The Review Officer was the Lord Lieutenant for Co Tyrone, Robert Scott OBE DL JP with nearly 800 staff members and pupils making up the audience. This was the first salute to be held in County Tyrone.

#### £33m Down High School tops out

A significant construction milestone has been reached in the delivery of Down High School on Strangford Road, Downpatrick, as the building tops out.

The £33million project will create a state-of-the-art education campus including a sports hall, PE facilities and sports pitches, catering for up to 950 pupils.

Work is now underway with the next phase which includes completing the block work, screeding floors and making the building wind and watertight ahead of the high-quality internal fit out.

Former Pres Mary Robinson speaks out on world's indifference to Sudan crisis




Former Pres Mary Robinson spoke powerfully about the world's indifference to Sudan crisis at Dochas emergency briefing on Monday.



# Music builds up Christ Church's local connections

In a new video as part of the Inspiring angles series, Tom Little, Director of Music at Dublin's Christ Church Cathedral, talks about its musical outreach programme with four local schools.

Weekly singing workshops reach 20 to 30 pupils in each school and help the Cathedral to serve the community by going outside its walls, sharing its resources, and bringing children and adults into the landmark space. Mission is always at the heart of Christ Church's work in a Cathedral that is here for everyone – not a museum or a monument – and is alive and thriving because of people.

Tom comments: "It's not about the quality of singing – it's the fact they are singing, they're making a noise and they're able to express themselves through music. It's absolutely wonderful to see. We take all of our services really seriously and the music is of such high quality but we can also just be really relaxed and informal, and welcome people in that way as well."

He also shares some research that tells us about the tangible benefits for children from singing, especially how it creates relationships with other people and working as part of a team effort, and helps with concentration. The Cathedral would welcome support to help this project reach

Thompson in the parishes of Derryvullen North and Castle Archdale.


The service was attended by Archdeacon Thompson as well as Dean Kenneth Hall and other clergy and readers from Clogher Diocese and beyond.

# Pope Francis' arrival in Papua New Guinea

Pope Francis has arrived in Port Moresby, Papua New Guinea. His Indonesia Airlines plane touched down at 19:10 local time on Friday 6 September, beginning the second leg of his 45th Apostolic Journey abroad.

He is spending three days in this large but sparsely inhabited nation of thundering rivers and waterfalls, snow-capped mountains, spouting volcanoes, thick forests and beautiful ocean.

The country, which is home to some of the world's last uncontacted tribes, is placed right on one of the planet's tectonic plates, and earthquakes and landslides are almost commonplace, while the lack of infrastructure in the more remote areas can pose serious challenges to rescuers and medics if disaster strikes, and even to simple travellers exploring the nation.

But Pope Francis is undeterred by challenges and determined to share the faith in person with the some 2.5 million Catholics who live here, including those in the remote town of Vanimo on the northwest coast, where a group of mostly Argentinean missionaries share his mission never to exclude what he calls the "geographical and existential peripheries" of our world.

Catholics from across the country have been arriving to the capital city in large groups. Given the lack of roads, many of them from more remote areas had to walk for days to get here.

Pope Francis' packed schedule for Papua New Guinea includes meetings with government officials, local authorities and diplomats; and with children in street situations and those with disabilities.

He will also pay a visit to the Shrine of Mary, Help of Christians, where he will meet with the Bishops of Papua

New Guinea and Solomon Islands, and with priests, deacons, consecrated men and women, seminarians and catechists.

On Sunday morning, the Pope will celebrate Holy Mass with the faithful at Sir John Guise Stadium, which has been teeming with activity during these last few days as final preparations are made.

Also on Sunday, he will fly to Vanimo, in northwestern Papua New Guinea where he will meet the faithful and a group of missionaries before returning to Port Moresby in the evening. The Holy Father will conclude the second stage of his Apostolic Journey with a meeting with young people on Monday morning.

The last time a Pope travelled to this island country was in 1995, when Saint John Paul II came for the beatification of Peter To Rot, a Papuan lay catechist who was martyred during the Second World War for teaching the Catholic faith.

Pope Francis met Wednesday with members of the Society of Jesus serving in Indonesia as he continues his Apostolic Journey to the country.

The encounter took place at the Apostolic Nunciature in Jakarta and was held privately.

Among those present was Cardinal Julius Riyadi Darmaatmadja, SJ, the 89-year-old Archbishop Emeritus of Jakarta (1996-2010).
