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

Icons in Derry for Week of Prayer



An audience comprising members of Londonderry's four main churches were treated to a fascinating insight into the art of iconography, this afternoon, at the launch of an 'Exhibition of Icons' in St Eugene's Cathedral Hall which marked the beginning of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

The event was hosted by artist Colette Clarke and tutor Dick Sinclair, both of whom belong to The Association of Iconographers, Ireland. Mr Sinclair explained to the audience the composition of these remarkable artworks which, he said, worked "on so many levels – the technical, the poetic and the theological".

Franklin Graham to speak at Trump's inauguration

Franklin Graham, the son of the late evangelist Billy Graham, is to lead prayer at Donald Trump's inauguration today Monday, according to reports.

Franklin has appeared alongside Trump several times, including during his 2024 election campaign.

Graham, who is CEO of disaster relief organisation Samaritan's Purse, led prayer during Trump's visit to the aftermath of hurricane Helene in Georgia.



In October 2024, Graham told Premier's Anna Rees that he believed Trump's presidential rival, Kamala Harris, to be "almost anti-Christ in her perspectives".

The evangelist also told Religion Media Centre that whilst he does not consider Trump to be a living example of Christian values, he believes him to be a defender of them.

Graham led prayer at the 2024 Republican Convention, when Donald Trump was confirmed as the party's presidential nominee.

Trump will be inaugurated for the second time, as the 47th President of the United States, today Monday 20th January.

Franciscans criticise 'illegal occupation' of friary

The decision to close the friary church in Clonmel is due to a lack of vocations and the aging profile of the friars.

The Franciscan Order has criticised those who have "illegally occupied the friary church" in the Irish town of Clonmel following its closure on 31 December, Sarah Mac Donald writes in The Tablet.

In a statement, the Franciscans warned that the occupation "constitutes trespass" and is a serious health and safety concern.

However, Pat O'Gorman of the Abbey House of Prayer in Clonmel, members of which are staging the sit-in, told the Tablet that they were frustrated that the Franciscans had so far failed to meet with them to discuss the impasse and an alternative plan to closure.

"We felt we had no choice [but] to have a sit in. The Franciscans are refusing to communicate directly with us, despite several emails from our committee, politicians, the Vincent de Paul and several members of the community. We tried several times before, during and after Christmas [to meet with them]."

The decision to close the friary church in Clonmel is due to a lack of vocations and the aging profile of the friars. It was announced in January 2023, ending the Franciscan's 750-year history in the County Tipperary town.

The Abbey Prayer Group was set up in response to the announcement and has kept the church open for prayer and two Masses per week since June 2023. Members of the



prayer group would like to see the arrangement continue and have staged a sit-in at the church in support of their demand.

The order said a claim that all costs, including insurance, relating to the property have been covered by the Prayer Group, is incorrect.

"Since the Franciscans withdrew from Clonmel in January 2023 they have provided €160,000 for the insurance and maintenance of the building," the statement said.

But according to Pat O'Gorman, the prayer group offered to fund the running costs, including insurance, and that "money is pouring in".

"We are self-financing and can run the church at no cost to the Franciscans. We have being running the church very successfully over the last 18 months with huge support from the public in terms of mass attendances and financial support from devout worshippers."

The Franciscans said there is no truth in the claim that they intend to convert the listed church into accommodation for rental purposes.

"No decision regarding the future use of the building has been made at this time." Nor would it be allowed to "fall into decay," the statement said.

They have offered to cover the cost of the transfer of the popular shrine to St Anthony to a nearby parish.

According to Pat O'Gorman of the Abbey Prayer Group, "The church is over 700 years old. It is important to the people of Clonmel in terms of its spiritual, historical, and cultural significance."

Dioceses desert X for new horizons

Many Church of England dioceses are deserting the social media platform X, which was formerly known as Twitter.

The exodus follows concerns over the direction of the platform and its content since Elon Musk took over as owner in 2022.

Musk has hailed the site as a bastion of freedom of expression but it has become increasingly more polarised



with content of an extremist nature being shared. He's also published several posts supporting the far-right activist Tommy Robinson.

During the riots which followed the stabbing of three children in Southport, the platform was strongly criticised for posts that were said to have incited violence.

Social media is a valuable way for churches and dioceses to engage with parishioners and over the years Twitter became a go-to way of connecting Christians. But now, dioceses such as Winchester, Salisbury, and Bristol are among those no longer active on the platform.

In a statement on its website, the Diocese of Salisbury said: "This decision has arisen from growing discomfort about the current direction of the platform, and also from the negative effect that some debate has had on social cohesion and church unity. We believe that, on balance, it serves polarisation and profit rather than connection and understanding.

"We aren't leaving because we shy away from difficult discussion, but because we believe that these should be conducted in ways that honour human dignity and build up our common life.

"The number of our followers on X will seem small to many organisations, though we value each one. We look forward to staying in touch through other channels and connecting with all those interesting in our work of Making Jesus Known."

A spokesperson for the Diocese of Truro said while it hasn't left X, it isn't posting material because "the content and tone of X is quite toxic a lot of the time and with limited resources we are focusing on those platforms that help us connect best with our key audiences and provide a more positive space for us and our users."

Many Christians and dioceses are switching to a presence on the social app site BlueSky which was initially set up in 2019 by Jack Dorsey a former Twitter CEO. It is now mainly owned by CEO Jay Graber who says its ethos is "social media as it should be". It invites users to find their community among millions of users and to "unleash" their creativity and "have some fun again".




Armagh's Robinson Library
