Vatican's new mascot for Evangelisation

The Vatican has introduced a new mascot, named Luce, to celebrate the upcoming 2025 Jubilee, designed with the look of an anime character.

Archbishop Rino Fisichella, who heads the Church's jubilee planning, shared that Luce was created "to step into the world of pop culture, so beloved by our youth".

Luce, meaning 'light' in Latin, was crafted by Simone Legno, co-founder of the Italian brand Tokidoki, which draws inspiration from Japanese culture.

Luce's design is rooted in the idea of a pilgrim, with 'shining eyes' and a symbol of hope, embodying Christian themes alongside Japanese pop culture elements.

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Luce's 'pilgrim friends'-Fe, Xin, and Sky were also designed by Legno.

The Vatican's Dicastery for Evangelisation will introduce 'Luce and friends' at the Lucca Comics and Games convention in Italy, a first for the Church.

According to the Vatican, this event aims to engage younger generations around the theme of hope, central to the Church's message.

Luce's unveiling has drawn mixed reactions online.

One X user posted in support of the mascot, saying: "Luce is the best Evangelization strategy the Vatican has ever came up with. Its just amazing," while another wasn't sold on the idea, saying: "This feels weird to me".

Luce will also be featured as the Vatican's mascot at Expo 2025 in Osaka, Japan, where the Holy See will present a collaborative pavilion with Italy.

Trump will become the 47th President of the United States.


Evangelist **Rev Franklin Graham** was early to send his well-wishes.

"Congratulations to @realDonaldTrump on being elected the 47th president of the United States of America!" he wrote on X.

"I pray that you will look to God every day for His guidance and wisdom."

Christian broadcaster **Eric Metaxas**, who is a staunch supporter of Trump, called the victory an "outrageous gift from God".

"God knew. Praise Jesus. We don't deserve this," he wrote on X. "It is an outrageous gift from God -- so let us use it to His glory! Hallelujah! AMEN."

Christian broadcaster **Eric Metaxas**, who is a staunch Not everyone was in such jubilant spirits.

Theos director **Chine McDonald** shared her thoughts in the wake of the result:

"That feeling when you have dreaded something happening for so long, and then it happens and you feel... Nothing. Numb. But also a feeling almost verging on relief. A release from the tension and the anxiety."

Author and activist **Shane Claiborne** tweeted during the vote that "America is in cardiac arrest".

"Even if we survive this heart attack, we probably gonna be on life support a little while," he added.

In a lengthy post on X, California pastor **Greg Laurie** said America "needs restoration" and urged people to pray for the President-elect.

"America needs restoration. President Trump could have died so easily in the assassination attempts on his life, but God did indeed spare him," he wrote.

"When President Ronald Reagan was shot early in his presidency, he too felt God had spared his life. The night Reagan returned to the White House he confided in his diary, "Whatever happens now I owe my life to God and will serve Him every way I can." Ronald Reagan went on have one of the greatest presidencies in American history.

"Let's pray now for President Trump that he will be surrounded by godly and competent people who will give him good counsel in the days ahead. God bless President Trump and God bless the United States of America!"

Christian author **Rod Drehe**r tweeted about a recent meeting he had with Trump's running mate, JD Vance.

"Many months ago, I drank beer with my friend, in Munich, and asked if he thought there was any chance Trump would ask him to be his running mate," Dreher wrote. "Naw, man, I don't think about that," he said. Now he is going to be the next VPOTUS. God is good, and so is @JDVance".

Trump, 78, served as the 45th president between 2017 and 2021 but lost to incumbent Joe Biden in 2020.

Trump is the first president since Grover Cleveland in 1893 to return to the White House after losing a re-election bid.

The billionaire declared election victory with an appearance at his Mar-a-Lago resort in Palm Beach, Florida, telling his supporters:

"This is the greatest political movement of all time, there's never been anything like this... This will forever be remembered as the day the American people regained control of their country."

He added that he was "going to help our country heal".


"We made history for a reason tonight," he went on. "Every single day I will be fighting for you... this is a magnificent victory for the American people that will allow us to make America great again."

Trump also referenced almost losing his life in an assassination attempt.

"Many people have told me that God spared my life for a reason," he said. "And that reason was to save our country and restore America to greatness...and now we are going to fulfil that mission together."

Trump is scheduled to be inaugurated on 20 January 2025.



Episcopalians in the United States and US Catholic Bishops' Conference reaction to Presidential election

Episcopalians in the United States have been urged to model fellowship amid political differences, as leaders of the Church make their first statements since the election of Donald Trump to a second term in the White House, Francis Martin writes in The Church Times.

"Regardless of our political allegiances, we must remember that God has called us in the Episcopal Church to seek and serve Christ in all persons," the Presiding Bishop, Dr Sean Rowe, wrote in a pastoral letter on Wednesday.

Dr Rowe, whose primacy was inaugurated in a service on Saturday (News, 4 November), wrote that the Church was committed to "working with the new administration to advance policies that follow the teachings of Jesus by supporting the most vulnerable among us".

He referred to Episcopal Migration Ministries (EMM), which, since 1988, has resettled more than 100,000 refugees and reaffirmed the Episcopal Church's support for the "dignity, safety, and equality of women and LGBTQ+ people".

"I pray that President Trump and his administration will do the same," he wrote. He called on Episcopalians to be "agents of peace and reconciliation in our communities, both in person and online. As people of faith, we can work and

pray for peace and unity among God's people whether we are joyful, hurting, or afraid."

The President of the House of Deputies, Julia Ayala Harris, also released a letter on Wednesday. "As a woman and as a Latina, I am feeling the weight of what this moment represents both for myself and my own family, and for the Church I serve as President of the House of Deputies," she wrote.

She acknowledged that "some in our church family will celebrate while others will experience deep fear and concern," and wrote: "Let us demonstrate to a watching world how Christians can model respectful dialogue and genuine fellowship even amid political difference."

The Church was called to a "distinct witness", she wrote, "to stand firm in our gospel commitments while remaining in communion with those who see the path forward differently".

The Episcopal News Service reported that some church leaders had expressed concerns about what Mr Trump's victory would mean for EMM. The organisation's director, Sarah Shipman, said on Wednesday that, although there might be "difficult times ahead . . . our commitment to this work has not wavered".

"While the path ahead may require us to work even harder, we know that, together, we can be a powerful voice for change and for 'the way of love'," she said.

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During the election campaign, Mr Trump pledged to deport undocumented immigrants, and polling suggests that the policy was a priority for many of those who voted for him.

Mr Trump's first term was marked by repeated injunctions to "build the wall" on the US southern border. Despite the rhetoric, more deportations took place during 2023, when Joe Biden was President, than in any year of the previous Trump administration, Reuters reports.

On Wednesday, the President of the US Catholic Bishops' Conference, the Most Revd Timothy Broglio, congratulated Mr Trump, but said: "the Catholic Church is not aligned with any political party, and neither is the Bishops' Conference."

Speaking to Vatican News, he said that there was a duty to "treat each other with charity, respect, and civility, even if we may disagree on how to carry out matters of public policy".

He highlighted the alleviation of poverty, and making the immigration system "more responsive to the needs of people", as policy areas in which the Bishops' Conference had a particular interest.

On abortion rights, Archbishop Broglio said that it was important to "try and convince people of the right of the unborn to life".

The Vicar of St Martin-in-the-Fields, the Revd Dr Sam Wells, who formerly served as the Dean of Duke University Chapel, in North Carolina, posted a "prayer for America" on the parish's website on Wednesday morning. See page 19.
