

The day began with the celebration of the Eucharist with the administration of the sacrament of the sick for the pilgrims. Mass was celebrated in the Chapel of Saints Cosmas and

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Damien, presided over by **Bishop** Donal and the preacher was Fr Peter O'Kane. In his homily, Fr Peter shared his reflections on the experience of walking sort of the Camino de Santiago and



its lessons for Christian: to trust in the providence of God in the colourful bits of life so that listening to the Word of God and being nourished by the Sacraments, we will see the presence of God more profoundly every day especially in our brothers and sisters.

The Book of Deceased Pilgrims was received by the bishop at the end of Mass, followed by the blessing of the diocesan candle with the group making their way down to the Grotto. In the evening, some pilgrims and clergy joined in the Eucharistic Procession.

After the evening meal, the pilgrims gathered for their final liturgy together, led by Fr Gerry Sweeney. In his homily, he reminded pilgrims to search beyond the golden nugget and



to delve deeply into the Word of God. The bishop blessed the congregation with the Blessed Sacrament and then, after the conclusion, he gave words of thanks. As pilgrims left, they were invited to take home another's petition to remember when they return home.

Tomorrow the pilgrims will make their way home and the youth will spend a long day on the road before returning from Bordeaux to Dublin.

Former President welcomed as Changing Attitude Ireland Patron at Pride Evensong

"This has been the best decade for LGBTIQA+ men and women in our country but there is a lot more work to do until "all that miserable hatred is squeezed out by Pride, by lived love of neighbour".

So said former President Dr Mary McAleese at last Sunday's Pride Evensong in Christ Church Cathedral, Dublin.

During the service Dr McAleese was welcomed as the new Ecumenical Patron of Changing Attitude Ireland (CAI), the organisation which coordinated the service. The service was celebrated by CAI Patron, the Rt Revd Trevor Williams and sung by the Cathedral Choir.

The address was given by Dr McAleese who noted that Christ Church Cathedral had been a gathering place of Christian worshipers for almost 1,000 years. This amounted to almost 100 decades of listening to the words of the reading [Romans 13: 1–10]: "Love your neighbour as yourself." 10Love does no wrong to a neighbour; therefore, I



love is the fulfilling of the law.' She said it was a sad reality that we needed few lessons to teach us what happens when neighbour failed to love neighbour citing wars in Europe, the Middle East and Africa and nationally, the War of Independence, the Civil War and the Troubles.

"We need no more lessons in the damage done by an absence of love for in this gathering are people who can tell of the damage caused by the absence of that love in their homes, workplaces, street corners, sports clubs, communities, churches, the internet where hate filled invective,

judgmentalism, cancelling and stereotyping has made life intolerable, driven people to despair, driven too many to see no point in continuing to be alive," she stated.

This was a fortunate generation,

Dr McAleese said, that had witnessed the "miraculous day" in 2015 when the voters of Ireland endorsed same sex marriage but life for LGBTIQA+ was still fraught with difficulties. She spoke of the malign influence of vulgar locker room homophobic language and the random unprovoked attacks on young gay men where that language was used. She suggested that in this overwhelmingly Christian country, racists, homophobes and misogynists will have heard the words of the great commandment to love one another but have ignored them or edited them "to fit the mean abusive God they have made in their own awful image and likeness".

Dr McAleese said that the world needed to see love in action and see people gathered in loving solidarity.

"This Pride Evensong in Christ Church, a cathedral which has proclaimed his name for one thousand years is a statement of intent about the next one thousand years.

To the extent that we can we will insist on the right of all of us to love, to respect, to equality, to be free from wrongs inflicted by ignorance, bigotry and abuse of the Gospel and to call it out wherever it appears," she said.

Pride helped to change attitudes and to change Ireland, she said. But she added that while this is by far the best decade for LGBTIQA+ men and women in our country, no one who proclaimed the commandment to love one another could settle for the way things are and there is a long road to travel to a place where love triumphs and proves its worth.

She thanked the Dean, Bishop Williams, Canon Ginnie Kennerley and members of the cathedral community for their warm and gracious welcome.

She also expressed gratitude to chair of CAI Mark Bowyer and Canon Kennerley for the work they do to sustain and develop a tolerant inclusive Ireland.

She was particularly grateful for the privilege of becoming a patron of the organisation that challenges Christians to break down the barriers that keep neighbours from loving one another as Christ commanded.

York Minster's Kohima memorial

"When you go home tell them of us and say for your tomorrow we gave our today"

York Minster's correspondent writes - The Kohima memorial is hidden away at the edge of Dean's Park, but stands in proud memorial of those who gave their lives in a battle that was one of the major turning points in World War Two.

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Every year, we remember the sacrifice of those who fought in the town of Kohima, and the Naga people who assisted



troops of the Royal West Kents; the Assam Regiment and the Assam Rifles; and the relieving 2nd British Division.

Royals attend Thistle service in St Giles' Cathedral as Queen joins order of chivalry

The Queen and Duke of Edinburgh have become members of Scotland's greatest order of chivalry along with leading figures of the nation's life.

Camilla and Edward, who both have strong connections with Scottish institutions and charities, were formally installed as



members of the Order of the Thistle during a service held at St Giles' Cathedral in Edinburgh earlier this week.

Leading human rights lawyer Baroness Helena Kennedy, forensic anthropologist Baroness Sue Black and Scotland's first black professor Sir Geoff Palmer were also recognised for their contribution to Scotland and installed as either Ladies or Knights of the order.

The King is the sovereign of the order and appointments are his personal gift made independently of Downing Street.

Charles was part of a procession into the cathedral with the Prince of Wales and the other Knights and Ladies of the order who all wore their mantels and Thistle stars. Camilla was installed as a Royal Lady of the Thistle while Edward became a Royal Knight during a private ceremony staged in the cathedral's Thistle chapel, but the audio was broadcast to the congregation.



The King began the ceremony by telling his wife: "It is our pleasure Her Majesty the Queen be installed a Lady of the Most Ancient and Most Noble Order of the Thistle."

The Queen is patron of Maggie's Cancer Care Centres, founded in Edinburgh in 1996 and now with centres across Scotland, England and Wales.

She is also patron or president of a number of charities based in Scotland, including Crathie Opportunity Holidays, Scotland's Gardens Scheme and Horseback UK, and is an honorary member of the Ballater Women's Institute and the Upper Deeside Art Society.

Edward holds several patronages of Scottish charitable organisations including the Edinburgh International Festival and was joined by wife Sophie.
