



King's visit to Pope will be 'healing' moment for Anglicans and Catholics

Historic show of friendship across the Christian faith aims to restore ties that date back to the 700s

The King and Queen will attend an audience with the Pope next month, in a landmark show of friendship between the Anglican and Catholic churches described as a "historic first".

The King will become the first monarch, and Supreme Governor of the Church of England, to visit the Papal Basilica of St Paul Outside the Walls since the Reformation, finally restoring ties which date back to the 700s.

The basilica is seen as a place of reconciliation across the Christian faiths, with the King and Queen also attending a "special service" in the Sistine Chapel to build bridges between the Church of England and Roman Catholic Church.

Buckingham Palace has confirmed plans for a one-day state visit to the Holy See on April 8, which will be held in conjunction with a second state visit to Italy.

A palace source shared "hopes and prayers that Pope Francis's health will enable the visit to go ahead", and confirmed that the King has written privately to the Pope during his recent illness.

The visit, a spokesman said, would "mark a significant step forward in the relationship between the Catholic Church and Church of England".

Healing the relationships between faiths is one of the King's key aims. The trip's itinerary, created for the Papal Jubilee, will build on his five previous Papal audiences as Prince of Wales to be a metaphorical "joining hands" between the Catholic Church and Church of England.

The details of the trip will be subject to the Pope's health.

On Monday, the Vatican released the first image of Pope Francis since he was admitted to hospital with pneumonia a month ago, showing him sitting in a wheelchair in front of an altar in Rome's Gemelli Hospital.

The state visit to Italy, which begins on April 7 and continues on April 9 – their 20th wedding anniversary – and April 10, will see the King and Queen visit Rome and Ravenna.

Staunch Trump critic installed as Archbishop of Washington

Cardinal Robert McElroy has officially become archbishop of the Archdiocese of Washington.

It means an outspoken liberal within the Church and a vocal critic of Donald Trump will now lead the diocese that houses the US seat of government that has taken a significant conservative turn since President Trump returned to power.

During a nearly two-hour liturgy in which he was installed as the eighth archbishop of Washington, Cardinal McElroy encouraged the faithful of his new archdiocese to be "pilgrims of hope in a wounded world", reports OSV News.

Referencing the Jubilee Year and its theme "Pilgrims of Hope", in his homily, the cardinal said it was "vital for our local Church" to embrace "the hope that comes from seeing the world as God sees it".

"What hope we could bring to our world as the Church of Washington if we could truly help our society to see others more as God sees them – beloved children, sisters and brothers," Cardinal McElroy said during the Solemn Mass of Installation at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, located not much more than 5 kilometres to the northeast of the White House in the US capital.

"It is all too easy for every one of us to let the limits of earthly worries and perspectives erect prisons in our souls that shut us off from the expansive presence of the Resurrection in its fullness," he said. "We must refuse to be overpowered by these prisons, and instead journey together as a local Church, companions in faith and in fragility to embrace the same risen Lord that Mary of Magdala encountered in the garden so many centuries ago."

Cardinal McElroy, the former bishop of San Diego, was named by Pope Francis on 6 January to replace the retiring Cardinal Wilton Gregory, the first African American cardinal, who served as the archbishop of Washington from 2019 until this year – after offering his resignation to the Pope Church News Ireland Page 13 upon turning 75, as required by canon law, on 7 December 2022 – and who now becomes archbishop emeritus.

Known as a close ally of the Pope, McElroy is viewed as a liberal and aligns closely with many priorities of Pope Francis's pontificate, particularly regarding the plight of migrants and refugees. In 2017, during Trump's first term, McElroy gave a speech in Modesto, California, explicitly criticising Trump and urging Catholics to become "disruptors" of the anti-immigrant agenda.

McElroy is also known for his liberal views regarding sexual morality and has advocated for greater inclusion of LGBTQ Catholics while criticising elements of the Church that exclude them.

MP scraps key 'safeguard' from Assisted suicide Bill

Kim Leadbeater has removed a key safeguard from the UK assisted suicide Bill that she is backing, having previously touted the safeguard as a fundamental feature in the proposed legislation.

Despite facing a backlash against proposals to remove the High Court safeguard from her Terminally III Adults (End of Life) Bill, on the afternoon of 12 March, the Labour MP joined other MPs in voting to successfully remove the Court approval Clause (12) from the Bill.

Previously, Leadbeater had offered reassurances that she would not scrap the High Court judge safeguard in her Bill when media first reported that the provision might be in danger of being removed.

Furthermore, in the lead-up to the controversial vote in November 2024 that saw Leadbeater's proposed Bill pass its Second Reading in the UK Parliament, the MP repeatedly highlighted that her Bill has "the strictest safeguards anywhere in the world", noting that the High Court judge-related safeguard was evidence for this. Its provision in the Bill, along with other proposed "safeguards", was repeatedly positioned by Leadbeater and her allies as a key component of the Bill that should assuage the concerns of its critics.

Then in February 2025, at 10 p.m. the night before the first day of line-by-line scrutiny of the Bill by committee was to begin, and after MPs had returned to their constituencies for the February recess, Leadbeater announced that she would be tabling an amendment to scrap the "safeguard" in the Bill that required a High Court judge to approve assisted suicide applications, reports Right to Life UK.

"Only a few months ago, Kim Leadbeater touted her Bill as having the 'strictest safeguards in the world', with the centrepiece safeguard in the Bill being the High Court provision," says Catherine Robinson, spokesperson for Right To Life UK.

"Despite a major backlash, Leadbeater has now astonishingly gone ahead and scrapped this centrepiece safeguard in her Bill. She has removed the very provision Church News Ireland Page 15

that 60 MPs identified as a key reason for their support at Second Reading."

Right to Life UK notes that Leadbeater "attempted to position the replacement [for the High Court judge provision] as 'Judge Plus' and was resoundingly criticised for using what many saw as a deeply misleading term".


tasked with interviewing an engineer, before identifying a problem in the world around them they want to solve.
