Princess Anne is a longtime rugby fan and has been a patron of the Scottish Rugby Union since 1986!





Charles Wills will continue to work on distribution at the Northern end of the diocese.



Derry & Raphoe Confirmation Day in Stranorlar

There was a surprise in store for teenagers attending the Diocese's second Confirmation Day in Stranorlar Parish Hall. Bishop Andrew Forster – who'll be confirming them later this year – arrived to speak to them about the big day and to share memories of his own confirmation, which took place in 1981.

Twenty-seven confirmands from parishes in the Raphoe Diocese were put through their spiritual paces by our

Diocesan Youth Officer, Claire Hinchliff, assisted by Rev Canon Mervyn Peoples, Rev Susan Elliott and leaders from the parishes whose young people were taking part.

Our Diocesan Confirmation Days are relaxed events, combining religious teaching with games and activities. The programme include quizzes – designed to gently test the young people's knowledge of Scripture – and games to encourage fellowship among them. Claire proved her aim was true as she threw chocolate bars to those who answered questions correctly. The young people also enjoyed lunch together in the hall.

Monsignor Raymond Murray

Monsignor Raymond Murray has been remembered as a 'tireless and courageous advocate for justice' at his funeral service in Armagh.

Mgr Murray, who was 86, died peacefully at Collegelands Nursing Home, Moy, on February 25, Mark Robinson reports in the Irish News.

Tributes in the wake of his death described him as a 'giant' of human rights due to his more than five decades of campaigning on abuses by the state, collusion and injustice during the Troubles.

These included his advocacy work on behalf of the so-called Hooded Men detainees, his exposing of conditions endured by female republican prisoners in Armagh jail and raising suspicions of a shoot-to-kill policy by the British army. He would go on to co-found the Relatives for Justice group in 1991, which continues to support the bereaved and injured of the Troubles.

Mourners gathered for Requiem Mass at St Patrick's Cathedral in Armagh on Friday afternoon, during which he was remembered as a "tireless and courageous advocate for justice".

Amongst those in attendance were priests from the Archdiocese of Armagh, the Diocese of Down and Connor and Church of Ireland minister Rev Kenny Hall, who worked in Cookstown at the same time as Mgr Murray when he was a parish priest.



Canon Eugene Sweeney delivered the homily at the service and described Mgr Murray as "a man full of feeling and humanity; faith and gratitude".

"Ray Murray, as we known, certainly spoke up with great courage; documenting everything, raising consciousness, being a shepherd to those in need and, of course, being misunderstood and pilloried in the process, as a prophet must always suffer," he said.

"Condemning violence wherever it came from and driven by a strong sense of truth, justice and fair play, Ray would hammer away on his trusty Olivetti typewriter into the early hours.

"With Monsignor Denis Faul, he authored several documents and papers, highlighting serious human rights, violations and malpractice.

"He was to the fore in exposing injustice, whether for the Hooded Men, the Birmingham Six, Guildford Four or the Maguire family.

"Ray Murray lived the simple principle, with great vigour and effect, that there can be no peace without justice."

His contributions to human rights on the international stage were remembered, including presentations at the United Nations, as well as his academic work, love of languages, history and the arts.

"Above all, Raymond Murray was a pastor. He truly had the smell of the sheep about him and felt very much at home with people."

Requiem Mass was followed by a burial in St Patrick's Cemetery.

Sinn Fein MLA hits out in row over gay rights in church jobs: 'So gays need not apply?' - Sunday Life

An MLA challenged Christian Institute leaders as they urged the Assembly to ensure new laws include the right of churches to remove gay people from church positions, Noel McAdam reports.

The Christian Institute told an Assembly Committee that people who do not follow the teaching of a Church should be stood down.

Sam Webster, solicitor advocate for the organisation, told the Executive committee which is examining a single equality bill for Northern Ireland: "It is about conduct consistent with the doctrinal teaching of a Church."

But Sinn Fein's Caral Ni Chuilin interjected: "Gays don't apply' is basically what you are saying."

As Mr Webster went on: "It is about...", Ms Ni Chuilin, a deputy Speaker in the Assembly, repeated: "Gays not applying."

Mr Webster replied: "No, it is not. It is about conduct consistent with the doctrinal teaching of a Church.

"Churches have the liberty under existing law across the United Kingdom to ensure that those who hold particular positions in the Church abide by the teaching of the Church. That is all we are talking about here.

