Storm Eoghwyn affected most parts of Ireland. Slates off roofs and ridge tiles, trees uprooted, power lines ruptured, train lines to be checked for safety, and roads blocked. Airports mostly empty and flights cancelled.

As we are unsure of the extent of the damage we are advising that no service should take place in these churches, until we know more. We will have someone out early in the coming week to assess each church.

"It is very disappointing news and especially heartbreaking for Killanley who have only recently re-opened after a similar experience last year. As soon as we have an update we will inform you and we are hoping that things aren't as bad as we have expected".

The Rector of Seagoe in Portadown said in a Facebook comment to a predecessor who was coping with the sun and the sea in Lanzarote - Enjoy the break. The storm in Seagoe was quite severe; we lost four ridge tiles, two major trees fell in the garden and two others were badly damaged, including one of the large chestnut trees in the side garden. The garden was otherwise strewn with branches from trees, and the driveway was impassable due to a large branch that fell across it. A huge tree fell from the High School across the road, blocking the road and downing the power lines. I think the tree is currently being removed, so hopefully the

road will be reopened and the power restored in a day or so".

Churches and their congregations responded with help to



their local community. Connor Presbyterian Church: "It's a very different morning in Connor from 48 hours ago when Storm Eowyn struck, but its impact is still being felt with many local homes remaining without power.

"Today you can make use of facilities at the church if you have no power at home. Bring your devices and cables and we

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will find a place for you to charge. There will be hot drinks served before the noon service (during Sunday School and Bible Class) and after the evening service, and hot water is available from the water boiler in the kitchen.

"The church will also be open from 3-4pm for anyone who needs devices charged or hot water.

"If we can provide any further help, leave us a message."

1st Ahoghill Presbyterian Church posted : "We have heat and electric - if you have no electric or you know of someone with no electric, our church will be open from 9.30 this morning, where people can call in for hot water, electric to charge devices, or a hot shower, or just a cup of tea and a slice of toast. Pop in any time from 9.30am."

Two names are in the running to be the next Moderator of the Presbyterian Church

Rev Trevor Gribben, the Clerk of the General Assembly since 2014, and Rev Richard Kerr, minister of Templepatrick Presbyterian Church since 2005, feature on the shortlist.

The next Moderator will be announced early next month.

The church's 19 regional presbyteries will gather separately across Ireland to select one as Moderator-Designate.

Each of those meetings traditionally takes place on the first Tuesday in February, which this year is February 4, and whoever is selected will be formally elected and installed as Moderator during this year's General Assembly in June.

The church's current Moderator, Dr Richard Murray, will continue to serve in office until then.

Administering this process usually falls to the Clerk of the General Assembly.

As Mr Gribben, like Mr Kerr, is a nominee again this year, it will be overseen by deputy clerk, Rev Dr David Allen.

Dr Allen said: "While there was a large field of ministers to consider last year, when there were five names on the shortlist, over the last decade four names per election have Church News Ireland Page 8

been the average. Only once in that time, and that was 2023, have presbyteries considered just two names, so two isn't that unusual.

"Choosing a new Moderator, our most senior office bearer and chief public representative, is a relatively straightforward process, it is also an important part of the life of our church, a prayerful, open, and democratic, process that starts in late autumn.

"This is the time when members of presbytery begin to suggest names of ministers who they would like to see considered for the office. In the run up to Christmas, following the December presbytery meetings, I asked those on this 'long list' if they would be willing to have their names go forward, and this year two agreed."

All ministers and the representative elder from each congregation within the Presbytery's bounds will vote for their preferred candidate.

Archbishop calls Irish media North and South to share message of hope

Archbishop Eamon Martin, Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland, today welcomed the annual World Day for Social Communications message of Pope



Francis, themed, 'Share with gentleness the hope that is in your heart.' See text below.

Archbishop Martin said:

"I welcome the 2025 communications day message published today by Pope Francis on the feast day of Saint Francis de Sales, the patron saint of journalists. In his short but insightful reflection the Holy Father has specifically tailored his words to inform the mission of the media, as well as for anyone who communicates in the digital space



whether in a personal or professional capacity. Underpinning his message is the importance of infusing 'hope' in communications, and this complements our role as pilgrims of hope during the Church's universal celebration of faith in this Jubilee Year of Hope 2025.

