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Lutheran worship in Midleton

About three times a year, a small group gathers in St. John the Baptist Church of Ireland, Midleton, to celebrate a service in Lutheran tradition.

Daniela O'Hara, member of the Lutheran Church and parishioner at Christ Church, Rushbrooke, writes about the small community who meets in Midleton:

In Germany about 23% of the population identify as Protestant, and most of the small congregation gathering for the services at St John the Baptist, Midleton are either from Germany or of German descent.

The last service was led in German by Pastor Florian von Issendorff. Most of the time, he and his wife Anja, also a Pastor, work in St. Finian's Church in Dublin, home to the only Lutheran Church in Ireland. But they regularly travel around Ireland, holding German services in Belfast, Limerick, Wexford, Kerry and Cork.

Pastor von Issendorff's last visit to Midleton was on 22nd December 2024, the Fourth Sunday of Advent. That time, the congregation totalled eleven people, ranging in age from 4 months old to 88 years, and greatly enjoyed singing familiar German Christmas carols. Young British Christians increasingly antisemitic, says study

A new survey has revealed that young British Christians are more likely to hold anti-Jewish views than older generations.

The study, funded by a coalition of antisemitism watchdogs, looked at Christians' perception of Jewish people and Israel, in light of the current Middle East conflict.

"Young Brits are significantly more likely to hold very negative opinions of Jews and Israel, than older British Christians," said researcher Dr Motti Inbari, a professor of Jewish studies at the University of North Carolina, and coauthor of the national study, 'A Survey of British Christian Attitudes Towards the Israel-Palestine Conflict.'

Only half of young Christian respondents said they believed Jesus to be Jewish – with the rest either unsure, or of the belief that he was non-Jewish.

Across all ages, a third said they felt Jewish people speak "too much" about the Holocaust.

Dr Inbari told Premier that one reason behind the trend is a disapproval of the state of Israel's actions in Gaza: "The image of Jews tends to be mixed with the image of the of the conflict."

Overall, Brits showed an even split in their views on the Gaza conflict, with 23.6% supporting Israel and 22.5% saying they back Palestine. Most - 37.3% - were neutral, and 16.6 percent 'didn't know'.

"There's this thing which we call the 'Judeo-Christian civilisation'," Dr Inbari said: "We are hoping that Christians will understand the context of Christianity.

"If you understand the roots of Christianity, maybe you will develop a better views of Jews eventually."

Dr Inbari highlighted that churches could be a good place to have open discussions about inbuilt prejudice. "Let's first have a conversation," he told Premier: "because most people say that they never hear their pastor talking about [antisemitism], or seldom hear other members of the church talking about [prejudice]. So let's start having a conversation, because typically it's not part of the conversation at all."

New Wine issued warning over promoting new 'gifted' leaders

New Wine should "exercise discernment in promoting new leaders even where those leaders are obviously gifted in certain areas", an independent review of its connections to Mike Pilavachi has concluded.

Survivor (News, 27 September 2024), it repeats the warning that "people were often willing to overlook issues with Mr Pilavachi and his ministry because it appeared to be fruitful."

The review, also carried out by Fiona Scolding KC, was commissioned by the trustees of New Wine last February (News, 28 February 2024). It considers the extent to which New Wine knew of the allegations against Mr Pilavachi and whether the conduct specified in those allegations was "condoned or exacerbated by deficiencies in the governance, policies, practices, arrangements and oversight at New Wine".

The Church of England's National Safeguarding Team concluded in 2023 that Mr Pilavachi, the founder of Soul Survivor, had demonstrated "coercive and controlling behaviour" that led to inappropriate relationships, the physical wrestling of youths, and the massaging of young male interns.


Besides the exercise of discernment, the review makes three recommendations: the vetting of speakers; a system for reporting, recording, and monitoring low-level concerns; and a more robust and easily accessible complaints policy.

In an interview with Premier Christianity magazine, the Bishop of Lancaster, Dr Jill Duff, who chairs New Wine, said that the recommendations were "exactly the sort of things we need to put in place . . . If we are in a posture where we easily hear feedback, rather than being defensive towards it, that's a way of us growing — and a way of darkness coming to light."

She said that she was "really sad" that Mr Pilavachi had not issued an apology.

Crosshaven youngsters fund raise for Christian Aid's Sierra Leone partner

The youngsters of Templebreedy National School held a bake sale last Wednesday, raising €620 to support our work in one West African country.

Last autumn, Rt Rev Dr Paul Colton, Church of Ireland Bishop of Cork, Cloyne and Ross, launched a diocesan appeal for Sierra Leone and already almost €10,000 has



been raised, thanks to donations and church collections in the 22 parishes of the diocese.

The money will support the work of Christian Aid's local partner, the Sierra Leone Council of Churches, which is helping families rebuild their lives and find new sources of income after being displaced from their farmland following the arrival of a huge palm oil plantation.

The children of Templebreedy heard from Carrigaline clergyman, Rev Tony Murphy who is leading the fundraising effort within the diocese. Rev Tony has strong links to Sierra Leone because he lived there for many years. Last year, he went on a self-funded trip to Sierra Leone to visit the projects the appeal will support.

Cathedral Calls

Hereford Cathedral School opens international school Rwanda

Hereford Cathedral School is to open an international school in Rwanda for children aged five to 18 and living in or around Kigali. It will, the school says, "reflect the historic institution's values, ethos and opportunities as well as aligning itself with Rwandan culture and tradition".

The sixth oldest school in the UK, Hereford Cathedral School is the first independent school to set up an establishment in Rwanda, although not the first in Africa: Charterhouse opened a school in Lagos last September, and last month Rugby School announced a new campus there. Hereford already provides a range of educational services to schools in Jiangsu Province, in China.

Hereford International School, Kigali, is to be located in a luxury housing development. It is being built in partnership with the Savannah Creek Development Company, builders of the city's Kigali Heights business and retail development.

In Monday's press release, the headmaster of Hereford Cathedral School, Dr Michael Gray, said: "Embarking on this groundbreaking project is a tremendously exciting milestone for the school. It enables us to expand our mission and to make our sector-leading education available to more and more young people.

"Rwanda is one of the world's fastest growing economies. It has been on a transformative journey over the past 30 years, with education as a key part of its ongoing development. Through my personal and professional experiences in the country, which I have been visiting so frequently for well over a decade, I have developed an appreciation and affection for its home-grown solutions, warm-hearted people and pro-business approach.

"In collaboration with our esteemed partners, who share our ethos, values and commitment to delivering outstanding education, we look forward to bringing our ambitious and innovative educational approach to Rwanda and strengthening our global presence, which will be pivotal in helping us to realise our strategic aspirations."

The school is expected to open in two years and run an internationally recognised curriculum
