Lisbellaw Harvest schools support





We arrived at the Mount St. Anne's Conference centre via a stop off at Faughert shrine and ancient graveyard, the place




where Brigid was born. We were all struck by how peaceful the two places were.

Trinity College renames library

Trinity College Dublin is renaming its main Library after the acclaimed Irish poet Eavan Boland. This decision, said a statement from Trinity, was made by the University Board after a period of research, analysis and public consultation overseen by the Trinity Legacies Review Working Group.


The Eavan Boland Library will be the first building on Trinity's campus to be named after a woman. Eavan Boland, added the statment, was one of the foremost women in Irish literature, publishing many collections of poetry, a memoir Object Lessons (1995), as well as teaching and lecturing in Ireland and in the U.S.

It had been decided in April 2023 that the continued use of George Berkeley's name on its main Library was inconsistent with the University's core values of human dignity, freedom, inclusivity, and equality. Since then, its largest Library has been known simply as 'The Library.' In

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September 2024, after a process of deliberation including consideration of the 855 public submissions, the TLRWG identified several options for the renaming of the Library, with their preferred recommendation being The Eavan **Boland Library**

Scottish Episcopal Church will not pursue bullying claims against bishop

The Scottish Episcopal Church has decided to drop claims against Bishop Anne Dyer, the first female Bishop of Aberdeen and Orkney.

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Initially suspended in August 2022 due to three complaints, Bishop Dyer was set to face a disciplinary tribunal.

However, the church's independent procurator determined it wasn't in the public interest to proceed, despite the fact there was enough evidence to provide "a realistic prospect of conviction" under the church's canon law, the BBC reports.



Bishop Dyer always denied the allegations of bullying and previously claimed she had faced "significant bullying and harassment" since taking up the role in 2018.

Synod participants emphasise role of women in Church mustn't eclipse need to involve all laity

Those taking part in the Synod of Bishops in Rome have emphasised that despite women's ordination

being removed from this year's discussion there are plenty of important roles that women can fulfil in the Church.

But they have also cautioned that there is an important need to discern potential ways to improve involving all the laity and not to overly focus on the role of women.



Participants were asked on 7 October what other possibilities they saw for women assuming leadership and governance roles that did not involve Holy Orders. It followed Cardinal Victor Manuel Fernández, prefect of the Vatican's Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith (DDF), taking the women's diaconate off the table and saying "there is still no room for a positive decision by the Magisterium regarding the access of women to the diaconate".

Sister Mary Teresa Barron, president of the International Union of Superiors General (UISG), a global leadership body of women religious, told journalists that "there are

many good practices from all around the world" which involve women in leadership roles. She noted that one of the members of her Synod group was a woman who served as chancellor for her local diocese.

"We're actually quite ignorant of what's possible at the moment," the Sister said. "There's a list of the possibilities that exist, and we should share that good practice and learn from each other."


While she acknowledged that it is easier for women in some cultures to assume leadership roles than it is in other

cultures, she emphasised: "I do think within this synod, though, that there is a call to explore more possibilities; what are the other options that are available, even if, for the moment. we might not be looking at ordained ministry."

Sheila Leocádia Pires, who serves as Communications



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Officer for the Southern African Catholic Bishops' Conference and secretary of the synod's information commission, said she also believes the discussion should be broader, including focusing on laypeople generally and not just women.

"If you look at our discussions today, it has to do with relations, how we

look at the different charisms, for example, how do we use our charisms not for my own personal gain, for the unity of the Church," she said. What participants in the synod are looking into, Pires said, are "the different gifts that laypeople have, not necessarily just women, but laypeople".

Holy Land: Young Christians will leave as there is 'no hope' left

Exactly one year on from the October 7th attacks and amid the spiralling conflict that has followed, young Christians in the Holy Land are feeling hopeless and

looking to leave - so says a Catholic agency helping those in great need.

With job opportunities "scarce" at a time of deepening crisis in the region, "it is very difficult" to give young people hope and encourage them to stay in their homeland, according to Dima Khoury, director of social services at the Latin Patriarchate of Jerusalem.

She told Catholic charity Aid to the Church in Need (ACN): "With no hope, people try to leave."

Father Louis, who leads the Youth of Jesus' Homeland (YJH) ministry in Ain Arik, just outside Ramallah in the West Bank, stressed that life is especially challenging for young Christians there.

Father Louis said: "If the Christians leave, the holy places will be like cold and abandoned museums. We insist to the young people that they do not emigrate, because Jesus lived and died here."

Speaking with ACN, Raffi Ghattas, a member of YJH said: "Our first priority in youth ministry is teaching the young people to belong to their land not because they are Palestinian, but because when God decided to become incarnate, He chose this land. This is a privilege, but it is also a cross. We are bearing this cross."

Father Jonny Abu Khalil, who runs a pastoral centre in Haifa, northern Israel told ACN that local Christians have also been suffering from an identity crisis, adding that "the war [has](#) sparked more separation and discrimination".

He explained: "Palestinians in Galilee used to feel like Israelis, but now they feel like second-class citizens...

"Their Christian identity is weak, and their national identity is confused - they cannot say they are Palestinians, nor can they say they are Israelis after what happened."

ACN has been supporting the Holy Land's Christian community, many of whom used to work in the tourism sector before most pilgrimages were cancelled because of the conflict.

Methodist Council on Social Responsibility responds to Budget 2025

The Southern Executive of the Council on Social Responsibility of the Methodist Church in Ireland feels that Budget 2025 could have been used as an opportunity for a more targeted addressing of the needs of the most vulnerable.

While we welcome various measures, many of them are too limited and in the form of one-off payments rather than an ongoing increase to enable families to budget for their needs. In particular we are concerned that this budget does not go far enough for families with low incomes, which in turn fails to address child poverty. We are also disappointed by the limited investment in social housing.

We commend the 'Budget Critique and Analysis' by our partner, Social Justice Ireland. We are in broad agreement with their assessment.

Serving with the Down Cathedral welcome team today I answered an unexpected phone call from a woman claiming to be from BT (British Telecom) who said our internet

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
connection had changed from private to public access and it needed to be changed to private.

Following the Diocesan Synod in Cork, Cloyne and Ross, during which Bishop Paul Colton specifically spoke about, commended and prioritised Pioneer Ministry in the diocese, he invited Rob to return to the Diocese in the same month, to delve further into the potential and planning for pioneering.

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Rob and Ingrid Brennan spent a day in Cork, leading a workshop for those in the diocese who are already pioneering or interested in what it might look like for them in their specific contexts and diocese. Discussions revolved around the vision of pioneer ministry as well as how the diocese might release and facilitate new ministries and work in new places. One of the main initial focuses in the diocese will be establishing Diocesan Hubs, which will consist of a group of people to advocate and promote Pioneer Ministry. Work is now beginning within the diocese to discern where these Hubs would be best placed.
