

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


Image of the day – St Patrick's, Belfast


A second group of 60 pupils from Assumption Grammar School, Ballynahinch visited the Somme Museum this week. They were guided by Austin and Tom.

Christian Aid welcomes Keir Starmer announcement at COP29

Christian Aid has welcomed UK Prime Minister Sir Keir Starmer's address to COP29 this week, in which he

stressed the urgency for the world to act on climate change and outlined actions his government has already taken since they were elected, "making the UK a global leader" in the shift to clean renewable energy.

But Starmer also emphasised the urgency for all countries to come forward with "ambitious targets fo their own" ... "A global problem also requires global partnership," he said.



Responding to his speech, Sophie Powell, Christian Aid's Chief of UK Advocacy, commented: "The government deserves credit for being the first G7 economy to outline its new, strengthened, emissions reduction target. The UK's announcement should now put pressure on other countries to follow suit with similar announcements. Amid new geopolitical uncertainties following the US election results, clear signals of ambition and collective resolve from major emitters are more important than ever.

"Emissions reductions however are only one side of the coin. The other is climate finance and on that, the UK is not yet delivering, despite this being dubbed the 'Finance COP'. If the UK really wants to claim the mantle of a climate leader it needs to deliver on public finance to support the ongoing efforts of vulnerable countries to adapt to climate change, and to ensure the energy transition is fully funded."

poorest communities and urging governments to prioritise equitable funding solutions.

A key focus is on establishing a new goal for global climate finance that considers justice, as those least responsible for climate change often bear the highest costs. The Anglican delegation is calling for financing options that alleviate deburdens on vulnerable nations, urging that funds be offered as grants rather than loans.

The Anglican Communion's report, "Choosing Hope: Anglicans Working For Joint Action on the Climate Crisis and Nature Loss", outlines five key calls to governments which reflect the Anglican commitment to protecting both people and the planet.

Belfast minister swaps raves for naves, leaving white sands of Ibiza for the Ballywalter beach

A Belfast minister has spoken about swapping Ibiza for Ballywalter as he returns home from running the party island's only English-speaking church, Kurtis Reid writes in the Belfast Telegraph

Rev Adrian Green, who is originally from east Belfast, moved with his family to the 'white island' in 2021 to serve as the Anglican representative for Ibiza and Formentera.

He has now returned to Northern Ireland to take over at Holy Trinity Church in Ballywalter.

Speaking to the Belfast Telegraph, Rev Green described swapping the Spanish holiday isle for Co Down.

"I was minister of a church in the Craigy estate in east Belfast when someone sent me the job listing as a joke," he said.

"I took it as a joke and thought, 'wouldn't that be nice, working in Ibiza?' It was around the end of 2020, so mid-Covid, but it really stuck with me.

"That's when my wife and my son said to me about actually considering it, and I asked for the job details, and when I got them, it had my name all over it. It was everything I was looking for.

"I sent off an application at the end of the year, had an interview in February and was offered the job that evening.

"We ended up having to juggle all the travel (restrictions) due to Covid, but we moved out in July, myself, my wife and one of my children, while the other stayed to finish their Alevels."

Once there, Rev Green became chaplain to the only English language church on the island, leading services for ex pats and English-speaking residents of Ibiza, which has the highest number of foreign residents out of all the Balearic Islands.

"Although it was technically an Anglican church, it was filled with around 24 different nationalities throughout the attendees," he added.

"It was very international and lots of people came to faith, especially people in their 20s and 30s. I found it was a lot of people who had come to the island when they were younger to party and now we're coming back as adults with their own families."

During his time on the island, Rev Green also took part in a group called Prayer 24/7, a street pastor type initiative which helped people, particularly in the area where the main clubs are located, at night who may have been too drunk or were distressed.

"Ibiza is a beautiful place, it just goes from summer to winter and you do get a lot of people attending the clubs — but there is much more to it than that.

"Both my wife and I volunteered with 24/7 Prayer, which is based in the west end of the island. We would work overnight there, working in pairs, to chat and help people.

"But if they were too drunk or too drugged, we would always help them get home, even some of the doormen at clubs would contact us to help people.

"It was certainly very enlightening — some humorous stories as well, but it's great to be there for people, some people just need actual help. But we also ran a homeless shelter as well, it's all about community."

After around three years, Rev Green decided to move back to Northern Ireland after being told about an upcoming job in Co Down, swapping the sun-bleached Spanish sands for the beaches of beautiful Ballywalter.

"We could have stayed longer, but we wanted to be closer to family and we felt we had brought the church to a stage where it can move forward, in the hopes that it will continue to grow and enjoy lots of different speakers. It's now run by a team from the island and is more homegrown." Church News Ireland

Fr Joe McMahon

Joe McMahon was born on 14th January 1949 in Miltown Malbay Parish. He attended St. Flannan's College from 1961-1966.

In 1966 he undertook his studies for Priesthood in St. Patrick's College, Maynooth. He was ordained on the 16th of June 1973, in Miltown Malbay by Bishop Michael Harty.

After ordination he undertook a Higher Diploma in Education and was appointed to St. Flannan's College, this began a four decade long association with St. Flannan's. In 1982 he undertook a career guidance course in U.C.D. He worked as a guidance counsellor and taught Irish and Latin among other subjects. In July 1994 he was appointed Vice President of St. Flannan's College. In 2005 he was appointed President of St. Flannan's College. In September 2014 he became PP pro-tem of Scariff, Feakle and Killanena/ Flagmount.

In the Diocesan Restructuring of 2018, he was appointed Co-PP of Inis Cealtra Pastoral Area and in 2021 he became Vicar Forane. In 2024 on reaching his 75th Birthday he became A.P. In Inis Cealtra Pastoral Area.

He died on the 10th of November 2024. Funeral mass was held on Thursday 14th November with burial immediately afterwards in the church grounds of the Church of the Sacred Heart, Scariff. May He Rest in Peace.

World', in Tamlaght O'Crilly Parish Church on Friday 29th November.


The TOC Community Choir will be joined by guest soloists and instrumentalists to entertain the audience, and the church will be lit up spectacularly for the occasion.
