Archbishop Stephen joined a carol service at Leyburn Auction Mart on Tuesday evening.


Organised annually by the RABI, the short service included poetry, readings from the Bible and a host of traditional Christmas carols performed by the Leyburn Band.

Belfast Ecumenical Canon's Black Santa baptism

The Rev Dr Colin McCure, minster of First Larne Presbyterian church is to be the new Presbyterian Ecumenical Canon at St Anne's Cathedral.

Colin will be joining the Dean and others for his first Black Santa Sitout between 16th and 24th December.

Elected by the Canons of the cathedral, Dr McClure's appointment follows the retirement of Dr Ruth Patterson from the Chapter. Dr Patterson, of Restoration Ministries, has been Presbyterian Ecumenical Canon since 2012.

Colin McClure was brought up a member of Belvoir Park Presbyterian Church. However, growing up, Colin had close

ties and friendships with members of the Church of Ireland Parish at Belvoir. After primary school, Colin attended Royal Belfast Academical Institution ("Inst"). This was followed by studies at Belfast Tech and then at Queen's University of Belfast.

Colin first studied medicine, but he then took a change of direction into policing. Ultimately, Colin's call was to the ordained ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, and he commenced his studies at Union College in Belfast. As

part of his theological training and preparation for ministry, Colin served as an Assistant Minister at Webster Memorial United Church in Kingston, Jamaica whilst studying at the United Theological College of the West Indies.

In 1990, Colin was ordained as Assistant Minister in Fisherwick Presbyterian Church, Belfast. He then served in the joint charge of Loughbrickland and Scarva, near Banbridge in County Down. He has been minister of First Larne since 2003.

Throughout his ministry, Colin has worked ecumenically with members of other Christian traditions. In this regard, Colin and the Dean worked closely during the Dean's 18 years as Rector of St Cedma's Parish in Larne.



Colin has been Clerk of the Presbytery of Carrickfergus since 2014. At a denominational level he has represented the Presbyterian Church on the Transferor Representatives Council and various educational bodies, including CCEA and the former Southern Education & Library Board. He has been a Director for Christian Aid and National Chair of Girls Brigade NI. In addition, Colin is an enthusiastic member of the RUC-GC Male Voice Choir. He has sung in the cathedral on a number of occasions with the choir. And in 2013, Colin shared with Dean John Mann, in leading a visit to the Holy Land with a number of members of the cathedral congregation.

On receiving news of his appointment as Ecumenical Canon, Dr McClure said "I am humbled to be offered this opportunity. Given the crucial role played in my life's journey by several Church of Ireland clergy, I regard this as part payment of a debt I owe. I look forward to sharing in, and perhaps even making a small contribution, to the unique life and witness of the Cathedral community."

Speaking about Dr McClure's appointment, the Dean Stephen said "I am extremely pleased that Colin has been elected to be the next Presbyterian Ecumenical Canon, to follow Dr Ruth Patterson.

Over the years, Colin and I worked as neighbours and colleagues in Larne. I came to know Colin as an effective preacher and caring pastor, not just to his own congregation, but to the wider church community. His ministry has always been one of reaching beyond existing boundaries, and of ecumencial partnership. Through his involvement with Christian Aid, he demonstrates a deep

care for the world wide church, especially where it serves those whose needs are greatest. In addition, Colin has a love for choral music, so I hope he is going to enjoy his involvement with us at Belfast Cathedral.

Most important of all, Colin enjoys the outdoors. So he will hardly notice the wind or rain in Donegall Street, when he takes his place on the cathedral steps for the 2024 Black Santa Sitout!"

Dr McClure's installation as cathedral canon will take place early in 2025.

Pioneer Ministry Project around Celtic Christianity, pilgrimage and spiritual tourism

An exciting new Church of Ireland Pioneer Ministry Project from the Dioceses of Tuam, Limerick & Killaloe has been launched around Celtic Christianity, pilgrimage and spiritual tourism and will be led by Valerie Raitt, who is the newly appointed Pioneer Minister in the Diocese.

