Remembrance in Washington

The deputy First Minister of Northern Ireland Emma Little-Pengelly MLA and the NI Communities Minister Gordon Lyons MLA visited Arlington National Cemetery in Washington DC this week to lay a wreath at the grave of Field Marshal Sir John Greer Dill.

Field Marshal Dill was a Lurgan born Ulster-Scot who forged the UK-US Special Relationship, working alongside US General George Marshall during the Second World War. When he died the US Administration agreed that his

contribution to the USA and the Second World War warranted this unique recognition.

The Northern Ireland representatives were joined by James Applegate, the United States Consul General in Belfast, who laid a wreath on behalf of his country.

End of an era at Christ Church Leeson Park

Tuesday March 11 2025 marked the end of an era at Christ Church Leeson Park.


The imposing south Dublin church was deconsecrated following a final service of Evening Prayer during which the congregation was encouraged to cherish the memories of all that had happened there over 150 years and recognise that nothing God gives goes to waste.

The origins of the church lie in the Molyneux Asylum for the Female Blind which moved from Peter Street to Leeson Park in the 1860s. The Molyneux Chapel was rebuilt and renamed Christ Church Leeson Park in 1874. It became a parish in 1892 and was united with St Bartholomew's, Clyde Road in

1972.

March 15, 2025

The church, which could accommodate hundreds of worshippers, was closed in 2007. It operated, with a modified right of use, with a **Eucharist** every Wednesday from 2008. A licence agreement for use by the Romanian Orthodox Church also functioned



well for many years. Unfortunately, the building was too large for the parish's purposes. The Select Vestry made the difficult decision to sell the property last year.

On Friday March 7 there was a final said Eucharist in Christ Church Leeson Park. Archbishop Michael Jackson undertook an Act of Deconsecration of the church on March 11.


In his sermon, Archbishop Jackson drew on the readings for the day [Genesis 4 starting at verse 6 and Galatians 4 starting at verse 8] as the context for the evening's service

noting that Scripture was written for our learning and could speak into any situation including the deconsecration of a He said that the reading from Genesis saw Joseph planning for the future in the time of plenty which meant there were stores of food when famine struck. "I encourage all who have memories of this gracious, extensive church in the past to bring those memories with them into the future. No gift from God is wasted so we are encouraged to take the spiritual harvest of this church into the seven years of famine," he said.

The Epistle sees St Paul talk to the Galatians who have turned to other ways of understanding the world. He tells them that they are known by God. The Archbishop said that Church News Ireland Page 9



we need to be given to God as circumstances change. "We cannot control how God knows us," he said. "The way this church was used by worshipers and organisations in the past lives on in the spirit of those who were inspired here. That inspiration will continue to mark and celebrate Christ Church Leeson Park."

Prayers were said for all who served God over generations in Christ Church Leeson Park. Members of the Romanian Orthodox Church in Dublin were also remembered in prayer.

Following the service, Canon Andrew McCroskery read the petition to the Archbishop requesting him to secularise the church and release it from consecration. Archbishop Michael Jackson read the Act of Deconsecration.

A huge well done to the Year 8 pupils for their incredible fundraising efforts!




Rebecca from NI Cancer Fund for Children visited the school recently, where she was presented with a cheque for an amazing £4,788.78 raised through the ReadOn initiative




Irish missionary nun celebrates 40 years service in Brazil

Irish missionary, Sr Margaret Hosty, is celebrating 40 years of missionary work in Brazil where she recently received an award in recognition of her devotion to the poor and marginalised in her adopted country, Matt Moran writes.

Sr Margaret grew up on a small farm at Cloonfad, Co Roscommon in the West of Ireland. One of a family of 12 - six boys and six girls - she says that she knew from an early age that she wanted to devote her life to missionary work in Latin America.

In those days, missionaries used to visit schools to talk about their work in far distant lands. That was a very effective way to create interest in the missions and to influence students to consider the missionary life.

In September 1967, she left home to enter the novitiate of the Sisters of Saint Louis in California along with two other Irish girls. After graduating from California State University at Fullerton, she began working as a teacher. Then in 1985 when the opportunity came to move to Brazil, she quickly accepted the opportunity.

"When I came to Brazil", she says, "I had to learn Portuguese, the language we speak here. I then taught English and also began working with a group of washerwomen - women who wash other people's clothes by hand and iron them - accompanying them as they formed a syndicate to protect their rights as workers".

At the same time, she helped out in a parish on the outskirts of Goiânia where there wasn't a priest. It was through a colleague and friend in parish work that she first met someone with AIDS. "I knew almost nothing about AIDS at the time, she says, "but seeing the discrimination my new friend suffered, I realised that so many others were also ill-informed, leading to fear and stigma for those with HIV/ AIDS. After his death, I felt I needed to do something about this, and that was how I began working with and for people living with HIV and AIDS."

In 1995, she co-founded an organisation called AAVE Group in the city of Goiânia. The AAVE Group (which in English stands for: AIDS, Assistance, Life, Hope) works with people with HIV/AIDS and their families. It provides psychological support and counselling, home and hospital visits, advice on their rights and legal entitlements, and training for income generating skills to help people who have lost their incomes due to HIV/AIDS become financially self-sufficient and provide for themselves and their families. Social support and a sense of community is central to the work of AAVE, creating a place for people to be welcome and escape the stigma and misunderstanding that still exists around HIV/AIDS. Advocacy and outreach in the poor and marginalised areas of Goiânia are also important.

Sr. Margaret points out how they "go out into the community, to schools, church groups, factories, and door-to-door in neighbourhoods to give correct information and to encourage early testing." The AAVE Group is funded entirely by donations and grant funding, including support from Misean Cara through the Irish Aid programme. It is supported by the Archdiocese of Goiânia. Trocaire - the Irish Church's aid agency - has also supported it.

In 2023, Sr Margaret was honoured with a Human Rights Award from the Legislative Assembly of the State of Goiás in recognition of her four decades of service to people living with HIV/AIDS.

"It's hard to believe" she says" that I'm 40 years in Brazil already. I feel privileged and blessed to have worked here for so long. It's been a challenge but a challenge I've enjoyed. Living and working among the poor with HIV has

contributed greatly to making me who I am today. I am grateful to God, to the Sisters of St Louis, to the AAVE Group and to all those whose lives have touched mine.

"One thing I've learned from these people is that they have hope, the need hope, and that they live in the present. As people with a serious illness, they don't have the certainty of tomorrow. I think my work with people living with HIV/AIDS has helped me to live more in the present," she says when reflecting on her four decades of missionary endeavour.


