

Ukrainian Archbishop addresses Washington, as Trump U-turns on Zelensky

Major Archbishop Sviatoslav Shevchuk of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church is visiting the United States, as president Trump continues to make controversial remarks about the country's leadership.

In a surprise twist, Donald Trump has called for Zelensky and Putin to meet for peace talks, days after calling the



Ukrainian president a "dictator" on his Truth Social platform, insisting that he had no need to be present in negotiations with Russia.

"He refuses to have elections. He's low in the real Ukrainian polls. How can you be high with every city being Major Archbishop Sviatoslav Shevchuk of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church

demolished?" Trump wrote, "He claimed the Ukrainian president only had a 4% approval rating - yet recent BBC polling shows 57% of Ukrainians support Zelensky as their leader.

Shevchuk used the spotlight of his US visit to bolster his country's leader. He also warned against propaganda, and Russian claims about NATO being a security threat.

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Speaking in Washington DC, the Archbishop said: "If someone believes that NATO expansion is the cause of the war, they are blindly following Russian narratives and propaganda.

"NATO did not exist in the seventeenth or eighteenth centuries, nor were security concerns an issue for the Soviet Union during the Holodomor [famine]."

"I am neither a politician nor a public figure; I am a clergyman entrusted with the custody, prayer, and guidance of God's people – the suffering, yet dignified children of God who seek peace and demand justice," Shevchuk said.

He was joined by the Metropolitan Archbishop of the Ukrainian Catholic Archeparchy of Philadelphia, Borys Gudziak, who added: "Don't worry about politicians. Don't worry about meetings somewhere far away. Believe that the Lord is where it hurts."

"He wipes the tears of those who cry. He supports those who are persecuted. God's truth will prevail. We, Ukrainians, have experienced too many miracles not to believe."

Faith groups use courts to oppose Trump executive orders

President Trump's executive orders are mobilising faith groups. Action includes suing the administration over the reintroduction of immigration raids in places of worship and the freeze of the federal refugeeresettlement programme.

Twenty-seven faith groups, including the Episcopal Church, other Protestant denominations, and several Jewish organisations, have filed two lawsuits this month in response to the orders signed by the President the day after his inauguration on 20 January (Analysis, 24 January). The actions have been filed against the US Department for Homeland Security.

They argue that the administration is violating freedom of religion and freedom of association, on the grounds that congregations have reported that worshippers from immigrant communities are staying away for fear of arrest and detention, and faith organisations are unable to fulfil their faith's mandate to welcome and serve immigrants.

In some places, even church memebrs with documented legal status are choosing to stay at home, for fear that they may be mistakenly arrested on the basis of their appearance, the lawsuit says.

One arrest has so far been reported, at a place of worship in Tucker, Georgia, as the sermon at the Iglesia Fuente de Vida church was ending. The daily newspaper Atlanta Journal-Constitution reported that an asylum-seeker, Wilson Velasquez, was attending church when his Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) ankle monitor beeped. When he stepped outside the church, he was arrested by ICE agents.

The Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, Dr Sean Rowe, said that, in God's Kingdom, "immigrants and refugees are not at the edges, fearful and alone, but are the



very centre of God's story. . . We believe their struggles reveal the heart of God, and we cannot worship freely if some among us live in fear. We are seeking the ability to fully gather and follow Jesus's command to love our neighbours as ourselves.

"We are told by the rulers of our day that the rich shall be first; that compassion is a weakness; that we should regard the migrants and strangers among us with fear and contempt. But I ask us all to see that our true citizenship is

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in God's Kingdom, where the meek shall inherit the earth, the merciful shall receive mercy, and the captives shall go free."

Another lawsuit has been filed by the Quakers, with support from the Co-operative Baptist Fellowship and a Sikh temple, arguing that the administration has violated freedom of assembly.

Churches are also raising funds to continue their work supporting migrants, despite the freezing of the migrantresettlement scheme, which has already led to the winding down of Episcopal Migration Ministries operations, for lack of funding.

The Bishop of Minnesota, the Rt Revd Craig Loya, has created a new migrant-support fund to continue the work and offer support to other organisations left without insufficient funds.

Bishop Loya told the Episcopal News Service (ENS) that he set up the fund because the diocese has nine congregations in which migrants form the majority or a large minority. "We are richly blessed by this diversity. We really feel as a diocese we have to provide a response."

The diocese had donated \$10,000, and more than 100 individuals had since donated, he said.

Apology by Down diocese over alleged abuse by priest

Catholic bishop apologises for failing five people including minors who reported being abused by a now deceased priest and acknowledged that a new allegation is "entirely credible".

Bishop Alan McGuckian has confirmed that last year he was made aware that the Diocese of of Down and Connor had recently received an allegation of the sexual abuse of a minor against the late Fr Patrick O'Neill.



It followed a similar "credible" allegation In October 2004 relating to the alleged sexual abuse of a minor by the same priest, who was suspended from ministry in the Parish of Arkeen to allow a police investigation to take place.

