

Bushmills rector and wife train for London Landmarks Half Marathon challenge

The Rev Brian Harper, rector of Dunluce Parish, Bushmills, and his wife Heather are currently in training for the prestigious London Landmarks Half Marathon.

Wending its way along the streets of Westminster, passing many of London's iconic sights, 17,000 runners took part in last year's challenge with a similar number expected to start on April 7.

Parkrun veterans, Brian and Heather are both raising funds for charity. Brian was successful in applying for a ballot place in the run and will be running for Alzheimer's Research UK while Heather secured her place through Dementia UK and will be fundraising for the charity.

Brian moved to Dunluce last August from Magheracross Parish, Ballinamallard, where he had been rector since 2012. It was in Ballinamallard he first discovered a passion for running 10 years ago after hearing about the Enniskillen Parkrun on the radio.

"I had been doing a bit of jogging, so I did it once and realised there were people taking part who had the same level of fitness as me although others did it much faster," Brian said.

Now the 5k Parkrun is a weekly fixture and to date he has completed 238 Parkruns! Quite an achievement!

Brian and Heather also volunteer with Parkrun – marshalling, scanning barcodes, timekeeping etc. It was through volunteering that Heather also picked up the running bug.

"I started volunteering in 2015. I have arthritis, and had not been able to run, but my medication changed in 2016, and I saw all these other people out running so I did a 'Couch to 5K' training programme and completed my first Parkrun in 2016," Heather said.

The London Landmarks event will be her first half marathon. "I plan to run and walk - they call it 'Jeffing' - a lot of people do runs that way," Heather said.

The couple will start together but won't stick together along the route as Brian is not planning on 'Jeffing!' "I find walking just as exhausting as running," he commented.

This won't be Brian's first half marathon as he completed the Liverpool race in 2016 in a time of 2hrs 25 mins.

The Covid-19 pandemic interrupted their running schedule as Parkruns had to be called off, but Brian continued to pound the roads, and in fact did a 'Covid London Landmarks Half Marathon' on his own in Ballinamallard.

"It was a lot harder and also a lot slower. I had asked people to put different landmarks in their gardens, so the kids enjoyed doing that and I found a landmark on a garden on every street. I was fundraising for Prostate Cancer UK," he said.

Both are now back in training. Heather is raising funds for Dementia UK in memory of her mother Sadie Hewitt who suffered from dementia for several years before her death in 2017.

Brian said that his choice of charity was also inspired by Heather's mum. He added: "In ministry, I have encountered the impact of this condition on so many families. ARUK will be able to fund the research required to either prevent or alleviate the mental and physical distress that this dementia can cause." **Church News Ireland**

The couple are looking forward to the atmosphere in London on race day. "As far as running a half marathon can be, it's supposed to be a fun event, with music, cheer stations at the different landmarks and lots of people in fancy dress," Heather said.

The Harpers themselves with not be wearing fancy dress, but will be cheered on by family members and grandchildren who will travel to London to support them.

Old Campbellian to head Cambridge College

Congratulations to Professor Chris Young on his recent election as Master of St Edmund's College, Cambridge

His fellow Old Campbellian are well pleased - "We take immense pride in celebrating the achievements of our OCs, and Professor Young's success is a shining example of the exceptional talent within our ranks".

The very first OC to gain entry to Cambridge was George R Thompson (197). He obtained first place in a Mathematical Exhibition for Sydney Sussex College, Cambridge in 1897. He attended the college from its inception in 1894 and was

awarded a leaving scholarship by the college of £30 per year for three years (which according to google equates to just under £5,000). He went on to teach at Campbell, Harrow and was a Housemaster at Holt between 1920-36. A letter which he wrote to the then college magazine, The Touchstone, in his first year at Cambridge is held on the records of Sydney Sussex see -

Tribute to Dr David Lawrence by Bishop Michael Burrows

Bishop Michael Burrows has paid tribute to the late Dr David Lawrence who in a project spanning almost a quarter of a century from 1991 to 2017 photographed and researched some 3,000 windows throughout the Church of Ireland, and devised the Gloine database (published online at www.gloine.ie) which will stand for future generations.

