## Challenging scope from Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference

Members of the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference gathered in Saint Patrick's College, Maynooth, for their Winter 2024 General Meeting.

The President of the Conference is Archbishop Eamon Martin of Armagh, and the Vice-President is Archbishop Dermot Farrell of Dublin. During their meeting, Mass was celebrated in Saint Mary's Oratory and prayers were offered for persons with disabilities, for vocations to the priesthood, and for peace on earth.


## Magic of Christmas at Christ Church Derry
