York meets Cork about a world without maps

Last week the Archbishop of York, the Most Rev. Stephen Cottrell visited Cork, to speak at the Cork, Cloyne and Ross Clergy Away Days at the Celtic Ross Hotel in Rosscarbery.

Every year, the Bishop of Cork, Cloyne and Ross, the Right Rev. Dr Paul Colton invites all the clergy of the Diocese to



spend time together to reflect on ministry and to engage with a guest speaker.

Archbishop Cottrell's talks throughout the two-day event centred around the theme of 'How to lead in a world without maps: four images that may help.'

Before heading to West Cork on Wednesday, Archbishop Cottrell visited St Anne's Church, Shandon and climbed up the tower, one of Cork's most significant and well known landmarks, to ring the famous Shandon Bells. He opted to play the tune of 'Somewhere over the Rainbow' on the bells.

On Friday, before returning to the UK, the Archbishop attended a lunch for lay ministers in the Diocese, which was hosted by the Bishop and Mrs Susan Colton at their home.

'Buy a Brick' campaign gets work started in Carrickfergus church

St Nicholas' Church restoration work begins thanks to success of 'Buy a Brick' campaign in Carrickfergus

Restoration work at a centuries-old church in Carrickfergus has commenced following a superb response to a fundraising campaign.

Parishioners responded generously, raising almost £14,300 to date through the Be In'spire'd fundraising events.

Their efforts have meant that priority restoration work, including pointing and stone repairs to the church tower and baptistry, was able to commence this month.



It is anticipated that this phase of works to the Market Place church, which is over 800 years old, will be completed in December.

The Rector, Chris St. John thanked everyone in the community, "especially our parishioners who found it in their hearts to contribute so generously". He added: "The timeliness of the response is very much appreciated and has enabled us to commence the works on site as scheduled."

Meanwhile, further donations towards the building fund are being welcomed during the 'Knitted Journey Through the Bible' exhibition at the church.

Featuring 28 knitted Bible stories, it will run on Thursday, November 9 from 6-8pm; Friday, November 10 from

Pope calls for October 27 day of prayer after Gaza hospital bombing

Amid international tensions surrounding the war in Gaza following the deadly bombing of a hospital, Pope Francis has called for another day of prayer and fasting for peace, saying war "cancels the future" and breeds hatred and revenge.

Speaking to faithful attending his Oct. 18 General Audience, Francis said to the sound of applause that he was thinking of Palestine and Israel.

"The victims are growing, and the situation in Gaza is desperate. Please, let everything possible be done to avoid a humanitarian catastrophe," he said, noting that various wars are raging throughout the world and appealing to both sides to "Cast weapons aside, listen to the voice of the poor, the people, children."

"Brothers and sisters, war does not resolve any problem. It only sows death and destruction. It increases hatred, multiplies revenge. War cancels the future, it cancels the future," he said, and urged believers "to take only one part in this conflict, that of peace. Not of words, but prayer and total dedication."

To this end, he announced Oct. 27 as a day of prayer and fasting for peace, and invited believers of various Christian confessions and those belonging to other religious traditions

to join, as well as all those "who carry in their heart the cause of peace in the world."

He announced that on the evening of Oct. 27, at 6:00 p.m. in St. Peter's Basilica, an hour of prayer would be held "in the spirit of penance" to implore God for "peace in our days, peace in this world," Francis said, asking churches everywhere to participate by organizing similar initiatives.

Gaza has been at the heart of a war between Israel and Palestinian terrorist group Hamas following an unexpected and deadly surprise by Hamas militants Oct. 7 that left some 1,200 Israelis dead, including children.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu immediately declared war and has since launched an air and ground offensive, calling on northern Gaza to be evacuated as fighting escalates and concerns rise over the safety of civilians.

On Tuesday, Oct. 17, a massive blast shook Gaza City's Ahli Hospital, which had been packed with wounded and other civilians seeking shelter and which sits outside of northern Gaza's evacuation zone, killing at least 500 people, according to the Hamas-run Health Ministry.

Hamas blamed an Israeli strike for the blast, while Israel's military said a rocket misfired by other Palestinian militants was to blame.

The strike sparked international outcry as videos and images circulated showing fire engulf the building as bodies, many of them young children, were strewn across hospital Church News Ireland Page 17

grounds, with blankets, school backpacks, and other personal belongings scattered in the grass around the facility.

Tuesday's carnage happened as concerns rapidly rise of a humanitarian disaster in Gaza, with many struggling to find bread and water as the United States and other countries attempt to convince Israel to allow the delivery of muchneeded supplies to Gaza's civilian population.