In this video, alongside Valerie herself, you'll hear Bishop Michael Burrows and Archdeacons John Godfrey and Simon Lumby explain their vision for the project. They describe how they are joining in what God is already doing in the lives of those who live in the dioceses and in the lives those who are visiting and the unique opportunity it offers to reach those with little or no connection to church. Supported by the Pioneer Ministry Leadership Team, a key place of pilgrimage would become a new community of motivated people who would start a fresh base where there will be a rhythm of prayer, spirituality, and hospitality. In time, the plan for this new community is to begin to meet monthly, similar to how contemporary Christianity in a way re-planted lona and made it a base for magnetic and distinctive worship.

Chaplaincy in the Royal Navy

The Rev Tom Ebbens, Assistant Curate at St John's Cathedral Oban and St James' Ardbrecknish, in the Diocese of Argyll & The Isles, is also a Chaplain in the Royal Navy. Here, he gives a snapshot of his day-to-day life at HM Naval Base Clyde.

Being a Chaplain in the Royal Navy is a unique ministry experience. After completing initial military training at Britannia Royal Naval College, Dartmouth, chaplains move straight into the fleet as a 'friend and advisor to all', regardless of rank, background or faith.

Rev Thomas Ebbens RNPastoral care is our primary function. To enable this, we must be purposefully proactive and reactive in our doings. Being proactive is about getting deliberately immersed in Navy life: fitness, fun, deployments, sharing the same experiences as our sailor colleagues. The trust and credibility we earn from being proactive boosts our ability to be reactive, with more sailors knocking on the office door asking: "Bish, can I have a chat?".

Within my first year, I've been thrashed day and night on Dartmoor, preached to hundreds, been to sea on an aircraft carrier, conducted multiple memorial services, led Christian workouts at 3am, served veteran families with committals of ashes at sea, scrapped at Muay Thai boxing, and discreetly supported scores of sailors through the rigours of service life.

I'm currently based at HMNB Clyde, home of the Submarine Service, while finishing off my curacy in Argyll & The Isles at St John's Cathedral in Oban. Future assignments could be anywhere in the fleet, on ship, abroad, working with Royal Marines or foreign allies, or in other naval bases and establishments around the UK. Wherever sent, my home remains with my wife and three daughters rooted in beautiful Mid-Argyll, and in the Scottish Episcopal Church.



Damascus Street, a new musicians' collective, launches debut single today

Damascus Street, a new musicians' collective from All Saints' Church, Belfast, releases a debut single 'God came down,' today Saturday December 14.

Damascus Street formed to write contemporary Christian music with theologically rich lyrics. Each member is a recording artist in their own right and from within Belfast's UniChurch (a congregation of All Saints') formed in 2022.

Their parish, in the Holylands area of Belfast, comprises Damascus Street and this represents the area which the church seeks to serve. The collective's name also carries



further connotation with the saving gospel of Jesus, as known on the Damascus Road experience and the apostle Paul's conversion. This is at the heart of the band's ethos, expressing praise in their music.

The collective's artists, Eoin Maguire (children's worker, All Saints'), Stephanie Devlin (New Irish Arts) and Matty Burke (formerly ministry apprentice and youth worker, All Saints'), have sought to capture that 'all of history' (which is the first line of each verse), whether past, present or future, points to Christ.

The song covers Christ's descent to earth, his ascent and his promised return. It is stacked with excellent musicianship from sounds not often heard in Christian music: A saxophone is not the usual choice for a Christian song.

Going forward, the hope is to write more songs. Additionally, the band have expressed a desire to use Damascus Street as a way to encourage the musicians in their own congregation to write songs as well, under the Damascus Street banner. The collective hopes to aid congregations

and individuals to worship Christ more deeply and more thoroughly through music.
