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Remembrance exhibitions in Derry & Raphoe

Members of Dunnalong Parish Church in Bready gathered on Saturday morning – Armistice Day – for an Act of Remembrance of those who gave their lives for freedom in last century's two World Wars and in more recent conflicts.





A two-minute silence was observed and wreaths were laid during a short Service, which was led by Rev Arthur Burns.

This weekend, Dunnalong is one of a number of Church of Ireland parishes in Derry & Raphoe Diocese which held festivals of remembrance. Camus-Juxta-Bann (Macosquin) and Tamlaghtfinlagan (Ballykelly) also hosted exhibitions, holding special church services, and organising Acts of Remembrance.

The three-day festival in Dunnalong includes a display of wartime and Troubles-related memorabilia. Among its most striking exhibits are a S.E.F.F. memorial quilt bearing the

names of dozens of people (members of the security forces and civilians) who lost their lives in the Troubles, and a 'giant poppy net' comprising 3,000 handcrafted flowers. Two members of Leckpatrick & Dunnalong MU, Ruby Hamilton and Jean Olphert, mustered the support of colleagues and friends to knit the poppies.

The festival ended yesterday evening with a Special Remembrance Service during which the Bishop of Derry & Raphoe preached.

Irish book on Ignatian Camino already a best seller

Journalist Alf McCreary did the honours at the Belfast launch of Brothers in Arms (Messenger Publications) by Brendan McManus SJ, Irish Jesuit, and James Fullam, Dublin taxi driver, on Thursday last.

The book is already a best seller and in its second print run and all sale proceeds go to the Peter McVerry Trust which works on alleviating homelessness.

Carolanne Henry of Messenger Publications gave a short introduction to the book saying that, for her, its core strength lies in demonstrating clearly and simply how relevant Ignatian spirituality is for people today as they go about everyday life with all its ups and downs.

Five hundred years after St Ignatius Loyola, the founder of the Jesuits, walked from Loyola to Manresa in Spain, the pair set out to retrace his steps on the newly established Ignatian Camino. The book is the story of two pilgrims, one saint, totally unexpected adventures, and finding the freedom to follow the path God has revealed.

Speaking at the launch Alf McCreary said he liked the reflection points at the end of each chapter and said the book gave clear and fresh insights into Ignatian spirituality and its relevance in today's world.

In a live interview with Pat Coyle of Irish Jesuit Communications, the authors regaled the audience at the launch with just a few of the remarkable stories from their pilgrimage, including being rescued by a group of nuns who spoke no English, had never heard of The Beatles but who could certainly drive a big van which brought the pair safely to their next destination.

Brothers in Arms could be described as part travelogue, part Camino-prep for seasoned and unseasoned pilgrims alike, and part hands-on guide to the basics of Ignatian spirituality.

Diocesan School Children encouraged to Walk in the Light

Children from schools all over Dublin and Glendalough filled Christ Church Cathedral on Thursday morning (November 9) for the Diocesan Service for Primary and Junior Schools.

The theme of the service was 'Let There Be Light' and this was reflected throughout with uplifting hymns and powerful, positive messages affirming the light of Christ which banishes darkness. The collection was taken up in aid of Pieta House,

which organises the annual 'Darkness into Light' event and works to prevent suicide and self-harm.

Organised by the Diocesan Board of Education, the service was led by the Revd Sean Hanily and the Revd Jane Burns



with Archbishop Michael Jackson presiding. The young students had an opportunity to bring light into the cathedral with glow sticks as they affirmed their commitment to bring the light of Christ into the world around them.

In his address, the Revd Sean Hanily said that we can make a choice every single day to walk in the Light of Christ. However, he said that everyone makes mistakes but explained that God doesn't keep a record of them. During every service there was an opportunity to confess our sins, he added, and God gives an assurance of forgiveness when we walk in the light.

"Every day you have a choice to make: are you going to walk in the Light of Christ or are you going to turn away and walk in the darkness? You have that choice every day and

my prayer for you is that you may be encouraged to walk in the path of the light," he said.

Prayers were said for all involved in education, including children and their teachers and those in the Department of Education. Before giving the blessing, Archbishop Jackson prayed for children who were caught up in the arena of war. Mindful of the privilege of education he prayed for children who could no longer access education because of war. Conference on Irish Protestant minorities in the Republic of Ireland in border areas

A group of academics have met for a conference in Dublin to discuss the experience of the Protestant minority in the Republic of Ireland.

The Dunmanway Discussion Group held the conference on 'Irish Protestant Minority Experiences' at Buswells Hotel, Molesworth Street in Dublin on Wednesday 8 November.

The event was chaired by human rights activist and former Belfast UUP councillor Jeff Dudgeon.

It examined the experiences of Irish Protestant minorities in the Republic of Ireland in border areas, starting with the Bandon Valley Massacre by the IRA in 1922 and then looking at succeeding decades.

The group's stated aim is to promote truth and reconciliation in respect of the Bandon Valley Massacre. It was formed by descendants of families impacted by the massacre and other concerned individuals came together in 2022 after the Irish Government declined to mark the centenary of the killings.


