

Engage well with the democratic processes available to us, outgoing President of the Methodist Church

The outgoing President of the Methodist Church in Ireland, the Rev David Turtle issued a statement ahead of the upcoming elections taking place this week in the Republic of Ireland, and in the coming weeks in Northern Ireland.



"As a Church we are clear about our ongoing commitment to engaging well with our politicians and wider society in both jurisdictions."

The statement reads - "With elections taking place this week in the Republic of Ireland, and in the coming weeks in Northern Ireland, I want to take this opportunity to highlight our Church's commitment to engage well with the democratic processes available to us.



"On Friday, voters will have the opportunity to help elect members for local Councils across the Republic and Irish Members of the European Parliament, as well those in Limerick to elect a new mayor. I would encourage those who have a vote to use it well.

"A month ago, we issued an Election Document to help us think through some issues and responsibilities that we have. One of those responsibilities, and privilege, that we have is to pray; and I would ask that Methodists pray for our candidates and all those who will be elected during their time in office. As a Church we are clear about our ongoing commitment to engaging well with our politicians and wider society in both jurisdictions.

Arab Hospital supported by Dublin diocese will continue to be a beacon of light in Gaza

Al Ahli Arab Hospital will continue to be a beacon of light in Gaza no matter what happens, the Archbishop of Jerusalem, the Most Revd Hosam Naoum, said last week.

The Archbishop was speaking at a service in St. Ann's Church, Dawson St. to honour Dublin and Glendalough's Shine a Light for the Diocese of Jerusalem appeal. In thanking the people of the dioceses and the wider community throughout Ireland for their generosity, he said



that the people of the Diocese of Jerusalem have felt the love and light of Christ shine for them as the "whole body of Christ" has prayed for them since the outbreak of the current war in October 2023.

The service on Monday May 27 commended the work of the Shine a Light appeal which has raised €216,000 so far for the ministry of the The Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem which covers Palestine (including Gaza), Israel, Lebanon, Jordan and Syria. The particular focus of the appeal has been the Al Ahli Arab Hospital in Gaza City which is run by the Diocese of Jerusalem.

Taking place on the eve of Ireland's formal recognition of the State of Palestine, the service was attended by the Palestinian Ambassador, Dr Jilan Wahba Abdalmajid, who is



from Gaza and whose children were born in Al Ahli Hospital. Archbishop Naoum was in attendance with a number of his clergy from the Diocese of Jerusalem who were in Dublin for a joint retreat with clergy of these dioceses.

The service was led by the Vicar, Canon Paul Arbuthnot, and opened with a lament 'Cumha na Marbh (Lament for the Lost) written and performed on the pipes by Professor Ciaran MacMurchaidh, Fiontar agus Scoil na Gaeilge at Dublin City University. D–Day Service in Down Cathedral

The 80th Anniversary of the D-Day Landings was commemorated in Down Cathedral yesterday 6 June.

The Cathedral's midweek Eucharist, which took place at 10.00am, included hymns, poetry and readings drawn from

the experiences of D Day veterans. Revd Adrian Dorrian, a Minor Canon of the Cathedral and the Area Dean of Lecale, gave a short address.

He said of the service: "It is right and proper that we take time during our worship to remember the significance of the Normandy landings. The events of that day set the Second World War on a new course which would ultimately pave the way for peace. The landings took place against a backdrop of violence and sacrifice; therefore, we will take time to remember those who fell and to pray for peace in our world today. At 6.30pm we joined Cathedrals around the UK by ringing the Cathedral Bell."



Archbishop
Farrell to ask
Pope to
designate new
cathedral and
basilica in
Dublin city
centre

Dublin does not currently have a Catholic cathedral in practice. The Catholic Archbishop of Dublin



intends to ask the Pope to designate a new cathedral and basilica in the city centre.

Archbishop Dermot Farrell announced plans today to ask Pope Francis to make St Mary's Pro Cathedral on Marlborough Street the Cathedral of the Archdiocese and to designate St Andrew's Church on Westland Row a Minor Basilica.

The Archbishop is setting up an implementation group to oversee a renewed pastoral and missionary strategy as he seeks the new designation at the two places of worship.

Dublin does not currently have a Catholic cathedral in practice; Christ Church Cathedral was designated a cathedral by the Pope in the 12th century but has been



under the ownership of the Church of Ireland for around five centuries.

St Mary's status as a "Pro Cathedral" indicates its role as an "acting" or provisional cathedral, a designation it has held since 1886.

Delivering a homily on Sunday, Archbishop Farrell said that St Mary's and St Andrew's would be well placed to be developed as "twin pillars" of the faith in the Dublin diocese. "Across these islands we see cities are being hollowed out. There is a call to work actively towards restoring a 'centre of gravity' to our cities. There is so much more to a living citycentre than being a 'commercial centre'," he said.

"The centre of a city—its heart—needs people, and people need worthy spaces to live and to be—to be with each other,

and to be with 'the Other'—our God who constantly creates us and re-creates us, who brings us to life."

He said that he expressed a year ago that he believed there was a need for the Church in Dublin to strengthen its capacity for outreach "to the many people with no established links with the Church or an individual parish".


"For that purpose, I expressed my desire that our Diocese and this City should have a cathedral both in name and in fact," the archbishop said.

"I also began to see that such a cathedral would need to be complemented by a church on the other side of the Liffey whose status and dignity would be formally recognised and supported. I expressed the view that St Mary's Pro-Cathedral and St Andrew's Westland Row were well placed to be developed as twin pillars of a renewed pastoral and missionary strategy.

"A decision of this nature is not to be made lightly. Having consulted widely, and have brought the questions before the Lord in prayer, I have discerned that it would be appropriate to seek the approval of the Holy Father for the designation of St Mary's as the Cathedral of the Archdiocese.

"It is also my intention to initiate the process for the recognition of the special tradition and role of St Andrew's in the life of the Archdiocese by its designation as a Minor Basilica. I am now inviting St Mary's and St Andrew's to begin to implement the proposals they presented to develop their liturgical and pastoral ministries."

Webinars, music, resources, broadcasts, and books




Thinking Courageously about Science and Faith'.

Scheduled for July, this webinar will explore how faith and science communities can engage in dialogue and

collaborate on issues affecting people and the planet. These include the climate crisis, health needs, and the growing influence of artificial intelligence.

The Right Revd Dr. Steven Croft, Bishop of Oxford, is a Co-Chair of the Anglican Communion Science Commission. He is a leading voice on science, faith, and ethical debate, and will be one of the webinar speakers. He expressed his anticipation for the event "I am excited that the Anglican Communion Office will be hosting this very important webinar. It is indeed vital that the Church thinks courageously about science and faith. We have a crucial role to play in educating our congregations about the positive and constructive use of science and technology for peace and justice. My hope is that the more empowered churches become, the more they will collaborate with the
