

Abuse survivors to be remembered in prayer across Ireland on 7 March

This year, the annual Day of Prayer for Survivors and Victims of Abuse will fall on 7 March, the first Friday of Lent. The Day of Prayer is an initiative of Pope Francis and was first marked in Irish dioceses in 2017.

2025 Day of Prayer for Survivors of Abuse

First Friday of Lent, 7 March 2025



Blessed candles will be lit in parishes across the country as a reminder to the faithful of the need for atonement and to symbolise repentance; light in the darkness and hope. These 'Candles of Atonement' will be lit in diocesan cathedrals and parish churches on the Day of Prayer, and thereafter during the celebration of Mass and other liturgies.

The lighting of the 'Candle of Atonement', and the following prayer, are based on the very moving Penitential Rite composed and prayed by Pope Francis at the final Mass of the 9th World Meeting of Families on 26 August 2018 at Phoenix Park, Dublin, when the Holy Father implored the Lord's mercy for the crimes of abuse and asked for forgiveness.

C of E 'protecting serving bishops' over Smyth says victims' advocate

An advocate for victims of the late Christian barrister John Smyth has accused the Church of England of protecting current serving bishops after it published a list of ten clergy who will face disciplinary proceedings over their handling of abuse disclosures in the John Smyth case.

Earlier today the Church of England said former Archbishop of Canterbury George Carey, the former Bishop of Durham

Paul Butler and eight other clergy would face disciplinary measures over their handling of abuse allegations against Smyth. But only one is still a serving member of the clergy.

Speaking to Premier, Andrew Graystone who has supported Smyth's victims for decades, said it was "an example of how broken the Church of England's internal safeguarding processes are.

"What's really notable is that none of the currently serving bishops, those who are still in post who were strongly criticized in the report, appear on this list of people who are going to be subject to the disciplinary process. So there seems to be a sort of immunity for bishops who are still in place and still at work.

"If you look at this list of people who've been criticized, it seems that the wagons have been circled to protect those who are currently working in the church, and particularly those who are currently senior leaders in the church, some of whom are named and criticized in the Makin review, but they're not on this list. And of course, because everything is done quietly and undercover, we're not going to know why. We're not going to have any justification or be able to question for any of these decisions."

Smyth, who died in 2018, was found to be the Church of England's most prolific abuser attacking boys and young men he met at Christian summer camps during the 1970s and 1980s.

In November, a report by Keith Makin found serious failings in the way the Church of England handled allegations Church News Ireland Page 9

against Smyth and the following month the Church began a process looking at whether those named present any immediate risk and consider whether there is a case for disciplinary proceedings under the Clergy Discipline Measure.

In a statement to mark the conclusion of the process, the NST said it would now seek to bring disciplinary proceedings against Bishop Paul Butler, Bishop George Carey, Rev Roger Combes, Rev Sue Colman, Rev Andrew Cornes, Rev Tim Hastie-Smith, Rev Hugh Palmer, Rev Paul Perkin, Rev Nick Stott and Rev John Woolmer.

Rev Cornes is also a member of the Crown Nominations Commission which is in the process of selecting the next Archbishop of Canterbury.

Andrew Graystone added:

"It's no help in making the church any safer, and it's no help to those victims and survivors of John Smythe who have seen no justice over all these years."

Church leaders lament UK government cuts to international aid budget

Leaders from the Baptist, Methodist, Church of Scotland and the United Reformed Church have responded to the Prime Minister's announcement concerning further cuts to the international development budget.



In the statement, the leaders said:

"We deeply lament the government's stated intention to make further cuts to the UK's international development budget. This would break a manifesto promise made to people in the world's poorest communities, and have a devastating impact on lives and livelihoods across the globe. While there is a case to be made for increasing defence spending to support Ukraine in resisting Russian aggression, that shouldn't come at the cost of vital humanitarian and development programmes, which play a crucial role in promoting human security around the world.

"UK aid programmes protect women and girls from violence, provide cost-effective vaccines to babies and young children and support human rights defenders who work to prevent Church News Ireland Page 11

future conflict. Such programmes will be under threat if UK aid is further slashed by 40%.

"Our Churches have strongly encouraged and supported the UK in its commitment to international development, not only as a way of showing care to our global neighbours, but in recognition of the UK's historic and ongoing responsibilities to address the causes of global injustice, poverty, forced migration, climate change and conflict. It is a source of deep regret to see a backing away from that responsibility. A

Tearfund condemns UK government's decision

Tearfund's Chief Executive, Nigel Harris, has condemned the UK government's decision to slash the nation's already strained aid budget to fund defence, calling the move "appalling".

Harris warned that the cuts would have devastating consequences for vulnerable communities worldwide, potentially leading to more hunger, fewer educational opportunities for children, and setbacks for women's rights.

He described the decision as a "betrayal" of the UK's own interests and said it would worsen the suffering of those already facing humanitarian crises.

"The decision to drastically reduce overseas aid is indefensible and short-sighted," Harris said in a statement.

"It undermines hard-won gains and signals a retreat from efforts to tackle extreme poverty, conflict, and global health crises."

The UK government's announcement comes amid unprecedented global challenges, with humanitarian needs at an all-time high.

Harris called on the UK to uphold its global responsibilities, accusing the government of breaking manifesto commitments and undermining the country's credibility as a leader in development and climate change efforts.

"The aid budget saves lives around the world," he added. "Cutting it will result in more deaths, more disease, and more conflict."

Prime Minister Sir Keir Starmer said that cutting aid funding to bolster the defence budget was "not a decision I wanted to make" but argued there was "no driver of migration and poverty like conflict".

Belfast High School Christian Union had their annual weekend trip at Castlewellan Castle.



Cloonfad woman Josie Costello was presented with the Vatican's Bene Merenti medal recently in recognition of her outstanding service as sacristan of St Patrick's Church, Cloonfad.

The medal, which recognises exceptional service to the Catholic Church, was presented on February 17th by Canon Joe Feeney.

The Bene Merenti medal was first established by Pope Gregory XVI in 1832 and is typically given to clergy, religious, and laypeople who have made significant contributions to the Church, often for long-standing service or extraordinary acts of faith and charity. The medal features an image of Christ or the Pope on one side and the Latin inscription Bene Merenti ('Well Deserving') on the other. It is often awarded on special occasions, such as jubilees or retirements, and serves as a mark of distinction for those who have devoted themselves to the Church's mission.
