## Kenya's Catholic church rejects gov \$40,000 donation

Kenya's Catholic Church has rejected a \$40,000 (£32,000) donation from President William Ruto, intended for building a priest's house, a choir gift, and a parish bus.

Catholic Archbishop of Nairobi, Most Rev Philip Anyolo, cited "ethical concerns" and the church's policy against political self-promotion. He added that such donations breach both church directives and Kenyan law. A smaller donation from Nairobi Governor Johnson Sakaja was also returned.

"The Catholic Church strongly discourages the use of church events such as fundraisers and gatherings as platforms for political self-promotion," Archbishop Anyolo said in a statement.

## C of I Church treasurer admits further fraud

The former director and treasurer of Shankill Parish Church Lurgan, who has already admitted swindling more than £600,000 from the church, has admitted a further fraud offence, Paul Higgins writes in Sunday Life.

Two weeks ago at Craigavon Crown Court Godfrey Ellis entered guilty pleas to two of the four charges against him, namely fraud by abuse of position and forgery.

In court on Friday with some of the congregation watching from the public gallery, defence counsel Seamus Lannon asked for the 54-year-old to be re-arraigned on a further fraud charge.



Standing in the dock wearing a navy suit and a blue shirt and tie, Ellis entered a guilty plea to a further charge of fraud by abuse of position in that between August 18, 2015 and January 7, 2020, he used £102,313 of parish funds to pay his credit cards.

Following the admission, prosecuting counsel Ian Tannahill asked for the final charge of fraud, alleging that Ellis misrepresented the church's bank balance by claiming it was "£30,482 in credit when in fact the account was £38,847 in overdraft," to be marked as left on the books.



A fortnight ago Ellis, from Clanconnell Gardens in Waringstown, admitted that between July 26, 2011 and February 9, 2020, he abused his position of trust within Shankill Parish Church in Lurgan to transfer £643,637.31 from the church's bank account to accounts under his control and he also admitted a charge of forging a cheque on

February 9, 2020.

"This is a substantial amount of money," said Judge Patrick McGurgan, querying whether there was any issue over bail given the guilty pleas.

Mr Tannahill confirmed there were no such issues and Mr Lannon urged the judge to free the fraudster pending the completion of a probation report.

The judge agreed and he urged Ellis to "fully cooperate" with probation as the pre-sentence report would be in his best



interests. Adjourning the plea and sentence to January 24, Judge McGurgan freed Ellis on bail but warned him "under no circumstances take that as any indication what the sentence will be".

## Pope says Vatican's pension fund faces 'serious imbalance'

Pope Francis said on Thursday the Vatican's pension fund is facing a "serious imbalance" that may require changes to its operating structure, and appointed a senior cardinal to take over the fund's administration.

In an unusual letter sent to all the world's cardinals and to the leaders of the Vatican's various offices, the pope did not quantify the scope of the issue.

He said the changes would include "making difficult decisions that will require particular sensitivity, generosity, and willingness to sacrifice on the part of everyone".

Francis appointed Cardinal Kevin Farrell, an Irish-American prelate who has led the Vatican's office for family issues since 2016, to take over as the fund's administrator.


The pope has expressed uncommon concern about the Vatican's budget several times in recent months. In October, he ordered the third reduction in three years for the pay packages of the cardinals who lead the Vatican. He has also asked them to pursue a "zero deficit" agenda.

The Vatican has not released a full budget statement in several years but is known to be facing a serious budget deficit. The Vatican's finance czar estimated in 2022 that the net liability of the pension fund for post-employment benefits amounted to some 631 million euros (\$664 million).

The headquarters of the Catholic Church comprises two entities: the internationally recognised sovereign entity of the Holy See and the Vatican, a 108-acre city-state within Rome. They maintain separate budgets, and Vatican City income, including from the popular Vatican Museums, has often been used to plug the Holy See's deficit, which according to Italian media stood at around 83 million euros (\$87 million) last year.

The Three Tenors perform in St Patrick's Church, Wicklow town on Friday, November 29, from 8pm.

### Ireland's 'The Three Tenors' are coming to St. Patrick's Church in Wicklow town for a special Christmas concert.

Celtic flavoured with a blend of popular favourites and lots of fun, the concert will showcase a mix of inspiring songs, sung with real passion by singers Paul Feery, Conor Gibbons and Philip Klubicka.

The trio will perform everything from The Dubliners to Andrea Bocelli, including such gems as Caledonia, Christmas 1915, Silent Night, Somewhere Only We Know, The Parting Glass, Save the Last Dance, Nessun Dorma and O Holy Night.

The Three Tenors have been performing for fifteen years in major venues such as the National Concert Hall Dublin, Cork Opera House, Dublin Castle, and Belfast Lyric Theatre. ## Irish cleric who preached that Israel has Nazi-style policies 'has family link to Hitler'

## Anglican cleric reportedly told a service his mother-inlaw was Hitler's goddaughter - The Jewish Chronicle

An Irish preacher accused of "hijacking" this year's Remembrance Sunday service in Dublin Cathedral with an anti-Israel sermon reportedly disclosed his family's link to Adolf Hitler at the same service in 2019, Jane Prinsley reports.

Canon David Oxley, who accused Israel of deploying a "master race" theory in a speech to senior Irish politicians at St Patrick's Cathedral last week, was said to have admitted that his wife's family were Nazis during the Second World War in his address at the same event five years ago. According to a report of the 2019 service in the Irish Independent, he told the cathedral that the mother of his wife, Amalia Oxley, was German, and he had relatives who fought for the Third Reich.

He also said, according to the article: "It's not everyone who can boast that their mother-in-law had Adolf Hitler as a godfather. It's not everyone who would want to."

Later, the minister said that the service "was commemorating the sacrifice of many individual Irish men and women who did take sides and volunteered to oppose Nazism in arms".

Both services – the one this year and in 2019 – were attended by Irish President Michael D Higgins and first lady Sabina Higgins, as well as other Irish dignitaries.

In his 2019 address, the Anglican cleric went on to preach about the "cynical disregard of truth" and "the deliberate manipulation of information" that he said had become "endemic at the highest levels and has proved corrosive and destructive" to our society.

"In the conflict between right and wrong, truth and falsehood, neutrality is not an option," Oxley added.

He also referred to Ireland's neutrality during the Second World War. "There is no room for neutrality in the conflict between truth and falsehood," he said.

The report about Oxley surfaced in the wake of his comments at a Remembrance Sunday service at Ireland's national cathedral last week, when he accused Israel of committing the "horrible blasphemy of the master race in action... The elimination of others follows as a matter of course because they don't count."

Israel's envoy to Ireland accused Oxley of a "libel against the state of Israel" and "hijacking" the solemn memorial service with his diatribe.

The church leader reaffirmed his comments when approached by the JC, stating: "I am prepared to stand over my remarks.

"There was no hatred in my sermon, except a hatred of all theories that make one group of people more valuable than another, so that some become expendable. And a hatred of merciless cruelty, regardless of who is doing it.

"In delivering my sermon, I speak only for myself. I do not speak on behalf of the Church of Ireland, or of St Patrick's Cathedral. As our church does not believe in infallibility, it is quite conceivable that I am mistaken. No one is obliged to agree with me."

Oxley did not respond to a request for comment about his 2019 sermon.