Despite the PPS's decision not to prosecute, Fr O'Neill remained out of ministry on a permanent basis until his death in 2009.

"A statement was drafted by the Diocese at this time but was not issued," a letter from Bishop McGuckian issued to parishes within the Diocese reads.

"This statement would have empowered other victims to come forward

"This failure to issue a statement has also compounded the hurt endured by his victims and their families. This omission to issue a public statement is a matter of deep regret by the Diocese."

In addition to the two allegations of the sexual abuse of a minor, three other credible allegations of sexual abuse of adults, manipulation and abuse of power were made against Fr O'Neill in 2003, 2005 and 2006.

They relate to alleged abuse spanning the 1970s, 1980s and 1990s when Fr O'Neill was ministering in Down and Connor.

Bishop McGuckian said all of the cases in relation to the adults were reported to the PSNI and said the diocese is



"fully committed" to protecting people and "bringing healing to the victims of abuse".

"The Diocese is committed in working to support those individuals who have been abused by Fr O'Neill. I would also extend this support to their families who have been so anguished by the abuse of their loved ones," he concluded.

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"On behalf of the Diocese of Down and Connor, I extend my deepest sorrow and unreserved apology to all those who have courageously come forward and to each of their families. I fully accept that no apology can undo the damage, hurt, trauma and pain that has been caused to the victims and their families.

"I also extend my deepest sorrow and unreserved apology to anyone who suffered abuse at the hands of a priest of the Diocese in whom they had placed their trust.

"The Diocese encourages anyone who has concerns, suspicions or allegations of abuse to come forward and to report that abuse to the statutory authorities or to the Diocese of Down and Connor Safeguarding Office on 028 9049 2798." Courtesy Brett Campbell, The Belfast Telegraph, 23 February 2025



Cathedral Calls

Ten 20th century martyrs memorialised at Westminster Abbey

Janani Luwum - Archbishop and Martyr



On 17th February, the Church of England commemorates Ugandan Archbishop Janani Luwum, who was martyred in 1977 by Idi Amin's regime.

On 6th January 1948 a young school teacher, Janani Luwum, was converted to the charismatic Christianity of the East African Revival, in his own village in Acoli, Uganda. At once he turned evangelist, warning against the dangers of drink and tobacco, and, in the eyes of local authorities, disturbing the peace. But Luwum was undeterred by official censure. He was determined to confront all who needed, in his eyes, to change their ways before God. When training for ordination and in his first decade of ministry, Luwum won a reputation for creative and active leadership, promoting a new vision with energy and commitment. He was consecrated bishop of Northern Uganda, on 25th January 1969. In the midst of Idi Amin's violent regime in 1974,



Luwum was elected Archbishop of Uganda, Rwanda, Burundi and Boga-Zaire.

He pressed ahead with the reform of his church in time to mark the centenary of the creation of the Anglican province. But he also warned that the Church should not conform to "the powers of darkness". Amin cultivated a relationship with the archbishop, arguably to acquire credibility. For his part, Luwum sought to mitigate the effects of his rule, and to plead for its victims.

On 12th February 1977, Luwum delivered a protest to Amin against all acts of violence that were allegedly the work of the security services. Church leaders were summoned to Kampala and then ordered to leave, one by one. Luwum turned to Bishop Festo Kivengere and said, "They are going to kill me. I am not afraid". Finally alone, he was taken away

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and murdered. Later his body was buried near St Paul's Church, Mucwini.

A memorial service for the Archbishop was held in Westminster Abbey on 30th March 1977.

In his chapter for Luwum in The Noble Army (2024), The Rt. Reverend Anthony Ball, Archdeacon and Canon Steward at the Abbey writes:

"In both his actions and his speech, Luwum was an uncompromising witness for what he saw as God's justice and love. Our own times are rife with complex issues that do not immediately present themselves as specifically religious ones - refugees, ceasefires, international aid, the environment, social inclusion. In each, our individual



response needs to be informed by our Christian faith. What will cause us to say, 'so far and no further'?

May Janani Luwum inspire us not to conform to the powers of darkness but rather to seek to transform the world for 'the Lord God, who is and who was and who is to come' (Revelation 1:8)."

They will be accompanied by local primary school choirs and we encourage you to get your tickets to come along and support all these young talents.





Irish needlework instruction book from 1833

This rare Irish needlework instruction book from 1833 contains samples of sewing, darning, embroidery, knitting and miniature clothing, and was used at the Female Model school in Kildare Place, Dublin.

It is called 'A Concise Account of the Mode of Instructing in Needle-Work', and was printed by Thomas I. White of Dublin in 1833. The cover is inscribed 'Sarah Darby 1837'. These



are normal needlework instruction manuals that the students would paste their work into.

In May last year this book was auctioned by Freeman's Hindman of Philadelphia, PA, with an estimate of \$3,000-\$5,000!