"If there were to be an issue whereby a particular employee was not abiding by the church's teaching in that area, those protections for the church would give it the right to remove someone."

Another MLA, however, backed the Christian Institute representatives at the meeting of the committee which monitors the Executive Office.

TUV MLA Timothy Gastonsaid: "I would be strong on the point that faith-based organisations that, day by day, use the Bible as their navigation tool should have the protections in place to say to somebody, whether an employee or a volunteer, who was not living that way, 'You know what? You're not in keeping with the organisation,' and bringing that to an end.

"That is an important freedom that needs to remain."

Showy self-denial can't completely eclipse the true spirit of Lent - Daily Telegraph

The year rushes on apace: spring is officially here – the turn of the season acknowledged by Radio 4's Today programme, which has been punctuating its grim

chronicle of global turbulence with listeners' nature notes, Jane Shilling writes in the Daily Telegraph

Today is Shrove Tuesday, a festival marked across the country by pancake races. In the City of London the inter-Livery pancake race around Guildhall Yard is a reliably extravagant spectacle, while a Parliamentary pancake race has been an annual event in Victoria Tower Gardens.

The comparatively decorous pursuit of running about while flipping a roundel of batter in a frying pan might lack the gaudy theatricality of, say, the Venice carnival. But as an occasion it feels like a build-up without a conclusion. The Venice carnival is unmistakably the unruly preamble to something. But what does Pancake Day herald?

Visit any supermarket and you'd think that Shrove Tuesday was the opening event in a month-long blowout of chocolate eggs and rabbits.

"Easter" might get a fleeting mention in the chocolate branding (though you may recall the hoo-ha some years ago when the National Trust dispensed with the term when promoting its "Great British Egg Hunt"). But you'd have to look hard to find mention of Lent – that 40-day period of abstinence between the Shrove Tuesday pancakes and hot cross buns.

Search for what the Church of England suggests by way of Lenten spiritual practice, and you will learn that this year's theme is Living Hope. You can download the resources of Wild Bright Hope, the "Big Church Read" for 2025, and sign up for daily emails. This Friday the Archbishop of York, Church News Ireland Page 25

Stephen Cottrell, embarks on "The Lord's Prayer Tour" – a missionary tour of the C of E's Northern Province with teaching, storytelling and "church planting inspired by the Northern saints". Meanwhile Radio 4 will broadcast its annual series of Lent talks, this year marking the 1,700th anniversary of the Nicene Creed.

But the theme of abstinence as a spiritual practice is harder to find. The most striking instance currently appears as a storyline in that everyday story of country folk, The Archers, where Linda Snell, the scourge of the cricket club, is insisting on participating in the Ramadan fast of her temporary house guests, the village GP Azra Malik and her teenaged children Zainab and Khalil. So far, the only Lenten reference I've heard (in, admittedly, quite erratic listening) is the pancake-eating contest at the flood-devastated tearoom. Perhaps Alan the vicar will redress the balance come Ash Wednesday.

If the "sweet abstinence" mentioned by George Herbert in his poem, Lent, seems to feature less prominently in the official Church of England guidance on Lenten practice, it is hard to avoid in the secular realm, where giving stuff up has become an unmistakable marker of a highly evolved sensibility. Already this year we have had Dry January and Veganuary – those self-denying correctives to festive feasting. Then there's the viral "no-spend" challenge, in which people replace their old money-frittering habits with more frugal alternatives.

In the States, The Washington Post reports that an organisation called the People's Union USA has begun a social media campaign urging consumers to flex their Church News Ireland Page 26

economic power via a rolling programme of boycotts of large corporations, including Amazon, Walmart and Nestlé. But Americus Reed, a marketing professor at the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School, notes that it is "difficult to parse which online campaigns simply amount to virtue signalling – or 'moral peacocking'."

It was a point trenchantly made in 2009 by the late Pope Benedict XVI, who wrote: "In our own day, fasting seems to have lost something of its spiritual meaning, and has taken on, in a culture characterised by the search for material wellbeing, a therapeutic value for the care of one's body."

Evidently if it is narcissistic or performative, the point of selfdenial is lost. Yet behind the showiness and silliness – the "moral peacocking" – of some of the fashionable exercises in self-denial, there might still lurk a confused but genuine quest for guidance towards a moral compass and a sense of the numinous.
