



Eglinton Presbyterian 86th Anniversary


On Sunday past the 86th anniversary of Eglinton Presbyterian Church in Carr's Glen, Belfast was marked.

In 1938 the congregation at Eglinton Street ("If you ever wondered how we got our name...there you have it"), made the courageous decision to leave their existing location and move "up country" to the Ballysillan Road.

Shortly after the move Rev James Houston took the position of minister. Since then, he has had just three successors.

"We were privileged to have Dr Bill Boyd and Rev Colin Morrison (Bill & Colin by their preferred titles) join Matthew on Sunday to reflect on their 57 years of combined ministry under varying circumstances and cultural settings.

Bishop's visit to Letterkenny University Hospital

Bishop Andrew Forster of Derry & Raohoe paid a visit to Letterkenny University Hospital this week, to meet patients and staff, and hear about work at the institution.

He was welcomed to the hospital by the Church of Ireland Chaplain, Rev Sean Mc Clafferty, who introduced him to the hospital's Assistant General Manager, Madge Toye Temple.

Ms Toye Temple welcomed the Bishop formally, on behalf of the HSE and management, and briefed him on the current situation at the hospital regarding recruitment, staff



retention, funding, and future planning and the general logistics and working of a hospital that employs 2,500 people.

During his visit, Bishop Andrew talked to staff from several departments and also met members of the chaplaincy team, led by Rev McClafferty, Rev Craig Wilson representing the Presbyterian Church, and Fr Francis Ferry, Fr Shane Gallagher and Ms Kathleen Doherty representing the Roman Catholic Church.

The Bishop was given an update on the ongoing and essential work of chaplaincy at the hospital and heard about the close relationships enjoyed by the chaplaincy team.

Afterwards, Rev McClafferty accompanied the Bishop on his rounds. They visited a number of Church of Ireland patients who were delighted to receive an unexpected pastoral visit.

The day also included a visit to the Donegal Hospice to see the outstanding facilities there and concluded with the Bishop being hosted to lunch by the chaplaincy team.

Archbishop Justin Welby visits Bethlehem

Rev Munther Isaac writes on Facebook: On Saturday, Archbishop Justin Welby, accompanied by archbishop Hosam Naum of Jerusalem, visited Bethlehem.

After spending time in the Nativity Church, the delegation visited the Christmas Lutheran Church, and I shared about to the story and meaning of the "Christ in the Rubble" manger and led the delegation into prayer, and we lit candles for the children of Gaza.

The archbishop then met with and listened to the plights and hopes of Palestinian youth, and clergy from Bethlehem. A powerful moment was when we as clergy from Bethlehem prayed for the archbishop and his family and ministry. I then accompanied the delegation to visit the Tent of Nations and the Nassar family, and the Makhrour valley and the Kissiyeh family, as they saw firsthand the impact of the settler movement and annexation on Palestinian lives and the future of Palestinian Christianity.

November 22, 2024

I am grateful for this solidarity visit and continue to call on church leaders to work for an immediate ceasefire and stand in solidarity with Palestinians who lived under apartheid. I emphasized the importance of accountability. Israel acts knowing they are above the law, because the international community has been granting Israel such unlawful immunity, let alone fund their settler colonialism.

These are very challenging and difficult days. Zionists have made their plans clear, and the world - and church leaders - must speak up more than ever.

The organist was Mrs Diane Simpson.



Candle procession returns Virgin Mary statue to Notre-Dame cathedral before reopening

A procession of hundreds of people holding candles walked through the streets of Paris to bring a famed statue of the Virgin Mary and child back to Notre-Dame Cathedral on Friday, five years after it was moved to a nearby church after a devastating fire.

Laurent Ulrich, the Paris archbishop, blessed the statue during the march, as people prayed and sung hymns while they carried the statue, its base surrounded by white flowers, past Christmas trees and holiday garlands erected on city streets ahead of the year-end holiday.

"The Virgin stands, stands, although she is filled with pain. We have just accompanied her walk, her return, by reciting the rosary and the joyful mysteries. We remain joyful about everything that happened after this fire. We remain joyful about everything that has been experienced around this cathedral for five years," Ulrich said.

Notre-Dame Cathedral, the Paris landmark built over nearly 200 years starting in the middle of the 12th century, is due to reopen on Dec. 8 with days of festivities after the fire that ravaged it on April 15, 2019.

Though French authorities have said an electrical fault or cigarette may have sparked the conflagration, it remains unclear exactly what caused it.

The facade of the building, which hulks over the lle de la Cite island in the middle of the Seine river, held, but the damage has required years of work to stabilize and restore the edifice. About 500 workers have been racing to do so.

The official leading the project said in April that the project had cost 550 million euros (\$580.36 million), funded in part by massive donations, including by luxury sector billionaires Francois Henri Pinault and the Arnault family. The cathedral has received so much funding that there will be money left over for further investment in the building.

French President Emmanuel Macron will attend multiple events around the reopening, including its inaugural Mass.

Nearly 40,000 pilgrims and 8,000 scholars have already registered for pilgrimage services at the cathedral, with

plans for 14-15 million visitors a year, spokespeople for the cathedral said.

French culture minister Rachida Dati has suggested charging a small fee to see the cathedral to help finance the maintenance of other churches and cathedrals, but for now visiting Notre-Dame cathedral remains free to the public.