Bishop Burrows writes:


'Dr David Lawrence, news of whose sudden death has brought sadness to many across the Church of Ireland, was a man of many talents. He was scholar, an aesthete, a skilled photographer who for over a quarter of a century from 1991 was a visitor literally to every Church of Ireland church on this island where stained glass was to be found. He came among us already possessed of a mine of information concerning stained glass artists and

manufacturers, along with a deep knowledge of their styles of work and iconographic aims.

David became the embodiment



of a remarkable project, perhaps unique in the world, partnered by the Heritage Council and the RCB, to photograph, assess and describe every single stained glass window in the Church of Ireland. For him it was an exacting labour of love, and its marvellous outworking in the form of gloine.ie will long remain an outstanding resource for researchers, and a lasting tribute to his tenacity and affection for his subject.

I crossed paths with David on many occasions, most notably during my years as Dean of Cork when he was working ... a major task in itself ... on the extraordinary glass of St Fin Church News Ireland Page 13

Barre's Cathedral. I will always recall the high standards he set for himself, his attention to detail, his own artist's eye. On June mornings he would rise to be in the cathedral at a very early hour, catching the rising summer sun as it bathed the glass with what he always called God's light. He taught me that the same window never looks the same on any two days of the year.

David was a true and courteous gentleman, a gracious host over a good meal in a restaurant by the Lee, a person of profound spirituality who himself always worked to advance the glory of God. He could be finicky as well as fun, indignant as well as indulgent and at times he could be as delicate as the glass he loved to study. But he opened the eyes of many to the beauty that is all around them, and shone wondrous light among some of the greatest yet least known treasures of the Church of Ireland. The muse of history will be eternally grateful to him: a myriad of friends and admirers will never behold the like of him in our midst again.'

Cathedral call

ANÚNA in St Patrick's concert at Belfast Cathedral

St Patrick's Day weekend got off to a great start with ANÚNA in concert.

They are a vocal ensemble formed in Ireland in 1987 by Irish composer Michael McGlynn. The group has recorded 18 albums and achieved a high level of international success, including a significant role in Riverdance from 1994 to 1996.

Now considered, Ireland's national choir, under the musical guidance of McGlynn, ANÚNA feature constructions of medieval song from Ireland and traditional arrangements as showcased in their most recent album Otherworld, a startlingly beautiful record that promises much for the future of the group.

It took place in the hauntingly beautiful setting of Belfast Cathedral, an experience like no other, leaving us awestruck by the sights and sounds of this incredible vocal spectacle.

Metropolitan Archbishop Joseph ecumenical canon at Christ Church, Dublin

Metropolitan Archbishop Joseph was born in Romania. He was ordained in 1994 at the monastery of the Cathedral of Alba Iulia.

He went to France in the summer of 1994 to study at the Saint–Sergius Institute of Orthodox Theology in Paris. Since arriving in France he provided the liturgical and spiritual service of the monastery of monastics Notre–Dame–de– Toute–Protection in Bussy–en–Othe, in Yonne. He was elected Archbishop in November 1997 by the Assembly of the Romanian Orthodox Archdiocese of Western and Central Europe.Speaking of his new position on the Cathedral Chapter, Metropolitan Archbishop Joseph said he

was honoured to be invited to become an Ecumenical Canon. "It is an honour to be an Ecumenical Canon in Christ Church Cathedral. I am glad to know the Anglican tradition and hope to reenforce our relationship between our two Churches.

The Orthodox community is received in Anglican churches Dublin and we hope to honour that presence and to open our tradition to Dublin," he commented adding that the Romanian Orthodox community is the largest Orthodox community in Ireland.
