

Pastoral pints and prayers reach out at the pub

It's not like your average service or prayer meeting this iconic Cork church is inviting parishioners to explore their faith over pints in a city pub.

Hosted by the team at Shandon's historic St. Anne's church, these meetups give locals a chance to learn about Christianity in a relaxed, informal setting. The 'Pastoral Pints' gatherings take place on the fourth Monday of every month, organised by parish priest Reverend Meghan Farr.

She held her first event on Leeside a little over a year ago. It was inspired by the culture of 'Pub Theology' in the US, which is where communities gather to discuss philosophy and religion in bars.

Rev. Farr was born in Florida and studied for the priesthood abroad before moving to Ireland almost two years ago. She attends every meeting with her husband and is inviting everyone - no matter their background - to come along for a chat.

The Pastoral Pints events are very relaxed. There's no strict agenda or mandatory bible readings - people can ask anything faith-related, especially things they might be too afraid to say in church.

Rev. Farr said: "It has a lot of different names in the US, but pub theology is very popular in churches across the country over there. I decided for the beginning to keep it very relaxed and informal. If someone's unsure about their own faith or burned out from going to church, this can be a nice option. If you don't want to talk about Jesus at church, then we'll do it in the pub!

Church in Wales told of priest's abuse 17 years before reporting to police

The former Bishop of Swansea and Brecon has admitted to five counts of indecent assault on a boy under 16, decades after the abuse took place.

However, it has emerged that senior figures in the Church in Wales were aware of allegations against him as early as 1993, 17 years before they were reported to the police.

By the time South Wales Police were informed in 2010, the victim had already passed away, preventing further investigation.

Anthony Pierce, now 84, served as Bishop from 1999 to 2008 and previously worked as a parish priest in the West Cross area, where the offences occurred in the 1980s.

He pleaded guilty at Swansea Crown Court and is set to be sentenced on 7th March, according to Wales Online. He has been released on bail in the meantime.

The Church in Wales has admitted that an internal review uncovered evidence that a small number of its members knew about a separate allegation against Pierce in 1993, but failed to pass it on to the police until nearly two decades later.

An independent inquiry has since been launched to examine how allegations were handled and whether procedural changes are needed.

Despite the allegations, Pierce was appointed Bishop in 1999 and served for nine years.

In 2002, he was made a Commander of the Order of St John for his charity work.

In 2011, Swansea University awarded him an honorary fellowship, which is now under review in light of his conviction.

South Wales Police confirmed that, due to the victim's death in 2010, they were unable to pursue the case when allegations were finally reported.

The Church's independent review will assess past safeguarding failures and review decisions regarding Pierce's permission to officiate between 2011 and 2016.

Shared Education Programme in Ballymoney



Joe Johnston, Comber parish

Today I went to a Memorial Service in St Mary's Comber for Joe Johnston, a very loyal parishioner of mine in

Comber for 32 years from January 1986. He was a very kind and good friend, Canon Johnathan Barry writes.

I am retired now just over 6 years, so that means I have known him for almost 40 years. My father first met him walking on Rosapenna beach in Co Donegal in the late 1970s, early 80s.

They had much of importance in common, a love of the Church, enquiring minds, an ability to discern matters of truth, and to express their views with conviction and clarity.

Joe Johnston was an exceptional man, faithful and true. He and my father had many conversations.

On Sunday morning last I was in Carrigart Church, where Joe was well known to the congregation, where he often worshipped on holiday. I told them of Joe's death, and started to remind them he had inspired them to restore the old clock in the church tower and the striking mechanism many years ago. As I spoke the clock began to strike the hour. A significant coincidence?

When Joe was on holiday in the Rosapenna Hotel, he and my father would meet each morning on the beach and go for a lengthy walk together. Joe had his stick, and my father had his dog.

As they met they always greeted each other in the same way.

"Ah, the man with the stick!"

"And the man with the dog!"

Some years later the dog died. My father wrote about it, reminding his readers of the intensely bright light you can get in that place on a summer's morning, when the sunlight is so strong it dazzles. Strand and sea merge as one, and you cannot see through it.

Sometimes the dog would run until he was out of sight. Joe and my father would then have to wait until the dog returned to them from the light.

When writing about it after the dog had died, my father said his beloved dog had now gone into the light, but this time was not coming back. So he would just have to wait for my father to catch up with him.

My father died many years ago. He went from my sight. And now Joe has gone too.

But I can "see" them still.

The man with the stick has set off down the strand. At the edge of the light, far in front of him, a figure has appeared. Beside him is a dog. They wait.


May Joe rest in Peace and rise in Glory.

Four Archbishops called to Vatican: More Irish dioceses set to amalgamate - Irish Catholic

More Irish dioceses set to amalgamate writes Garry O'Sullivan February 27, 2025

Ireland's four archbishops are scheduled to fly to Rome this week for meetings with the Dicastery for Bishops to discuss Vatican plans to amalgamate more Irish dioceses.

Bishops have come under increased pressure from the papal nuncio Archbishop Luis Mariano Montemayor to move faster on diocesan mergers. Last year the Bishop of Elphin was appointed Apostolic Administrator of Achonry with a view to an eventual merging of both dioceses and this month was appointed Bishop of Achonry as well as continuing as Bishop of Elphin.

However plans by the Nuncio to amalgamate the dioceses of Raphoe and Derry came unstuck recently when the bishop of Derry Donal McKeown flew to Rome to tell the Dicastery for Bishops that the time wasn't right for such a merger.

This reflects an unease among some of the Irish bishops at the pace of change being sought by the Vatican, with some complaining that more consultation is needed.

The dioceses likely to be discussed in Rome for possible amalgamation are Kilmore (Bishop Martin Hayes was appointed in June 2020) and Clogher (Bishop Larry Duffy was appointed in December 2018).

Other diocesan mergers on the table appear to be that of Ferns with Ossory. Ossory could also amalgamate with the Archdiocese of Cashel and Emly which would raise the question of provincial boundaries being discussed but this scenario is less likely as the nuncio is believed to want to keep the provincial boundaries.

Another likely amalgamation is the formal amalgamation of Armagh and Dromore -the Archbishop of Armagh is already the Apostolic Administrator for Dromore.

Earlier this month the Irish bishops discussed changes to diocesan boundaries when they were in Knock. Archbishop Emeritus Terrence Prendergast of Ottawa addressed the Bishops Conference with a talk on 'Biblical Perspectives on change'. While these changes aren't of biblical proportions, they are part of a restructuring that marks one of the most significant changes in Irish Church governance in over nine centuries, leading to a more consolidated leadership.
