Lunchtime concert for Westport church damaged in storm

A lunchtime recital will be hosted by St Mary's Church in Westport on Sunday next, March 2nd, on behalf of Holy Trinity C of I church in the town, which is currently closed due to damage sustained in Storm Éowyn on January 24th.



Holy Trinity Church is one of Westport's most historic buildings.

The recital, commencing at 1.30pm, will be given by the Dublin City Choral Union and there is no admission charge. A retiring collection, however, will be taken towards Holy Trinity Parish funds.

The Dublin City Choral Union is a mixed-voice choir founded in 2018. Its wide-ranging repertoire ranges from sacred motets to gospel and beyond. The artistic director is Duncan Brickenden who trained at the Conservatory of Music, (TUD), the Royal Academy of Music, London and Central St Martin's, also in London.

The choir will be accompanied on the day by the highly accomplished organist John Dexter who now resides in Mayo.

Invite to 'decisive' local Spring Gatherings to engage further with Irish Synod

According to the General Secretary for the Synodal Pathway of the Catholic Church in Ireland, Ms Julieann Moran (pictured next page), "The Synod on Synodality represents a historic and Spirit-led moment for the Church – one that calls each of us to deeper communion, participation, and mission.

"With the publication of the Final Document in October 2024, Pope Francis has offered not just reflections but a roadmap for renewal that will shape the life of the Church for years to come. This is not a theoretical exercise – it is an active and ongoing process that will bring real changes to how the Church listens, discerns, and walks together."

Ms Moran continued, "In Ireland, we are not only witnesses to this transformation. We are called to be active participants in it. The urgency of this moment cannot be overstated. The synodal way is now an essential part of how the Church listens, discerns, and moves forward with the collective wisdom of all the baptised together – clergy, laity, and religious. Implementing the insights and

recommendations of the Final Document is not an optional exercise but a vital responsibility for us all.

" I encourage everyone to engage with the Final Document, to integrate its principles into our ministries and work, and to foster a culture where synodality is lived out daily. We need to take seriously this invitation of the Holy Spirit and contribute to a Church that is more inclusive, responsive, and mission-focused.

"As the Synodal Pathway of the Catholic Church in Ireland continues, we are now at a crucial stage of this journey. In recent weeks, the National Synodal Team met with members of Diocesan Synodal Teams and members of movements, associations and other ecclesial groups, in order to provide resources for proposed Spring Gatherings at local level.



"These Spring Gatherings will provide an opportunity for deep discernment, using the Conversation in the Spirit methodology, as we revisit the themes that emerged from the earlier stages of the Universal Synod in Ireland and discern priorities for mission, for action. These gatherings are not just another meeting or consultation asking for opinions or repeating the same question(s), rather these will mark a decisive moment in shaping how the Church in Ireland responds to the call of the Holy Spirit.

"The outcomes of these gatherings will directly influence a planned national gathering (called a pre-synodal assembly) to take place in October, where key priorities will be

presented and will guide future decisions. The Holy Spirit is calling us to walk together in new ways, and now is the time to respond with faith and courage, trusting that through our shared discernment, the Church in Ireland will be renewed for the generations to come."

Ms Moran concluded, "I encourage parishes, groups, and individuals to engage wholeheartedly in this process by getting in touch with their diocesan office to find out where a gathering is being held in their local area."

'Symbol of the antichrist': Trump slammed for bizarre Al Gaza video

A video posted by President Donald Trump to his Truth Social platform shows him shirtless and sipping drinks with Israeli president Benjamin Netanyahu, in a reimagined Gaza.

Its soundtrack sings: "Donald's coming to set you free, bringing the light for all to see, no more tunnels, no more fear: Trump Gaza's finally here.

"Trump Gaza's shining bright, golden future, a brand new life.

"Feast and dance the deal is done, Trump Gaza number one."



The video features bearded belly dancers partying on a beach, and an image of Trump hugging a scantily clad belly dancer in a night club.

Elon Musk – who has been tasked with cutting government spending – features several times, throwing dollar bills in the air and eating hummus on the beach.

Golden effigies of Trump feature repeatedly; a large Trump statue looms over a hotel strip, whilst miniature 'Trump Gaza' golden souvenirs line the AI-generated gift shop shelves.

It is unclear whether the video was made by a White House team member - but it has been pinned to the top of the president's account as a 'Pinned Truth'. Church News Ireland Page 10 Trump supporters on Truth Social have responded with bemusement and concern.

"I don't think that's funny or cool. Sorry. Am I missing something??? I hope it's a joke a bad joke.." wrote one user.

Another said: "I hate this. I love our president, but this is horrible," said another.

