan

Pope Francis welcomed members of the 'Hidden Christians Research Association' to the Vatican on Saturday last, highlighting their significant work in preserving the history and legacy of Japan's Hidden Christian sites.

In his reflection the Pope praised their dedication to ensuring Christian historical sites in Japan remain a testament to the enduring faith of the Japanese Christian community.

Their pilgrimage commemorates the 2018 inclusion of the Hidden Christian sites in the Nagasaki region on the UNESCO World Heritage List.



"The Japanese are a noble people," he said, emphasizing the deep cultural and spiritual significance of this chapter in Church history.

The Hidden Christians Research Association, established to document, preserve, and educate others about the extraordinary story of the 'Hidden Christians' plays an Church News Ireland Page 12

important role in safeguarding this heritage. These Christians clandestinely practised their faith during the nearly 250 years of persecution following the Tokugawa shogunate's ban on Christianity in the 17th century.

The association works to keep alive the memory of their resilience and spiritual ingenuity, which allowed them to pass down their faith for generations despite the threat of severe punishment.

Pope Francis highlighted the significance of preserving these sites as both a historical record and a source of inspiration.

"It is my hope that this recognition of the importance of these sites will not only ensure their proper conservation but also serve as a living testimony to the fidelity of so many Japanese Christians," he said.

The Pope also noted the upcoming consistory on December 7, during which he will create a new Japanese cardinal,



further highlighting the continued importance of the Japanese Catholic community in the life of the universal Church.

The gathering took place on the eve of the Memorial of Saint Francis Xavier, one of the first missionaries to bring the Gospel to Japan in the 16th century.


