


Image of the day - Saul Church

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Saul Church

Saul Church is a significant historical and religious site located in Downpatrick, Northern Ireland. It's believed to be the site of St. Patrick's first church in Ireland, making it a place of immense historical and

A Brief History


Foundation: Tradition holds that St. Patrick landed in Ireland near Saul in 432 AD and established his first church there.

Early Church: The original church was a simple wooden structure, replaced several times over the centuries.

Augustinian Priory:

In the 12th century, Saul became an Augustinian Priory, though it was later plundered.

Modern Church: The current church building was constructed in



1933 to commemorate the 1500th anniversary of St. Patrick's arrival.

Architectural Interest: The church's design reflects early Christian architecture, making it a fascinating study for historians and architecture enthusiasts.

The wee tin church in danger

Known locally as "the wee tin church", St Matthias first opened in 1892 for the local British military garrison and originally the Church of Ireland.

Its corrugated iron construction makes it extremely rare and it is one of only eight surviving churches of this type in



Ireland. They were manufactured by Harland & Wolff and most were exported.

St Matthias is located on the Glen Road in west Belfast and was reconsecrated as a Roman Catholic church in 1970 due to changing demographics.

The wee tin church is now unused and will soon fall down if it's not pulled down first - a sad sight indeed.

Down Cathedral venue for Mothers' Union's monthly All-Ireland Service

Thomas Herbert O'Driscoll (1928-2024)

The Rev. Canon Dr. Thomas Herbert O'Driscoll, a son of Cork, Ireland, and revered preacher and composer who served most of his years in North America, died July 25 at 95.

O'Driscoll was a master of narrative preaching, or panoramic preaching, which seeks to relate the gospel to contemporary cultural challenges. In 1997 he wrote The Word Today: Reflections on the Readings of the Revised

Common Lectionary (Anglican Book Centre), which covered the RCL's three years of readings.

O'Driscoll, born in 1928, was a graduate of Trinity College in Dublin, and ordained in 1953. He moved to Canada in 1954, after struggling with how to immigrate but also preserve his relationship with Joan Paula Lucy.

"I was torn between wanting to go to Canada and not wanting to leave Paula," he wrote in I Will Arise and Go Now: Reflections on the Meaning of Places & People (Morehouse, 2021). The couple agreed that they would become engaged, then he would move to Canada and return the next summer for their wedding. They married in 1955.

He was curate of Christ Church Cathedral in Ottawa, Ontario, for three years before serving as a chaplain in the Royal Canadian Navy (1957-60). He then served as rector in two Ottawa parishes before moving to Vancouver. He served as dean and rector of Christ Church Cathedral, Vancouver (1968-82), before becoming canon and warden at Washington National Cathedral and the College of Preachers. He returned to being a rector at Christ Church, Calgary, Alberta (1983-93) and was a visiting scholar at St. George's College, Jerusalem in 1993.

He composed more than 40 hymns, which are gathered in the book Praise, My Soul (Selah, 2005). "Herbert O'Driscoll brings to his hymnwriting many of the qualities that have enhanced his well-deserved reputations as a preacher and as an author," wrote his fellow composer, Carl Daw Jr. "Here

are the same attention to pivotal detail, the same gift for storytelling, the same ability to challenge and convince."

The Vancouver School of Theology established "O'Driscoll Forum: A Celebration of Preaching, Teaching and Liturgical Arts" in 2022.

O'Driscoll is survived by his wife, three daughters, a son, four grandaughters, four grandsons, and a great-grandson.