Some picked up on the symbols in the video as references to Biblical imagery, with one user saying: "Mr President while I appreciate what you do, is not about you. To God be the glory and the honor, for without Him, you couldn't have accomplished anything. The statue is a symbol of the antichrist, please humble yourself to God. Jesus is king and only Him."

"You're doing great Mr President. But don't let it get to your head. God put you in that position for His Glory, not yours," said another.

Mum of drugs victim hopes play will 'make NI pupils think'

The mother of a County Armagh teenager, who died after taking drugs given to her on her first night at university, is hoping a play touring schools will make other young people think about what they would do in a similar situation, BBC News reports.



Sandra Larmour's 18-year-old daughter Jeni (above) died after taking Ketamine hours after arriving at Newcastle University in October 2020.

The play - I Love You Mum - I Promise I Won't Die - is based on the true story of 16-year-old London boy Daniel Spargo-Mabbs who died after taking ecstasy on a night out 11 years ago.

Sandra, who has been campaigning for more drugs education in schools, worked hard to bring the production to Northern Ireland.

Young people at Jeni's old school - The Royal School Armagh - saw it on Tuesday.

Martina McAfee, one of the actors in the production, says the fact that it is a "verbatim play" meant it was "not an easy performance to do".



A verbatim play is based on the actual words of real people.

Martina believes that because the script is based on "true words" from 16-year-old Daniel Spargo-Mabbs' family and friends means it "sticks in the students' heads" after they leave the school.

Outline of course

The Bereavement Journey is a special opportunity for learning about the process of grief, and through this working together over seven weeks to develop ways of coping as well as collective support.

The programme is for everyone who has been bereaved in any way and at any time. Featuring weekly meetings, each lasting two hours, the delivery of the programme involves several facilitators (depending on the number of participants) providing a series of videos on a range of topics - attachment, separation and loss; the pain and responses of grief; anger and guilt; coping with others reactions; delayed and suppressed grief; adjusting to change; moving forward healthily.

Each week there are two videos, followed by group discussion, during which participants are invited to contribute, however nobody should feel pressured into speaking at any time. To encourage participation from people who have experienced differing forms of loss, as well as people from throughout the community, the faith element of the programme is retained until the final week, during which participation is optional. Experience has however informed us that the majority of participants undertake all seven weeks.

The programme has run for three consecutive years in St Mark's Armagh, each very positively evaluated, and we would value the opportunity to support a spread in the delivery of this programme throughout the diocese. Funds raised during Lent will go towards running school gardens, growing food to feed children during the school day. Training in growing and protecting crops, equipment and seedlings are all part of what will be provided through the generosity of young people within the Church of Ireland.

Many of us choose to give up something for Lent – be it sweets, fizzy drinks or crisps and snacks. The money we save, donated through Bishops' Appeal to the schools in South Sudan, will enable children in South Sudan to be fed day after day, week after week and month after month. Long after Lent ends the legacy will live on through the impact of our prayers and through our giving.

It costs a little over £8,000 per year (€10,000) to set up and maintain a school garden in a group of schools, feeding up to 3,500 children for a year at a cost of less than €3 per child or £2.50. That's not per child per day, but per year! This is a project where a small amount of money can make a big difference – and where our prayers for safety, welfare and the protection and presence of our loving God can and will transform lives.

Heritage

John Steinbeck

John Steinbeck, the renowned writer with Ulster-Scots heritage who won the Nobel Prize for Literature, was born in California on this day in 1902.

Steinbeck's maternal grandfather, Samuel Hamilton, was from the Ballykelly area of Londonderry. At age seventeen he travelled to the United States, where a year later he married Elizabeth Fagen, born in the US but whose family also hailed from Ulster.

John Steinbeck was a prolific writer, authoring 33 books during his lifetime, including 16 novels. Many of these novels have become classics of English and American literature, such as Of Mice and Men, The Grapes of Wrath, and East of Eden.

Though Steinbeck was only two when his grandfather died, he had a life-long fascination with the man and his Ulster roots. In August 1952, Steinbeck visited Scotland and

Northern Ireland with his wife Elaine, stopping off at what he regarded as his ancestral homeland.

Steinbeck recalled driving through Ballykelly "without knowing it was there", but at Limavady the locals turned him back. He recalled: "I guess I had thought of Ballykelly as a town; it isn't - it's what they call in Texas 'a wide place in the road." However he described Ballykelly as "the seat of my culture and the origin of my being and the soil of my background".

His popular novel Of Mice and Men takes its name from Robert Burns' famous poem To A Mouse, from the line that states "The best laid schemes o' Mice an' Men Gang aft agley".
