

Don't cut aid budget for budget for Ukraine defence Presbyterian Church in Ireland

Presbyterian Church in Ireland urges Keir Starmer not to cut £6 billion from UK's overseas aid budget for Ukraine defence, Philip Bradfield reports in the News Letter

The Presbyterian Church in Ireland (PCI) has called on the UK government not to slash £6bn from its overseas aid budget to beef up defence spending in light of the war in Ukraine.

The church called on Prime Minister Keir Starmer to reconsider his decision after the Government's

announcement that it will cut around £6bn from its aid budget by 2027, in light of global developments and threats.

Following a meeting of PCI's Council for Global Mission Global Development Committee, convener Rev Richard Kerr said that the cuts will affect those least able to absorb them.

"The value and support that the UK's overseas aid brings, and the difference that it makes to the daily lives of millions of people across the world, is undeniable," he said.

Man awarded 115k pounds in damages following clerical sex abuse

A man is set to receive £115,000 in damages after claiming to have suffered sexual abuse at the hands of a priest in the high school he attended in Newry, Co. Down during the 1980s.

His legal costs were also awarded as part of a settlement, the Irish Post reports.

The man's case, which was heard before the High Court in Belfast, alleges an attack from the late Father Malachy Finegan, who was headmaster at St. Colman's College in Newry at the time when the incident is meant to have taken place.

Fr. Finegan passed away over twenty years ago in 2002, and despite a number of allegations having come to light, the cleric was never prosecuted or questioned by police during his lifetime.

Though no admission of liability was made by the defence, this case marks the latest in a series of settlements regarding the alleged abuse perpetrated by Finegan during his time as teacher and headmaster at the Newry school.

The priest has also been accused separately of abusing young boys at his local parish of Clonduff in Hilltown, Co. Down, close to the school where he taught.

The first such settlement was reached in 2018, during which time the board of governors at St. Colman's College condemned the alleged abuse perpetrated by Finegan during his tenure there.

In this latest case, the plaintiff's legal team claimed that the priest groomed the man as a young boy by conducting a subtle campaign of isolating him from other children at the school. This, they allege, ultimately culminated in a series of severe sexual assaults.

Owen Winters of KRW Law, told the BBC that the man can now begin the 'healing process'.

He said: "Sadly for many victims and survivors of historical sexual abuse generally, closure remains as elusive as ever. The memories of abuse perpetrated upon them never ever fade away.

"More specifically for many, the horrendous legacy left by Finegan looms as large as it did all those years ago when he was abusing children on a weekly basis. A damages cheque, welcome as it is, will never erase that legacy."

St. George's College, Jerusalem launches 'Let Light Shine Out of Darkness' campaign

St. George's College, Jerusalem has endured through times of relative stability and political crisis since its founding in 1920 as a theological college for Palestinian seminarians through its redevelopment in the 1960s as a center for formation and reconciliation for clergy and laity from the across the Anglican Communion.

Unlike tour companies that often only swoop in and out of Christian holy sites in the Holy Land, St. George's College courses break bread with Palestinian Christians in the West Bank, meet with Muslim leaders on Haram al-Sharif, meet with Muslim women in a refugee camp in Bethlehem, visit the Israeli Holocaust Memorial Yad Vashem, and sometimes even visit Israeli settlers in the West Bank. Through second-tier courses such as "Sharing Perspectives," Jews, Christians and Muslims live and journey together as an interfaith community at St. George's College, encountering the land and its people in the past and present, exploring historical, geographical, religious and political complexities, and considering how the Holy One is revealed uniquely in each of the Abrahamic faiths.



Modern Diplomacy estimates that up to 47% of all global conflict is rooted in religion. The great twentieth century theologian Hans Kung said, "There will be no peace among the nations without peace among the religions and no peace among the religions without dialogue." St. George's College is the Anglican Communion's essential and primary center for religious dialogue and understanding through pilgrimage, formation, education, encounter, and reconciliation.

