Afterwards, we each spent some quiet moments of adoration at the Empty Tomb before gathering with other Heads of the local Christian communities around the Old City.

We give thanks for our time in the Holy Land with Archbishop Justin before he concludes the twelve years he

has spent as our 'first among equals' leader within the Anglican Communion.


May God bless him and his family, as well as all those with whom we met and worshiped over the four days of our pilgrimage together in the midst of a devastating war that we all pray will soon end.

Derry City & Strabane District Council White Ribbon Day reception for churches



Leading members of the four main churches in the North West joined campaigners against gender-based violence at a Mayoral reception in Londonderry's Guildhall to mark White Ribbon Day.

A Civic Reception by the Mayor of Derry City & Strabane District, Cllr Lilian Seenoi-Barr was attended by leaders of the four main churches, the Western Health and Social Care Trust, Police Service of Northern Ireland, Foyle Women's Aid and artist Talia Sena.

White Ribbon Day (25th November) is a time to remember, reflect, listen and act for change to stop violence against women and girls before it starts.



The North West Methodist Mission Director said, "It is encouraging to see key agencies and civic leaders come together to support the White Ribbon campaign by signing the Charter. The Charter is a personal pledge to never commit, condone, or remain silent about violence against women."

The Mayor, along with the two local bishops, then attended the White Ribbon prayer service held in Clooney Hall Methodist Church, led by Deacon Marlene Skuce.

The Methodist Church in Ireland is committed to every church being a safe place. "As a Church we have a part to play by listening, believing, loving and supporting victims, we don't need to be experts but through the Safe Place initiative we can direct victims to where the experts are".

Methodist Church views on the Irish General Election

Statement - As we enter these last few days before the Irish General Election on Friday 29th November, we as the Methodist Church encourage people to exercise their democratic right and responsibility to vote.

We urge all to reflect carefully and prayerfully on the important issues at the heart of this election.

We believe the gospel of Jesus Christ calls us to have particular concern for people who are the most marginalised and vulnerable. Therefore, issues such as housing, health care, cost of living, and how we welcome newcomers to Ireland from other countries, are vitally important.

We also recognise the debate going on in many European countries regarding assisted dying. We have previously voiced our opposition to such legislation being introduced in Ireland. We reiterate our call for the Irish government to increase the funding for palliative and end of life care.


We live in a world blighted by war and therefore we call on those elected to govern in Ireland to do all they can on the international stage to work for peace especially in Europe and the Middle East.

It is just a building... BUT it is so much more than a building - Steve Stockman

Steve writes in his blog Soul Surmise about the Fitzroy community on the day that they celebrated 150 years of their own particular building

A church is not a building. It is people. A community of faith. It is the body of Christ. Yet, we have traditionally gathered in a church building.

We don't believe that this building is any more holy than anywhere else. God is in our homes, up mountains, on beaches, in parks as much as he is in a church building. The earth is the Lord's and all of it is therefore sacred.

Church buildings however become the places for an intensity of the sacred.

As I looked out at the Fitzroy community on the day that we celebrated 150 years of our own particular building I was aware of the human emotions going off.

This is where our parents worshipped. This is where I was baptised. This is where we got married. This is where we baptised our children. This is where my father or mother's funeral took place.

This is where a psalm, a hymn or modern spiritual song touched my soul. This is where a prayer someone prayed one morning expressed my prayers that I was struggling to pray. This is where a line from Scripture or an illustration in a sermon led me deeper into a Father's love. This is where I felt the presence of Jesus gathered around his table. This is where sitting in these old pews I sensed the Spirit rushing through to refresh and warm my soul.

This building is the place where when we were broken someone let us cry and weeped with us. This is the place where we were allowed to flounder in our faith. This is the

place where we hung on to a thread that was fraying. This is where we knew a Father's arms always open to the prodigal. Where we were lost but by amazing grace got found.

In Fitzroy, for so many, this was the last chance saloon before we fell off the edge of church. This is where sneaking in, damaged by other church experiences and not looking anyone in the eye, someone looked me in the eye. My eyes eventually lifted from the ground to seeing others... and then my eyes lifted higher and realigned me with God.

