Temple of Saint Sava in Belgrade

A reminder that the largest mosaic in the world was completed as recently as 2020.

This is the "new Hagia Sophia", the Temple of Saint Sava in Belgrade, Serbia. It was meant to be built a century ago, modeled on the sixth-century church in Istanbul, but was held up by wars, occupation and then the post-war communist regime.

The enormous Orthodox church, with its 70m high dome, is built entirely from reinforced concrete. It was structurally complete in 2004, and work then began to adorn the interior walls with enormous frescoes and mosaics.



The mosaics now span 130,000 square feet and weigh around 320 tons in total.

There are more than 50 million individual pieces covering the interior walls - the combined work of 300 artists over the course of 4 years.

Saint Sava is a mixture of modern and Serbian-Byzantine motifs, and is now a beacon of Serbian faith and national pride. It is the second largest Orthodox temple in the world.

Bello Duo's candlelit churches concert series

Bello Duo came into being during the Covid-19 lockdown and Victoria and Connor went on to reach the final of Ireland's The Big Deal and have been touring and singing both locally and internationally ever since. Meeting marks 50th Anniversary of the first Ballymascanlon Talks

The thirty-third meeting of the Irish Inter-Church Meeting took place over 19 and 20 October in Dromantine Conference Centre, Newry.

The theme for the meeting was "Our Reconciling Vision of Hope: Fifty years since the Ballymascanlon Talks".

2023 is particularly significant for Irish Inter-Church Meeting (IICM) as it is the 50th Anniversary of the first Ballymascanlon Talks, which led to its establishment. The talks brought together Protestant and Catholic Churches across the island of Ireland in the midst of the Troubles.

The IICM was first and foremost intended to be a space for the development of relations between the churches.

After sharing lunch and attending various addresses, representatives joined a service of thanksgiving and reflection as part of the two day meeting. Representatives from across the membership of the Irish Council of Churches, and the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference, led the service which was attended by delegates from across the island.

Various speakers shared at the conference which explored the context around the Ballymascanlon Talks, including the priorities, challenges and achievements of those early years. There was also a session exploring current dynamics in international Inter-Church Relations.

Father Martin Browne (Dicastery for Promoting Christian Unity) discussed recent developments and directions in international ecumenical relations and how they can inform our journey here in Ireland. Father Martin said, "As we celebrate 100 years of the ICC and 50 years of the IICM, we give thanks for those pioneers who took risks and endured criticism for doing what we can do so unselfconsciously today, meeting together. We give thanks that we are no longer strangers to one another, but brothers and sisters, and friends. Perhaps the hopeful vision for the future can be one of still greater closeness and the unity of Christians."

Day two of the conference began with Rev Dr Donald Watts of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, who spoke of positive accomplishments by IICM and its initiatives over the years, noting that "we are involved in a dynamic movement rather than a static structure".

A panel considered current challenges to our vision of a more connected Church in Ireland, as well as areas offering opportunity for closer relationships and collaboration with ICC Vice-President Bishop Sarah Groves, Rev Dr Heather Morris who serves as secretary of Conference for the Methodist Church in Ireland, and Dr Damian Jackson, the IICM joint secretary. In this session the aspect of hospitality

was discussed as we aim to move from knowing each other a little to forming trusting relationships, open to change.

Co-chair of the 33rd IICM, Archbishop Eamon Martin of Armagh, concluded the conference with a discussion of the topic, 'What are we to take from this meeting for our coming work'. The Catholic Primate of All Ireland encouraged the audience to contemplate considerations for themselves, for the local Church and for Churches together.

As the audience engaged in thoughtful group discussion, the point of common concern across all groups was the urgent need to meaningful engage with young people and to include this demographic in future significant gatherings.

Sister Act finally meets the Pope

Hollywood actress Whoopi Goldberg has shared details of her meeting with Pope Francis last week after more than a decade of trying to arrange talks with him.

The star of Sister Act joked that she might "burst into flames" when she walked into the Vatican. Sharing a video of her meeting on US talk show The View, she revealed what the pontiff had to say to her.

He said: "One of the best things you can do for people is to help them to have joy and to make them laugh."

His comments came after he was presented with memorabilia from the Sister Act movies.

After receiving an image of Goldberg as her character Sister Mary Clarence, Pope Francis smiled as he pointed to her red stilettos which accompanied the traditional nun's clothing.

The actress joked that she was doing her bit to "bring the sisters into the 21st century".

Speaking to her co-hosts on the show she said the visit encouraged her not to abandon the Church and that she felt better for the visit.

Catholic aid agency worker killed in attack on Greek Orthodox church in Gaza

The Catholic aid agency CAFOD has spoken of its shock after a member of its staff was among those killed in the attack on a Greek Orthodox church in Gaza.

26 year old Viola who worked for Caritas Jerusalem, was killed along with her infant daughter and husband.

Janet Symes who is CAFOD's Head of Region for Asia and the Middle East told Premier :

"We're aware that five staff of our partner organisation Caritas Jerusalem, were there at the time. Tragically, one of their staff, a lab technician in one of their centres, a young woman, was killed along with her toddler child and her husband. And we know that her sister and her sister's two children were also casualties in the attack.

"My understanding is that they were sheltering there at the time. What we do know is that at that centre, they were providing food blankets, medical assistance, and shelter to all those families. Churches, hospitals, schools, are being used now for hundreds of families in each place to try to get some shelter, to find some degree of safety. But as this event shows us, unfortunately, just nowhere is safe at this time.

"Unfortunately, it's civilians who are bearing the brunt of this terrible situation that we find ourselves in."

In a statement CAFOD said :

"We are shocked to hear from our partner at Caritas Jerusalem that a staff member along with her child and husband were killed when the hall adjacent to the St. Porphyrios Church in Gaza, was struck last night. Her sister and two children were also among the casualties. The hall provided refuge for 411 people and five Caritas staff members were present.

"We extend our heartfelt condolences to the grieving families and all those injured and affected.

"We stand with the Orthodox Patriarchate of Jerusalem in strongly condemning the attack which claimed the lives of innocent civilians, who were sheltering following thirteen days of airstrikes, and call for an immediate cessation to the violence which is causing such suffering and bloodshed.

"Where they are able to, our partners continue to respond, helping those most in need.

"Please pray for all those who have lost loved ones, have been injured and displaced, and live in fear as the violence continues."

At least 16 Christians were killed in the blast at the Greek Orthodox church compound in Gaza City. It happened as hundreds of people – many of them Christians displaced from their homes – had been sheltering in the ancient church of St Porphyrius and its buildings.