The armed conflict that began on October 7, 2023, in Israel and Gaza forced the temporary closure of St. George's College for in-person pilgrimage. To date, the College remains closed. Never before has a crisis so existentially challenged St. George's. The Colleges \$2 million annual budget is comprised of earned revenue streams (pilgrim fees, gift shop sales, non-pilgrim lodging fees, etc.) and Church News Ireland

through the generous contributions of its alumni. In the current crisis, the College's earned revenue streams have been totally disrupted.

In response, in October of 2024, the North American Committee for St. George's College, which functions as an incorporated board of support for St. George's, initiated a \$1.19 million capital campaign to support the college's ministry. The goal of the campaign is twofold: first, to provide funds to sustain the college's operational costs during a time when the college is unable to host pilgrims due to the ongoing war in Gaza and, secondly, to build the endowment, which is the college's primary source of funding beyond the income generated from pilgrim fees, for future financial resilience.


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The North American Committee (NAC) is delighted to announce that as of the start of the Lenten season, it has raised just over \$1.2 million in gifts and pledges to the campaign. NAC president the Reverend Barkley Thompson comments, "The outpouring of love and support for St. George's College is an incredible testament of faith. Through this campaign, we insist that the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness cannot overcome it."

The Anglican Church of Canada, which is also represented on the North American Committee, is running a concurrent Canadian campaign, which hopes to raise additional funds. NAC is further pleased to announce that committees of support in the United Kingdom, Australia and New Zealand are initiating campaigns. There has been a groundswell of support throughout the Anglican Communion in recognition of the cherished role that St. George's College plays in our common life as the official pilgrimage center of the Anglican Communion and a gateway to the Land of the Holy One and the Diocese of Jerusalem Due to this generous and robust international support, we have raised our goal to \$1.5 million as our campaign continues through the Lenten season.

The Most Reverend Hosam Naoum, Anglican Archbishop of Jerusalem and the Middle East, says of the campaign, "We are asking all our friends around the world to come together to help St. George's College and to walk with us during the dark times of war and distress, so that we can continue to celebrate St. George's as a beacon of life and love in Jerusalem and from Jerusalem to the ends of the earth." Cathedral Calls

York Minster Evensong service starts Archbishop's Lord's Prayer Tour of the North

'The Lord's Prayer Tour', in which Archbishop of York Stephen Cottrell will teach about the Lord's Prayer across the Northern Province of the Church of England, began in York Minster on Friday 7th March 2025 at a service of Evensong.

Archbishop Stephen wants to share the importance and relevance of The Lord's Prayer to our world today, encouraging people to pray and live by this as part of their missionary discipleship, using it as a pattern for living.

The Lord's Prayer tour is part of the Faith in the North initiative.

Working alongside others Archbishop Stephen is encouraging prayer, storytelling and church planting inspired by the Northern Saints such as Hild, Cuthbert, Bede and Paulinus. The aim is to foster deeper connections with the Christian faith across the north and renew the Church's missionary purpose to share God's love with all.

The focus for Faith in the North in 2025 is The Lord's Prayer, in 2026 it will be pilgrimage, and in 2027, baptism.

Lucy Walker, a young composer who has previously written music for the Choir of York Minster, was commissioned by Faith in the North to create a new choral music piece inspired by The Lord's Prayer. Specifically written for cathedral services and for choirs, the composition features two arrangements: one for choir and organ, and a simplified version for choir and piano. This versatility makes it accessible for a wide range of worship settings. The piece will have its debut performance during the service on 7 March, sung by the Choir of York Minster.

The Revd Canon Maggie McLean, Canon Missioner said: "York Minster is delighted to be playing a prominent part in the Archbishop's initiative. The Lord's Prayer tour across the Northern Province connects with the deep Christian roots of our heritage. Lucy Walker's new composition reflects the power of The Lord's Prayer to invite fresh creativity and inspire new, and deepening, faith."

Reflecting on the project, Lucy said: "This project allowed me to reflect deeply on the profound meaning of The Lord's Prayer. It is a constant and familiar part of worship for so many, and it was rewarding to consider how a musical setting could amplify the many-faceted message of the prayer. I hope it resonates with singers and worshippers alike and offers a moving experience for all who hear it."
