

Janine Armstrong, FORGE Coordinator, said "Down and Dromore has well-established ministries with youth and children and for several years has been running


Foundations for those aged 18-30. In 2022 we also launched the FORGE Ministry Apprenticeship Scheme for 18-25s.

Many people will be grateful for work behind Programme for Government -Archbishop John McDowell

Archbishop John McDowell, the Church of Ireland's Primate of All Ireland and Archbishop of Armagh, has issued the following statement on the publication of the Northern Ireland Executive's Programme for Government for consultation:

The first Programme for Government in thirteen years is an opportunity to re-establish and to put on a firm footing the good governance of Northern Ireland for the benefit of all our people, and particularly for those who are finding it difficult to make ends meet and to live with proper human dignity.

The Church of Ireland will make a full response to the consultation, in the usual way, but in the meantime I thought it might be worthwhile to offer a few words of heartfelt encouragement.



It cannot have been easy to get agreement from all four Northern Ireland Executive parties on what must be regarded as a sincere attempt to end years of political uncertainty and instability. All things considered, the Programme for Government has been agreed remarkably speedily due to the preparatory work which has been carried out by officials and politicians alike when the Assembly and Executive were not functioning. Many people will be very grateful for that unseen and valuable work.

Perhaps an even greater challenge will involve the spirit in which the Programme for Government is implemented; where possible softening the sharp edges which are an inevitable, but perhaps not an irreducible feature, of a mandatory coalition.

Of course financial resources are finite, and deciding funding priorities for departmental programmes and Church News Ireland

Executive initiatives will require strong and compassionate leadership. However, I can't help thinking that the citizens of Northern Ireland will understand and put up with the financial realities if they feel that those making decisions will do so as people guiding us along a bumpy road together. Honesty and clarity in what has to be said and a strong sense of common purpose within the Executive will count for a lot.

The nine priorities which are outlined in the Programme for Government address many pressing needs. Ultimately, building hundreds of social housing units, addressing the pollution crisis literally at the heart of our Province in Lough Neagh, addressing poverty, childcare provision, violence against women and girls, and tackling the crisis within policing will all require significant financial resources. Perhaps understandably, there is a lack of detail under the nine priorities, reflecting the wider uncertainty around where the money will come from. No doubt greater clarity and depth will arise when the consultation is completed and the results analysed.

In the meantime all those involved in Government and indeed in Opposition can be assured of the prayers of many people as they carry out their vocation of public service.

Former minister who defrauded his church and widow is jailed - Belfast Telegraph

Six months behind bars for man who regarded parish as 'personal fiefdom", Ashleigh McDonald reports.

A former minister who defrauded his church of \pounds 10,000 and a grieving parishioner of \pounds 1,000 has been jailed.

Judge Patrick Lynch KC told Adrian Robert McLaughlin that he abused the trust of his congregation and regarded the parish "as if it was a personal fiefdom".

The 50-year-old father-of-two, from Church Avenue in Dunmurry, was convicted of defrauding £10,000 from St Colman's Parish Church in Dunmurry on a date between October 15 and November 30, 2016.

In June, a jury at Craigavon Crown Court also found him guilty of defrauding a parishioner, who had just lost her husband, of £1,000 between September 24 and October 31, 2016.

McLaughlin, who continues to maintain his innocence, was back in court yesterday where he was handed a 12-month sentence, which was divided equally between prison and licence.

Before imposing the term, Judge Lynch, who was sitting in Belfast Crown Court, outlined that McLaughlin had been the minister of St Colman's Church of Ireland since 2014.

In January 2016, a fire at the church caused extensive damage and a fund was set up to help with restoration costs.

Over the period from August to November 2016, the church didn't have a treasurer and cheques issued from its accounts required two signatures — one of which was McLaughlin's and the other from a nominated individual.

On October 16, 2016, McLaughlin approached the nominated individual and asked him to co-sign a cheque for £10,000, which he said was to purchase a replacement organ.

Then, in November 2016, a member of the congregation took up the position of treasurer.

When she examined the church's books, she observed that the cheque stub for the £10,000 transaction bore the name 'Northern Ireland Organs Limited'.

It later emerged that McLaughlin had made the cheque out to himself.

Regarding the £1,000 fraud, Judge Lynch said this was handed to McLaughlin by a parishioner whose husband had just passed away.

She made the donation on the understanding that the money would be used to purchase memorial items in honour of her husband, which were to be positioned in the church.

On this occasion, McLaughlin requested that the payee line be left blank. Instead of purchasing the memorial item, McLaughlin filled in his own name and pocketed the £1,000.

Despite the offences being committed in 2016, they were not detected until 2018, with McLaughlin interviewed by the PSNI in 2020.

Following what Judge Lynch described as an "acrimonious split" from his wife, McLaughlin is now the sole carer of their two teenage children.

During his trial, McLaughlin claimed the allegations of fraud against him were false and were mounted by his ex-wife and a "cabal" of parishioners who had taken her side when the marriage broke down.

These claims were rejected by the jury, who found him guilty on two charges of fraud by abuse of position.

Judge Lynch also spoke of "the degree of trust" that was placed in McLaughlin in his position as a minister and the affect McLaughlin's offending had on the congregation — in particular the widow he defrauded and the nominated individual who co-signed the cheque for £10,000. Church News Ireland Page 21 The judge said he had read victim impact statements made by both parishioners.

The widow opened up on her "upset" at being lied to by McLaughlin, who she said was "someone my late husband and I trusted".

The judge commented: "The sense of hurt and disappointment oozed from every sentence of her statement."

The parishioner who co-signed the £10,000 cheque said the allegations of fraud and McLaughlin's actions resulted in him and his family leaving St Colman's Church in November 2019.

He added: "After a lifetime of belonging to the community of St Colman's, this is a huge wrench for all of us, and it's still sometimes difficult for me to believe this has happened."

Judge Lynch said he had taken into consideration defence submissions made by Richard McConkey KC.

These included the delay in bringing the case to court, the impact and hardship a prison sentence would have on McLaughlin's two children, and his previous good character.

Judge Lynch said it was "frequently and unfortunately the case" that relatives of criminals "suffer as much, or even more" as the offender, but that this "has to be balanced against the harm done".

Saying McLaughlin was "in a position where a high degree of trust was reposed in him", the judge noted that he was "cavalier with that trust" and "almost regarded the parish as if it was a personal fiefdom".

The 12-month sentence was then imposed and, as McLaughlin's two children sat in the public gallery, he was placed in handcuffs and led into custody by prison staff.
