Following consultation with our partners in the Anglican Diocese of Jerusalem, our fundraising efforts are focused on three areas.

First, the solar panels Dublin and Glendalough provided almost 10 years ago are now almost non-operational. We plan to repair and replace them as needed. These will enable a continuity of energy supply when there is no public electricity supply.



- Secondly, before the war the Diocese of Jerusalem was planning to expand its Cancer Centre at the hospital. The Centre, as with the majority of hospitals in Gaza, no longer functions as a result of the war. This too we urgently want to help to repair.
- Thirdly, the diocese was poised to locate an outreach operation of its rehabilitation facility, the Princess Basma Centre in the Mount of Olives, in the Al Ahli Hospital just as the war started. The sensitive treatment and rehabilitation of children, both physically and psychologically, will be essential and will require substantial investment. Funds put aside by the diocese for this purpose will now need to be enhanced by donations, given the huge increase in need expected.

Our appeal is non-political. It is based on our longstanding link with our fellow Anglicans in the Diocese of Jerusalem who run Al Ahli Hospital for all, regardless of faith, ethnicity or background. Our link began in 2014 when the dioceses raised over €120,000 to provide solar panels and on-call facilities for staff at the hospital. Through our link we also seek to create and maintain bonds of friendship and solidarity between the people and clergy of both dioceses.

US Catholic leaders urge Biden to act for peace and justice in Holy Land

Cardinal Robert McElroy, Archbishop of San Diego, and Archbishop John Wester of Santa Fe, New Mexico, have joined more than 200 Catholic leaders in a letter to President Biden expressing their "grief and dismay over the horrors that have occurred in Israel/Palestine", calling for a ceasefire in Gaza, the release of hostages and an end to the shipment of weapons to Israel.

They also appeal for an end to the illegal settlements and attacks on Palestinians in the West Bank.

The letter states:

We, Catholics in the United States, express our grief and dismay over the horrors that have occurred in Israel/ Palestine over the last six months. We also bear witness to and speak out against the decades of injustice that have plagued the Holy Land.

As Pope Francis has said, "without justice, there is no peace." The inherent dignity of all persons and their right to life is the basis of our concern for all Palestinian and Israeli lives and our hope for a solution in which systemic injustices are addressed and the rights of both peoples granted and upheld.

In May 2024, when this letter is being released, we continue to plead for an immediate and permanent ceasefire in Gaza and adherence to international law by all parties. 71% of US Catholics support a Gaza ceasefire, echoing the position of Pope Francis, the US Conference of Catholic Bishops, the Society of Jesus, and other US Catholic organizations and leaders.

As of this letter's publication, over 34,000 Palestinians in Gaza-- the majority civilians--have been killed by Israel's military assault marked by indiscriminate bombing. We mourn each life lost. Tens of thousands more are severely injured without access to adequate medical care; half of Gazans are facing famine; and most have been displaced from their homes, 70% of which have been destroyed.

We are also deeply concerned about the recent spike in attacks and killings of Palestinians in the West Bank by Israeli soldiers and settlers.

Key decisions by United Methodist Church General Conference

Delegates to The United Methodist Church approved four changes to church law that together both end remaining bans related to LGBTQ ministry and protect the rights of pastors to choose which weddings to perform or not to perform.

General Conference has issued a heartfelt apology to all who experienced sexual misconduct in The United Methodist Church. Part of a resolution passed in the last hour of the legislative assembly, the apology is to be offered in the spirit of offering healing for all affected.

The majority of legislation supported by climate justice activists within The United Methodist Church was passed by General Conference on the consent calendar in the early part of its second week. But they were unable to get the body to require that United Methodist institutions, including Wespath — the denomination's pension and benefits agency — divest from fossil fuel company stocks.

Church in Wales lays flowers to commemorate LGBT people harmed by Christians

The Church in Wales is allegedly moving towards enabling same-sex marriages within its churches.

Since 2021, gay couples have had the opportunity for their unions to be blessed in the church following civil ceremonies, yet formal approval for church weddings has not been secured due to constitutional rules that require a two-thirds majority from clergy, bishops, and lay members.

Approval from lay members remains uncertain due to some holding traditional views on marriage.

To foster 'inclusivity and reconciliation', a significant service at Llandaff Cathedral is being organised by OneBodyOneFaith in collaboration with The Gathering. This event aims to commemorate individuals who have felt excluded or harmed by Christian communities due to their sexuality or gender identity.

Participants will engage in acts of remembrance and hope, including laying white flowers for those lost to suicide and purple flowers to symbolise hope for the future, as well as writing in a memory book for loved ones.

Bishop Mary Stallard shared her enthusiasm for the service with Nation Cymru: "I am delighted that this service is happening in Llandaff Cathedral. We value our calling to be an inclusive church, and this work underlines this. It is my firm hope that this service will offer a way-marker on an important journey of healing and transformation, both for those who take part and for our wider church and faith communities."

Bishop Gregory Cameron spoke on the importance of acknowledging harm. He told the Welsh news outlet: "As the

Church reassesses its attitude towards LGBT+ persons, we have to recognise not only discrimination but also real harm caused to individuals. This service is intended to contribute something towards acknowledgment of that harm, and to take a step in the direction of healing."

Luke Dowding, CEO of OneBodyOneFaith, highlighted the significance of this memorial service: "This memorial service is a bold opportunity to speak truthfully about the harm LGBT+ people continue to experience but also of a future where the Christian church is no longer complicit in this. We are grateful for traditions like the Church in Wales who demonstrate clear leadership on this."


The service welcomes everyone and is scheduled for Sunday 26 May at 5.30 pm at Llandaff Cathedral.