"In the context of Pope Francis' message, I encourage all working in media and journalism across Ireland to consider reporting and publishing opinion articles that offer hope and positivity to this island. There are so many of such stories

around our country, North and South, where people bring joy and hope to others - and these acts exemplify the very best of humanity. I invite reporters to seek out and give a platform to such uplifting stories during this Year of Hope."

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Archbishop Martin continued, "In today's message Pope Francis calls out the damaging effect of toxic commentary in the media which, far from being gentle, is 'characterized by disinformation and polarization ... Too often today, communication generates not hope, but fear and despair, prejudice and resentment, fanaticism and even hatred.' As an antidote, Pope Francis provides a clarion call for Christians to take risks for hope 'a hidden virtue, tenacious and patient', while not underestimating the effort involved. In doing so, we can collectively achieve the common good - a society filled with hope and that serves humanity to function as a better place for everyone, especially the vulnerable.

"Pope Francis reminds us that it is not an easy task to be a Christian communicator. However, we are assured that the Lord is with us at all times. Accordingly, we have a responsibility to speak up and explain 'the hope that is within us', and how we communicate 'should be steeped in gentleness and closeness', thus modelling 'the greatest communicator of all time, Jesus of Nazareth'."

Archbishop Eamon concluded, "Always sensitive to our emotional wellbeing and personal life experiences, Pope Francis reminds journalists in a fatherly, caring way, to be mindful not to neglect 'your heart, your interior life'; 'to be meek and never forget the faces of other people'; 'always spread hope even when it is difficult'; to communicate so as 'to heal the wounds of humanity'; to report the spirit of human perseverance when you see it in the most unlikely of places; to promote a 'culture of care, build bridges'; and, to 'tell stories steeped in hope, be concerned about our common destiny and strive to write together the history of our future'." **Church News Ireland**



Director of the Anglican Centre in Rome retiring

More than 100 young adults gather for Ministry Experience Scheme conference

A Church of England scheme that helps young people to explore their vocation has been described as a 'great hope' for the future, as more than 100 young people gathered for its annual conference.

Young adults aged between 18 and 30 years old with the Ministry Experience Scheme (MES) met for a day of learning, networking and worship at St Mary's in Marylebone, central London.

The event was led by participants from the Diocese of London, with speakers including the Bishop of Plymouth and his wife Dr Liz Grier, who is a recently ordained curate, and the Rev Dr Grace Bally-Balogun, Church Plant Enabler at The Gregory Centre for Church Multiplication

The Rev Canon Nick McKee, Director of the Church of England's Ministry Development Team, who led a short commissioning service for the participants, said: "Over 900 young people from all backgrounds and traditions have explored God's call on their lives since the MES began over a decade ago.

"The energy, boldness and humility of this group is truly inspiring and offers the Church and the communities we serve across the country, a sign of great hope for the future.

"It was a joy to be able to commission the current cohort as they dedicate a year to God."

Speaking to participants, the Rev Helen Fraser, Head of Vocations and Deputy Director of the Church of England's Ministry Development Team, said: "The Church of England has always had need of faithful, hope-filled, gospel-centred people to serve and to lead its worshipping communities.

"That need is particularly profound at the moment and I and others pray regularly for more people, from all different backgrounds, to discern a call to ministry – lay and ordained, in all kinds of communities.

"We have prayed and continue to pray for you. I believe God continues to have good plans and purposes for his church."

For more than a decade, MES has provided a broad ministry experience for young adults.

Each person's year is formed around practical experience such as chaplaincy, social justice ministry, preaching and Church News Ireland Page 19

Sunday services, digital media, pastoral visiting, event organisation, evangelism and kids and youth work.

Participants described their favourite thing about the scheme so far. Hannah from Durham highlighted "the opportunity to actually serve the Church, to join in with a little bit of preaching and also get involved in some activities with the children."

Speaking after the gathering, the Bishop of Plymouth, James Grier, said: "It was wonderful to meet so many young people who are actively exploring God's calling on their lives whilst serving local churches of all shapes and sizes.

"It is fantastic that they have this opportunity to experience ministry in the context of a wider cohort of peers whilst also receiving such great local and national input. It is a brilliant way to foster and develop vocations across the church."
