Capella Caeciliani to sing St Patrick's Day Mass in Paris

London: Third anniversary of war on Ukraine marked with prayers and rally

A moving Interfaith Prayer Service for Peace in Ukraine took place at the Ukrainian Catholic Cathedral in London, to commemorate the third anniversary of Russia's brutal invasion of Ukraine.

The cathedral was decked out in sunflowers - Ukraine's national flower. Many members of the congregation wore sunflower badges, while some were draped in the yellow and blue flag.

The packed service began with a procession of workers and volunteers from the Ukrainian Welcome Centre who lit three remembrance candles in front of the altar, while the cathedral choir sang the hymn Under Your Grace. Among the congregation was Shadow Foreign Secretary, Dame Priti Patel, Migration and Citizenship minister Seema Malhotra and the Mayor of Westminster Cllr Robert Rigby.

After the St Mary's Ukrainian school choir sang the hymn 'Peace is What We Want' Fr Taras Mykhalchuk, pastor of Saints Peter and Paul's Garrison Church in Lviv, in western



Ukraine, gave a powerful testimony of his experiences in an area ravaged by the war. He said that since 2015, his church often conducts funerals, marriage ceremonies and baptisms of Ukrainian military personnel all in one morning. Fr Mykhalchuk thanked the British public for their support, adding: "We really feel your friendly shoulder."

The Vivo Quartet and String Trio Modus gave a beautiful performance of Sontse Nyzeko (The Sun is Setting). Church News Ireland

Faith leaders: the Anglican Bishop of London Dame Sarah Mullally, Sr Masorti Rabbi Wittenberg, Greek Orthdox Archbishop Loullias, Coptic Archbishop Angaelos and Catholic Bishop Jim Curry then offered prayers for peace.

The Ukrainian ambassador to the UK, General Valerii Zaluzhnyi gave a short speech saying: "For three years, our people have been fighting for not just our land, but for our freedom and justice... He said Ukraine was "deeply grateful" to the UK, adding, "Your support gives us strength and hope."

The service ended with choirs leading singing of the spiritual anthem of Ukraine and God Save The King.

Scottish Episcopal Church hosts welcome day for new clergy, leaders, diocesan staff

Newcomers to the Scottish Episcopal Church and members of staff from the General Synod Office got together this month at Provincial Welcome Day in Edinburgh, to learn more about the church and how it operates, and to make useful contacts with others.

Each year, invitations are extended to the newly ordained; those newly authorized as lay readers, clergy or lay readers who have come to the province from outside Scotland; and new members of staff at diocesan offices. Among them this year was the Rev. Nicholas Bundock, the new bishop-elect in the Diocese of Glasgow & Galloway.

This year's attendees were welcomed by the new secretary general, Dee Bird, who was also enjoying her first experience of Welcome Day.

After opening worship led by the Rev. Elizabeth Thomson, the gathering heard an overview of the history of the Scottish Episcopal Church, and its place in contemporary Scottish society, from Primus Mark Strange. The morning session also included sessions on provincial governance and the General Synod Office, the Scottish Episcopal Institute, the church's Net Zero strategy, and safeguarding.

In the afternoon, Bishop Ian Paton guided the group through the history and development of Scottish Episcopal Church liturgies, then Claire Benton Evans, the provincial youth coordinator, gave a presentation on youth work, reminding everyone that young people are not the church of tomorrow but the church of today.

A networking opportunity then took place, to get to know others in similar positions in the church or to talk with GSO staff and establish provincial links, before the Rev. Anna-Claar Thomasson-Rosingh of the Scottish Episcopal Institute brought the day to an end with closing worship.

Ukrainian church in Oklahoma says Trump has 'teamed up with Putin'

A Ukrainian American church has said it is "infuriated" that US President Donald Trump seems to have "teamed up with Putin", after a disastrous Oval Office

meeting between Presidents Trump and Zelensky last Friday.

Pastor Raphael Moore told Koco 5 News that he watched the press conference with a feeling of despair.

"I was so angry I had steam coming out of my ears," he said.

