

Pastoral Letter addresses end-of-life care

Bishop Alan McGuckian of Down & Connor recently published a pastoral letter called 'Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his faithful'.

The letter addresses the crucial matter of end-of-life care in light of the proposed Terminally III Adults Bill to be discussed in Westminster on November 29th.

In the letter Bishop Alan reaffirms the Catholic Church's teachings on the inherent dignity of human life. Every

person, regardless of circumstance or condition, possesses an infinite dignity that must be upheld and protected. This core belief compels us to firmly reject assisted suicide.

Irish first-aider receives Order of Malta award for heroic actions during London terror attack

The Order of Malta Ireland has announced that Mrs Joanne Saunsbury (née Crofton) has been awarded the prestigious Cross of the Order pro Merito Melitensi.

The unique honour was bestowed upon her by Archbishop Eamon Martin, Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland, on behalf of the Sovereign Military Order of Malta during a solemn ceremony at St Mary's Church, Haddington Road, Dublin.

The Order formally recognised that Mrs Saunsbury, a native of Wexford who demonstrated extraordinary courage and selflessness during the tragic events of March 22, 2017. While working on a tour bus crossing Westminster Bridge in London, she witnessed the onset of a terrorist attack that claimed the lives of five individuals including unarmed police officer Keith Palmer who was guarding the entrance to the Palace of Westminster and injured over 50 others.

She rushed to the aid of a critically injured man lying unconscious on the ground. Drawing upon her training with the Order of Malta in Wexford, she administered CPR and worked tirelessly to resuscitate him. "I was trying to get him to breathe and to get his heart beating," she said. "Where there's life, there's hope."

Her quick thinking and bravery not only provided immediate life saving assistance but also embodied the core values of the Order of Malta-upholding human dignity and offering compassionate care in times of crisis.

Patrick Downes KM praised Mrs Saunsbury after the ceremony, stating: "Joanne's selfless actions in the face of imminent danger are a testament to her character and reflect the core principles of our Order. She is a shining example of courage and compassion, and we are honoured to recognise her today."

The Cross of the Order pro Merito Melitensi is one of the highest honours granted by Decree of the Sovereign Council of the Order of Malta, awarded to individuals who have displayed exceptional merit.

As we commemorate the 850th anniversary of establishing our first priory in Ireland at Kilmainham-now the site of the Royal Hospital-the Order of Malta continues a proud legacy of service that spans centuries. We are one of the world's oldest medical charities and have over 60 active units across the island of Ireland, staffed by thousands of highly trained volunteers dedicated to serving their communities.

Our volunteers provide a wide range of essential services, including first aid training, emergency medical support, and community care initiatives. Their commitment reflects the enduring mission of the Order: to uphold human dignity and provide compassionate assistance to the poor and the sick.

Popular conservative Christian named US ambassador to Israel

President-elect Donald Trump has nominated Mike Huckabee, the former Republican governor of Arkansas and an evangelical Christian, as the next US ambassador to Israel.

"Mike has been a great public servant, Governor, and Leader in Faith for many years," Trump wrote in a statement. "He loves Israel, and the people of Israel, and likewise, the people of Israel love him. Mike will work tirelessly to bring about Peace in the Middle East."

Following the announcement, Mr. Huckabee told Israeli Army Radio that he "won't make the policy", but "will carry out the policy of the president". He emphasised that "there's never been an American president [than Trump] that's been more helpful in securing an understanding of the sovereignty of Israel" and cited the previous Trump administration's

decision to move the US embassy to Jerusalem and to recognise the Golan Heights as Israeli territory.

Mr Huckabee has criticised the Biden government's approach to the Israel-Hamas war, saying in March that the Biden administration has "made it very clear they will make concessions to Hamas".

He's also previously demonstrated staunch support for Israel. In an interview in 2017, he said: "There's no such

thing as a West Bank. It's Judea and Samaria. There's no such thing as a settlement. They're communities, they're neighbourhoods. There's no such thing as an occupation."

