Top Episcopal leaders attack Trump's deportation plans

Presiding Bishop Sean Rowe and President of the House of Deputies Julia Ayala Harris criticized President Donald Trump's plans for deporting undocumented immigrants on an unprecedented scale in a pastoral letter issued January 21.

They describe a series of executive orders he signed just after taking office as a "harbinger" of more dramatic actions

soon to come - report by Rev Mark Michael, editor, in 'The Living Church'.

"We read this news with concern and urge our new president and congressional leaders to exercise mercy and compassion, especially toward law-abiding, long-term members of our congregations and communities; parents and children who are under threat of separation in the name of immigration enforcement; and women and children who are vulnerable to abuse in detention and who fear reporting abuse to law enforcement," Rowe and Harris said.

The presiding officers cite God's command to "love the alien as yourself" (Lev. 19:34) and the Church's identity as a community that "transcend[s](#) the earthly distinctions made among us by the leaders of this world" as the basis for

its vocation to "proclaim that the kingdom of heaven is promised to the persecuted and answer Christ's call to welcome the stranger among us."

They urge Episcopalians to advocate on behalf of "Dreamers," child immigrants whose path to citizenship through the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program President Trump tried to end in 2017. They also call on the faithful to stand against mass deportations, and to support border management that is "proportional and humane and respects the right of asylum."

They ask the faithful to join them in "Speaking out against anti-immigrant rhetoric and actions, including race-based targeting, vigilantism and violence, family division, and detention and deportation without charges or convictions. As Christians, we must stand against these expressions of hatred and fear with a clear witness to our sacred promise to respect the dignity of every human being."

In his inaugural address, President Trump pledged that "illegal entry will immediately be halted, and we will begin the process of returning millions and millions of criminal aliens back to the places from which they came."

Executive orders signed on January 20 have temporarily suspended the admission of asylum-seekers. CBP One, an app used by immigrants to schedule interviews for admission at border crossings, was shuttered on Inauguration Day. Trump also declared a "state of emergency" at international borders, allowing him to send federal troops to the regions, and ended the program known

as "catch and release," which allows asylum-seekers to be discharged from detention facilities while awaiting immigration hearings.

Analysts at NBC News suggest that additional executive orders could be intended to pave the way for the promised mass deportations. These include measures requiring federal agencies to ensure that immigrants resident in the U.S. "do not bear hostile attitudes toward its citizens, culture, government, institutions or founding principles" and a requirement that the Department of Homeland Security establish a registry of undocumented immigrants and require them to be fingerprinted.

The presiding officers close their letter by calling for prayer and donations to Episcopal Migration Ministries' work of resettling refugees, while offering pastoral assurance to those directly affected by the immigration system changes:

"Across our church, migrants are members of the Body of Christ and part of our congregations and communities, and our common life is richer thanks to their contributions. To our siblings who are at risk of deportation or of being separated from those you love, know that your story is our story, and your dignity is inseparable from our own. We stand with you, and we will face these challenges together."

Thursday marked the anniversary of the passing of the founder, Henry James Campbell (1813 - 1889).

Henry, who died on 23rd January 1889, left a generous bequest in his will for the establishment of a school. The trustees purchased the land in 1890, and Campbell College welcomed its first students in September 1894.

Renowned for the quiet beauty of his compact, meditative lyrics, Michael was a pupil at RBAI between 1951-58, before returning as a teacher, 1964-69.

Alongside many accolades including the Whitbread Poetry Prize and Queen's Gold Medal for Poetry, in November

2022, Michael was awarded the Feltrinelli International Prize for Poetry.

Michael was no stranger to RBAI, returning most recently in April 2023, when he was interviewed by Stephen Nolan as part of RBAI Together.

Church of England launches Flourishing Leaders Framework at National Education Conference

National Society unveils transformative step for the education sector as Flourishing Leaders Programmes launched.

Educators and young leaders gathered in London for the Church of England's 7th annual Education Conference, which saw the launch of a bold new vision for the sector, the Flourishing Leaders Programmes, aimed at transforming schools into places where both students and teachers can thrive.