The meeting between the two leaders – along with Vice President JD Vance and Secretary of State Marco Rubio – went rapidly downhill, as the Vice President accused Zelensky of not being grateful for US military funding.

The US President appeared irritated several times and repeatedly talked over his Ukrainian counterpart.

Brian Glenn, White House correspondent for the right-wing leaning outlet Real America's Voice, asked Zelenksy why he did not wear a suit, to which JD could be seen chuckling. The Ukrainian President has said before that his clothing – reminiscent of a military uniform – is to symbolise the fighting gear worn by those on his country's frontlines.

"I will wear a costume when this war is finished," the Ukrainian leader responded. "Maybe something like yours. Maybe something better. Maybe something cheaper."

Whilst some have criticised the Ukrainian leader's choice of words, others have pointed out that he was speaking in his third language. The Ukrainian word for suit is "kostium" - pronounced "costume".

Pastor Moore said he believed the President and Vice President had "tag teamed" Zelensky, setting him up for an awkward encounter.

"He has teamed up, as it were, with Putin," Pastor Moore added. "I would like to see him back in Ukraine. I would like to see him team up with the good guys."

EU Catholic bishops call for European unity and solidarity with Ukraine

In the context of increasing complexity and geopolitical uncertainty surrounding peace in Ukraine, the Presidency of the Commission of the Bishops' Conferences of the European Union (COMECE) issued a statement on Tuesday, 4 March 2025, expressing strong support for Ukraine. COMECE: "Ukraine's struggle for peace will also be decisive for the fate of Europe and the world".

The statement emphasises that "Ukraine's struggle for peace and the defence of its territorial integrity is not only a fight for its own future. Its outcome will also be decisive for the fate of the entire European continent and of a free and democratic world."

In a geopolitical landscape that the EU bishops describe as "complex" and marked by "the unpredictability of actions taken by some members of the international community", the Presidency of COMECE calls on the European Union and its Member States to remain united in their commitment to supporting Ukraine and its people.

"Russia's invasion of Ukraine is a blatant violation of international law. The use of force to alter national borders and the atrocious acts committed against the civilian population are not only unjustifiable but demand a consequent pursuit of justice and accountability," the statement reads.

The EU bishops affirm that a comprehensive, just, and lasting peace in Ukraine can only be achieved through negotiations, which should be backed by strong transatlantic and global solidarity and must involve Ukraine. "In order to be sustainable and just - state the EU bishops - a future peace accord must fully respect international law and be underpinned by effective security guarantees to prevent the conflict from re-erupting."

COMECE urges the international community to "continue to assist Ukraine in the reconstruction of the destroyed infrastructure" and specifies that Russia "must adequately participate in this effort." The Presidency of COMECE emphasises that Ukraine is the victim in this war and Russia the aggressor, stressing that any attempts to distort the reality of this aggression must be firmly rejected.

Regarding Ukraine's request to join the European Union and the internal reforms undertaken to achieve this goal, the EU bishops call on the EU "to advance with the enlargement process in a timely and fair manner alongside other candidate countries."

The statement concludes by expressing hope that the European Union "will remain faithful to its vocation to be a promise of peace and an anchor of stability to its **Church News Ireland**

neighbourhood and to the world", particularly at a time when the contours of a new global security architecture are being redrawn.

The declaration follows the recent interview with HE Mgr Mariano Crociata, released last week to mark the third anniversary of Russia's invasion of Ukraine. In the interview, the President of COMECE not only underscored the need for a just and lasting peace in Ukraine but also warned against "a disgraceful spectacle" that falsely portrays the victim as the aggressor.

Mr Young played a significant role in the School's history, and many will remember his approachable nature, readiness to listen and advise, and steadfast support. He is a great loss to the school community; whose heartfelt and deepest sympathies are extended to Mr Young's family.

He was a committed member of the Church of Ireland and shared his service and talents with parish, diocese, the General Synod and boards who appreciated his insights and the manner of his communication. This was recognised when he was appointed a Lay Canon of Armagh Cathedral.
