Mussenden Temple

Thanks to Gas Drone once again for a sensational photograph.

Mussenden Temple is a striking circular building perched dramatically on a 120ft cliff edge, overlooking the Atlantic Ocean on the north coast of Northern Ireland. Built in 1785, it is part of the Downhill Demesne near Castlerock, County Londonderry.

Here's what makes it special:

- * Inspired by Roman Architecture: The temple is modeled after the Temple of Vesta in Rome, with its iconic circular shape and columns.
- * **Dedicated to a Loved One:** It was built by Frederick Hervey, the Earl Bishop of Derry, in memory of his cousin Frideswide Mussenden.
- * A Library with a View: Originally intended as a library, its walls were once lined with bookcases. Imagine reading with that incredible view!
- * Breathtaking Scenery: The clifftop location offers panoramic views of Downhill Strand, Magilligan Point, and Donegal. It's a truly awe-inspiring spot.

* A Ruin with a Story: While the main house on the estate is now a ruin, the temple has been preserved and is a popular tourist destination.

If you visit, you can explore the temple grounds, enjoy clifftop walks, and imagine the life of the eccentric Earl Bishop who created this unique building.

Grand Central Station, we can see three buses in the picture and the sign has the words 'Grand Central Station' in white lettering. a new temporary access road now in use from Durham Street.


Taxis are also able to pick up and drop off on Glengall Street.

Incredible day at the NICVA Future Thinking Summit

370 representatives of Northern Ireland's charities, community groups and social enterprises came together at W5 Belfast to learn, share, and celebrate the value and diversity of the voluntary and community sector.

NICVA's CEO, Celine McStravick, kicked off the Summit by highlighting the immense contribution of NI's voluntary and community sector. Referencing the work of the Joint Forum she captured the spirit of change perfectly by stating, "We're not asking for a seat at the table anymore – we're building the table!"

Looking to the future, Celine outlined three key priorities:

- 1. Embed partnership across government and funders. "Nothing about us without us".
- 2. Secure sustainable funding that recognises the sector's true value. No more "more for less."
- 3. Invest in our people both paid staff and volunteers with the skills and support to meet evolving needs.

Celine proudly spoke of a Summit created by our sector, "with and for our members".

Participants were also joined by First Minister Michelle O'Neill and Deputy First Minister Emma Little-Pengelly BL MLA, who emphasised the sector's vital role as a core partner in delivering public services. They acknowledged the

challenging funding environment and its significant impact on organisations and staff, with the First Minister highlighting her advocacy for multi-year funding to provide stability for the sector. Both Ministers expressed optimism about working together to find solutions to key societal challenges.



Archbishop 'deeply sorry' as he reveals ancestor was slave owner

The Archbishop of Canterbury has apologised for his family's past after disclosing that his ancestor was a slave owner, Alex Barton reports in the Daily Telegraph

The Most Rev Justin Welby said the great-great grandfather of his father, Sir Anthony Montague Browne, enslaved people on a plantation in Jamaica and was compensated when slavery was abolished. The archbishop said: "I am deeply sorry for these links. It is now time to take action to address our shameful past."

He said he discovered his late biological father, a private secretary to Winston Churchill, "had an ancestral connection to the enslavement of people in Jamaica and Tobago".

In 2016, he learnt that he had been conceived as a result of a previous relationship between his mother, Jane, and Browne, and that Gavin Welby, who his mother later married, was not his biological father.

The archbishop had no relationship with Browne, who died in 2013, and did not receive any money from him while he was alive or after his death. His statement said Browne was the great-grandson of Sir James Fergusson, the 4th Baronet of Kilkerran and the owner of enslaved people at the Rozelle plantation in St Thomas.

Fergusson, who died in 1838, was given a portion of a £20 million compensation package from the British government for loss of "property" when slavery was abolished.

The Rozelle plantation had almost 200 enslaved people at its height. The Fergusson family shared compensation of £3,591 in 1836, which is estimated at more than £3 million in today's money, according to the Centre for the Study of the Legacies of British Slavery.


The Church of England vowed to set up a £100 million slavery reparations fund in January 2023, a year after announcing it was "time to take action to address our shameful past". It said investments into "communities affected by historic slavery" would be "delivered over the nine years commencing in 2023".

However, it is yet to announce how the fund will work or set a date for when its first investments will be made.

A 2022 report found that the Church's £10 billion endowment had partially benefited from 18th century investments in the transatlantic slave trade.

The £100 million sum represents just three per cent of the £3.6 billion figure that the Church Commissioners, who manage the endowment, expect to distribute in total over the next nine years. The archbishop said the fund was intended to "address past wrongs by investing in a better future" when he made the announcement.

By Thomas Hardy

At once a voice arose among The bleak twigs overhead In a full-hearted evensong Of joy illimited;

Afar or nigh around,