Delegates heard how the Flourishing Leaders Programmes could be a transformative step for the education sector. The programmes will build on the Flourishing Together document which sets out a bold, hope-filled vision for flourishing children, educators, and school communities. The document offers a vision for addressing systemic challenges through a focus on purpose, relationships, resources, learning, and wellbeing.

The day included workshops on a range of topics and featured memorable contributions from children and young people of the Twyford CofE Academies Trust, whose leading of sung worship received a standing ovation.

Delegates – including teachers, heads, clergy, governors, and those in education and diocesan leadership – gathered at St John's Church, Hackney. The venue has special

significance as the parish in which the National Society for Education was founded by Joshua Watson in 1811.

Launching the Flourishing Leaders Programmes, Andy Wolfe, Executive Director of Education for the Church of England, emphasised the vital importance of creating environments where both students and educators can thrive. Drawing on research and long-term vision, he said:

"Flourishing educators are essential for flourishing students. A system where teachers and leaders flourish creates the conditions for young people to achieve their full potential."

He said that the Flourishing Leaders and Teachers Programmes could positively address teacher retention and leadership development:

"These programmes will support educators at every level, from early career teachers to system leaders, focusing on purpose, relationships, and wellbeing. Already, 900 schools and colleges have committed to piloting these courses, which will commence in autumn 2025."

Cathedral Calls

Whales in Winchester

Three monumental sculptures of sperm whales, created by artist Tessa Campbell Fraser, will hang from Winchester cathedral's Nave in this immersive art installation.

You can experience this brand new exhibition where you'll feel immersed to the depths of the ocean as Winchester Cathedral's nave is transformed to home three whale sculptures.

In this art installation, Campbell Fraser will seek to unravel the interspecies communications between man and animal that are currently at the forefront of scientific research. She will create three monumental (5.2m, 4.6m and 3m respectively) sculptures of sperm whales which will hang from the nave ceiling.

The nave's wooden roof beams were often compared to the timbers of an upside down ship or boat, carrying subliminal associations with the industrial scale whaling which reduced sperm whale numbers to critical levels in the 19th century, when their waxy spermaceti oil famously oiled the wheels of the Industrial Revolution.

The sculptures offer a response to the environment whereby the viewer becomes immersed into an imaginative world of the whale whilst the surroundings reflect man's increasing ecological impact on the world's climate.

The exhibition runs until 26th February 2025

Elise commenting on her appointment said, "I thank the Bishop for his appointment and trust, and I look forward to serving in this new role".



North-East Cork Rural Deanery comprises five parishes: Youghal Union, Cloyne Union, Cobh and Glanmire Union, Fermoy Union and Mallow Union. Rural Deans are appointed by the Bishop from among the clergy of the diocese. While rural deans have a particular role supervising the care of church property within their rural deanery area, they may also be assigned other duties by the Bishop.


Agnes Burns: the Sister of Robert Burns and her life in Ireland



Agnes Burns, the eldest sister of Scottish poet Robert Burns, moved to Ireland after marrying William Galt in 1804.

The couple settled in Dundalk, County Louth, in 1817, where William worked on the Fortescue Estates, helping to improve the land by building reservoirs and planting thousands of trees. Agnes lived the rest of her life in Ireland, working as a dairymaid on the estate.

One of the most vivid descriptions of Agnes comes from Major McClintock, who noted her strong Ayrshire accent: "She was as unprepossessing a female as one would care to see. But, oh! to hear her read her brother's poems was a caution, with hard rasping delivery, that I question if many out of Ayrshire could make out the meaning of a word she said." Despite her distinctive accent, Agnes shared a deep



connection with her brother Robert, often reading his poems with affection.

Agnes died in 1834 and was buried in the St Nicholas Church cemetery in Dundalk. A memorial to both Agnes and Robert Burns was erected in 1839, with an inscription that reads:

"As a tribute to the genius of Robert Burns, the national bard of Scotland and in respect for the memory of his eldest sister Agnes, whose mortal remains are deposited in this church-yard, erected by the contributions of the poet's numerous admirers in Dundalk and its vicinity, 25th of January 1839."

Today, her former cottage in Dundalk has been transformed into a museum, connecting her life in Ireland to the enduring legacy of her brother, Robert Burns.