In 2008, during his presidential campaign, he said: "There's really no such thing as a Palestinian" in response to a question about the possibility of a Palestinian state existing outside Israel. "You have Arabs and Persians, and there's such complexity in that. But there's really no such thing [as



a Palestinian]. That's been a political tool to try and force land away from Israel."

Israel's finance minister, Bezalel Smotrich, welcomed the appointment, posting his congratulations to "a consistent and loyal friend" on social media platform X.

National security minister Itamar Ben-Gvir posted Mr Huckabee's name alongside heart emojis.

Huckabee served as governor of his home state of Arkansas from 1996 to 2007 and attempted to become the Republican presidential candidate in both 2008 and 2016.

Between these bids, he had his own talk show on Fox News. Before his political and television career, he was a pastor at Baptist churches in Arkansas.

+Winston and I have been involved with Abaana and teams for a very long time - I think since 2004 when our daughter Cathy joined one of the first youth teams to Uganda.




+I had the privilege of serving on my first Abaana team in 2006, then 2008, 2010, 2011, 2012 and 2016.

Derry & Raphoe new, free prayer resource

The Diocese of Derry & Raphoe has published a new, free prayer resource, 'Building Hope, Charting the Future', to help people pray for our Church and the community.

The pocket-sized booklet reflects the issues and realities that many of God's people are grappling with currently, such as the cost-of-living crisis, ill health, loneliness and anxiety. There are prayers, too, for political leaders, for the renewal of the Church, for the building up of faith, for clergy, for vocations, for the missionary Church and – locally – for "vision and purpose" as the ongoing diocesan review continues.

Commending the booklet to parishioners, Bishop Andrew said he hoped they would find its readings and prayers helpful. "Being able to pray is one of the greatest gifts that God has given us. Let's



use that gift as we seek to build hope and chart the future of our parishes and diocese."

The new resource includes 'Prayers for Your Parish', 'Prayers for the Diocese', 'Prayers for Your Wider Church', 'Prayers for those Struggling with Life', 'Prayers to Build Up Faith', 'Prayers to Build Vision and Hope' and 'Prayers for Mission & Pioneering'.

'Building Hope, Charting the Future' is similar to a previous prayer resource, 'Hope in the Pandemic', which was produced four years ago to encourage parishioners during the Covid–19 crisis; it proved extremely popular throughout the diocese and far beyond. Bishop Andrew hopes 'Building Hope, Charting the Future' will prove equally reassuring and just as popular.

"In almost 50 parish groups in over 110 churches, our diocese has faithfully served God through challenges in the past," Bishop Andrew said, "and we look to God with confidence into the future, knowing that He is always faithful and His love is the same, 'yesterday, today and forever."



Calls for Archbishop of York to step down following Justin Welby scandal

Daily Telegraph - The Archbishop of York is under pressure to step down over his handling of child abuse cases in the Church of England.

The Most Rev Stephen Cottrell faced calls to resign on Sunday from a survivor who said he is perpetuating a Church "cover-up" and a former abuse inquiry leader whose work was prematurely disbanded by the Archbishops' Council last year.

Rev Matthew Ineson, 56, a retired vicar who was abused at 16 by a Bradford priest, said the Archbishop of York failed to hold clergy accountable for mishandling his case.

He said: "Until there is a complete clean sweep at the top, nothing is going to change."

The demands follow the resignation of the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Rev Justin Welby, last week, who was forced to quit over his failure to act on concerns over child abuse committed by evangelical Christian John Smyth.

Irish President attended service where cleric accused Israelis of deploying 'master race' theory

Jewish Chronicle - An Anglican cleric accused Israel of deploying a "master race" theory in a sermon to a high-profile audience that included the Irish president.

Canon David Oxley was accused of "hijacking" the solemn Remembrance Sunday event at St Patrick's Cathedral in Dublin with a diatribe in which he also suggested Israelis believe themselves to be intrinsically more valuable than "other" groups.

"Then the elimination of others follows as a matter of course because they don't count," Oxley said.