This is the place from where we were sent, particles of light across the city. From here we went to the neighbourhood, to the homeless, the abused and the refugee. From here we went across the world to Uganda and India and South Africa and Jordan and Argentina and Chad. In this place we prayed for those who went, we gave generously to build and sponsor and support and we celebrated the stories on their return. This is the place from where seeds were sown.

This is the place where we found within community fellow followers, whose friendship has encouraged and inspired us. This is the place where we heard that invitation to life in all its fulness and in spite of all that brokenness in our way we reached for it.

This is the place of all life's fulness, the failures and God gifted successes, the grief and the joy, the hurt and the reconciliation, our lostness and being found.

This building is therefore only a building but more than a building because it holds the intensity of all these sacred experiences together in one precious place.

Fitzroy, as we know it, moved to our present building from Alfred Street prooving indeed that we are indeed not a building. yesterday we celebrated 150 years in this building. We sang hymns and psalms and more modern songs. Our young people prayed for us. I preached on 1874 and now and who Jesus always is. There was an amazing Exhibition. We had a picnic together and cut cake. At night we heard stories.



It was emotionally charged. It was cathartic. It was celebratory. It was joyous and so spiritually positive. It was like all the energy that we would need for the next 150 years detonated right there in our midst, recycled by all that has gone before. It was a reminder as to why as the writer to the Hebrews says we should not stop meeting together. It was one of my best ever days at the office!

Thank you Fitzroy's building for 150 years of fulness and thank you God.

Bishops criticise rampant liberalisation on life issues ahead of Irish elections - Charles Collins in Crux

Republic of Ireland's bishops are calling on voters to remember the right to life – at every stage – as the country prepares for elections. They have framed this need within the requirement for better Church-State dialogue in the face of increasing "diminution" of respect for life, both at the start and end of the natural life span.

"The current structures for Church-State dialogue are not functioning for the greater good of society and are in need of review," the Irish bishops say in a statement issued on 20 November.

"Any such structures must be made work so that the voice of Churches and other faith communities can be heard and contribute to a national reawakening based on the reality of people's lives, and not ideology or special interests. As a Church, we are open to engaging with Government and with other Churches and faiths on this question."

The bishops note that churches and faith communities have an important contribution to bring to this national and local conversation "by helping, with others, build and sustain an Ireland that protects and values the potential of every person."

Elections will be held on 29 November, after the current coalition government comprising Fine Gael, Fianna Fáil and the Green Party is dissolved.

Although Fine Gael and Fianna Fáil have traditionally been seen as centre-right parties, over recent years both have supported a more liberal social agenda: the country has seen abortion and gay marriage legalised, and is now considering legalising assisted suicide.

"We believe that an absolute commitment to dignity, value and right to life of every person – at every stage and in every condition of life – is vital for the sustaining of a vibrant, hope-filled cohesive, flourishing society," the Irish bishops say.

"This commitment must be part of our political dialogue and the actions of those whom we elect. Over recent years, we have witnessed a diminution in the respect for human life in

our political discourse. The value of people's lives seems to be calculated as if it were simply part of a cost-benefit analysis," the bishops say.

"Where is the hope in this?"

The statement notes the country now has a "very liberal abortion law", and highlights that since the legislation of abortion in 2018, around 40,000 abortions have been carried out in Ireland.

It continues: "And some politicians want to make it even more liberal. Now we have efforts being made to make legislative provision for 'assisted dying' in Ireland. A recent report from an Oireachtas Committee has made recommendations to the incoming Government that assisted dying be allowed in certain, restricted circumstances.

"We totally reject that recommendation because a fundamental principle of civilised society is that no person can lawfully take the life of another," the bishops say.

In their statement, the bishops also address the increase in conflicts occurring around the world.

"The war in Gaza and the Middle East must stop now. Enough is enough! The plight of the people of the region is horrendous. So too is the inability of the international community to act to bring about a ceasefire and a longerterm solution to the questions involved," the bishops say.

"Similarly, the international community has a role to play in bringing peace to Ukraine and to other areas of conflict in our world, including Sudan, Myanmar and Yemen. War, militarisation and the proliferation of arms, is a stain on our humanity," the statement continues.

"Pope Francis reminds us that throughout the Bible, justice, peace and faith go together. He invites us to oppose a culture of cruelty and war and, instead, always promote a culture of peace and bear witness to human solidarity and love."
