Sir Keir Starmer pays tribute to UK troops killed in Afghanistan and Iraq

Sir Keir Starmer has paid tribute to UK troops killed in Afghanistan and Iraq during Prime Minister's Questions in Parliament, - bfbs Forces News reports.

The Prime Minister's comments came a day after US Vice President JD Vance was accused of disrespecting UK troops by referring to "a random country that hasn't fought a war in 30 or 40 years", during an interview on Fox News, angering many British MPs and veterans including Irishmen and women.

Sir Keir made no direct reference to the Mr Vance's controversial remarks as he remembered individual soldiers who gave their lives serving their country.

The UK has played an active role in 10 conflicts in the last 43 years.

Sir Keir Starmer said, "Tomorrow marks 13 years since six young British soldiers were on patrol in Afghanistan when their vehicle was struck by an explosive, tragically killing them all," he said.

"These men fought and died for their country, our country and across the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq, 642 individuals died fighting for Britain alongside our allies.

"Many more were wounded. We will never forget their bravery and their sacrifice."



Mr Vance's remarks come at a time when the US has suspended military aid to Ukraine and is calling on other Nato nations to step up their defence commitments.

In response to the backlash, he said he "didn't even mention the UK or France" in the Fox News clip, "both of whom have fought bravely alongside the US over the last 20 years and beyond".

Bear Grylls to speak at Flame youth congress

This year's Flame, a gathering for young Catholics from across England and Wales, has sold out the OVO Wembley arena, with famous adventurer Bear Grylls one of the star speakers.

On Saturday, 15 March, 10,000 young Catholics will travel to London to celebrate their faith, take in talks from outstanding Catholic and Christian speakers, listen to music and performances from headline acts, and place Christ at the heart of their worship with Adoration led by Cardinal Vincent Nichols.

Speaking ahead of the event, Bear Grylls, echoed this year's theme of Flame which is 'Unstoppable: Fan the Flame of Hope' by saying:

"May God bless you and all who you share this with. Remember: with the Almighty within us we are unstoppable!"

Bear Grylls, OBE, is world-renowned for his survival skills, and a former member of the British Special Forces, and will also be releasing his new book, The Greatest Story Ever Told, a series of eye-witness accounts of Jesus' life.

Every attendee will receive a copy of his book, which aims to make the Gospel more accessible for young people. He said: "I'm so excited to share this book with you ... it's all of our stories really."

Alongside Bear Grylls will be Bryan Enriquez, a founding member of the Hallow app, which is now the number one Catholic prayer and meditation app.

Isaac Harvey, MBE, is also due to speak, a disability advocate and content creator, who has modelled for London Fashion Week to promote adaptive fashion and has featured in Vogue.

Isaac leads Wheels and Wheelchairs, where roller skaters push wheelchair users and champions inclusivity through various different charity roles.

Father Dominic Howarth, a priest of Brentwood Diocese, and co-chair of the Flame Core Group, said: "At a time when

Pope Francis is so deeply in our thoughts and prayers, it is a particular blessing to be inspired by his Jubilee theme, Pilgrims of Hope.

"Flame 2025 is a testament to the hard work and dedication of many, many teachers, chaplains, priests and youth leaders from across the country - some of them will be leaving with groups of young people at 4am, and returning well after midnight!

"The programme is packed with speakers and musicians who will share life stories and images that offer a joyful vision of Christ-centred hope. We are looking forward to a wonderful day, to 'fan the flame of hope' for young people, parishes and schools across the country."

There will be music performed by Guvna B, Lily-Jo, World Youth Dance Crew, One Hope Project, and Adenike Adewale.


Echoes in the Landscape exhibition

New £13.6m museum to tell story of Irish in British Army - Belfast Telegraph

The history of Irish involvement in the British Army will be told in a new museum planned across two sites in Belfast and Enniskillen, Mark Bain reports.

The £13.6million project will trace the 350-year story of Irish soldiers and their families who served.

'Untold: The Museum' will be located at the restored linen warehouse at 28 Bedford Street in Belfast, with a second site at redeveloped galleries at Enniskillen Castle. Phase one of the project, in Belfast, is expected to open in summer 2027.

Hugh Crossey, chair of the new museum, said: "Untold stories of the Irish in the British Army will hopefully inspire people to see things differently and make meaningful connections across generations."

famously described the 27th (Inniskilling) Regiment of Foot as "the most obstinate mules I ever saw."

The victorious Duke of Wellington likewise praised Corporal James Graham from Co Monaghan — one of the 7,000 Irish who fought in the battle - as "the bravest man at Waterloo." Some 103 years later, on November 23, 1918, Irish soldiers once again took to the field at Waterloo. The 2nd Leinsters became the first British Army Regiment to march across the battlefield since Napoleon's defeat in 1815.

Funding from The National Lottery Heritage Fund will support the planning phase, helping to recognise, explore and preserve the shared heritage of Irish men and women's contributions.

The Heritage Fund has awarded initial development funding of £249,239, with an application for a full National Lottery grant of £1,721,595 to be made later.

The project will bring together collections from The Inniskillings Museum, The Royal Ulster Rifles Museum, The Royal Irish Fusiliers Museum, The Royal Irish Regiment Museum, The Collections and Archives of The Royal Irish Regiment and The Collections and Archives of The North Irish Horse. Southern disbanded regiments will also be included.

Mr Crossey added: "Education will be at the heart of all the exhibitions, offering our visitors the chance to explore the lives of the Irish men and women who rose above divisions of class, politics and religion and overcame extremes of hardship to make an indelible mark on our history.

"In sharing these stories, Untold seeks to contribute to ongoing peace and reconciliation across the island.

"We are already surprised at the number of people from a range of traditions who have discovered ancestral and family histories amongst Irish regiments in the British Army.

"When fully completed I would encourage everyone to visit this new immersive exhibition and learn more about our and potentially their — shared heritage."

Dr Paul Mullan, The National Lottery Heritage Fund's Northern Ireland director, said the new museum would bring "an exceptional heritage building in Belfast's Linen Quarter" back into use.
