

Autumn Issue of Search

The autumn issue of the Church of Ireland journal, Search, has been distributed to subscribers.

Pioneer Ministry, as introduced and discussed in this year's General Synod, has been a major talking point for the Church of Ireland this year. Granted that, for the Church's very survival, there is a need to reach out to those whose spiritual needs have not been met by any church worship they have encountered, or who have never experienced the love of God in Christ, is there a need for a whole new structure to achieve that? Perhaps, given that clergy tend to be increasingly overworked and stressed out, that is exactly what is needed: a new deal to attract those unresponsive to traditional styles of ministry. Yet "doing a new thing" can happen within the old structures too, given imagination, determination and courage, as articles by Rob Clements and Abigail Sines in this issue show. As Rob Jones' introductory article indicates, Pioneer Ministry here is a work in progress. Search plans to share further stories of pioneering as the ministry develops over the months and years to come.

A category of young people in need of special attention in the Church's ministry today is that of "young carers" – young

people constrained to prioritise care for members of their own family above their studies or their employment. Dr Allison Campbell of Ulster

University explores their needs, with theological commentary by her husband, Revd Dr Andrew Campbell, to promote further thinking.

The issue concludes with an 'In Retrospect' by former Archbishop Richard Clarke on Dean John Paterson, who retired from Christ Church cathedral, Dublin, some twenty years ago, and a Liturgica from the USA, contemplating the need for inclusivity.

Most Israelis and Palestinians want nothing to do with violence - Richard Sewell

We must look at the world with compassion, or risk making enemies of people who need not be enemies, Richard Sewell, Dean of St George's College, Jerusalem, writes

It has been an unbelievable week in Jerusalem. We are desperate here, throughout the country. My emotions are absolutely raw after all this.

If someone asks me a kind question, I crumble because I'm living with this terrible, terrible sense of what might happen. I'm not so much worried about myself, but I feel the pain of all the people of this land. People often ask me where I find hope in this situation. It's a really difficult but important question.

For Christians, hope is not just an idea, and it's certainly not a sense of optimism – that things can only get better – because we've learned, actually, things can get a lot worse.

It is a conviction in the very nature of God and it is rooted in the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who defeated evil on the cross.

Our Christian faith tells us that when we look at a situation of conflict like this, we cannot make simple and superficial judgments, categorising people as 'goodies' and 'baddies'. It's not that straightforward, as much as some people may like it to be.

Of course some people have done wicked, despicable things and that has to be acknowledged and contended with. But the vast majority of people here in Israel and Palestine don't want that, they don't believe in that way.

They just want to live their lives, to be allowed to educate their children and make a living.

People who think Hamas is a wicked and evil terror organisation align it with all Palestinians – certainly all Gazans – and that is part of the problem. It's the problem of generalising and missing the particularities, the details. As Christians we have to look at the world with compassion, including the people who are different to ourselves, whom we don't understand, otherwise we make enemies of people who need not be enemies.

I am appalled by Saturday's terrorist attack and I am heartbroken for Gazans and for what they are fearing, because they know all hell is about to be visited upon them.

On Saturday, when our Ahli Arab Anglican Hospital in Gaza City was hit by an Israeli missile, four members of staff were injured and the building was severely damaged. The hospital is in the evacuation zone and all hospitals in Gaza have been told they have to evacuate but they can't go. They have patients who cannot be moved.

Although the Israelis have cut off water and electricity, our hospital has water from underground cisterns and it electricity from its own generator but we don't know how long that will last. I hope their fuel will last this out, but who knows what will happen when the tanks start rolling in. They are enveloped in darkness, praying and hoping someone will bring light.

October 17, 2023

It must be terrifying, as it is for the hostages being held in Gaza. There are times when despair sets in and you think well, we're probably going to die.

In this desperate situation you have to cling on. As Christians and people of faith – and this will be true of Muslims and Jews as well – you think, "I may die but I have an eternal future in the loving arms of God". People in Gaza will be clinging on to hope and perhaps committing themselves into God's care. It's what people of faith do.

Like the people we saw suffering the terror attack – Jewish people lying face down, saying their prayers – that is what you must fall back on. That is my hope, that this life is not everything, not the only reality.

The reality of this place is that for 15 years, Gazans have been living in an open prison. People object to that description but it is the reality.

They are not free to leave. Some 20,000 can go to work and others can visit, but most cannot. They cannot get out for cancer treatment or to visit dying relatives, all of that.

Gaza, for me, has been an incubator for hate and violence and, finally, it has exploded. I do not justify that but it has not come out of nowhere. If you do not look at the history then it's just superficial nonsense.

Most of my staff are Palestinians who live in the West Bank. They have been locked in it and cannot get out. The checkpoints are closed to Palestinians with Palestinian identity.

We, as Christians, must engage with this. We can't sit back and pray and have nice thoughts and it will all just turn out well.

We have to be peacemakers and when it has ended we have to build bridges. That is the hardest thing.
