


They were received from Killaloe Diocese and the Parish of






Silvermines gave a big welcomed for their handover.

Rugby champions Saints go marching in to church


Defending Gallagher Premiership champions Northampton Saints started their pre-season with a trip to the church where the club was first formed, their director of rugby has revealed.

Phil Dowson, who helped guide the Saints to their first championship in ten years last season, told The Times that he took the squad to St. James' church on the first day of pre-season. The club was founded in the church by Reverend Samuel Wathan Wigg in 1880 as an improvement class for local 'high-spirited' boys. It soon developed into the rugby club that plays within a stone's throw of the building.

"We took the Premiership trophy there and had our first meeting there," Dowson said. "It was just for a change of scenery and for the new players to understand some of the history."

Several Saints players have been brought into the team for this year's title defence, whilst longtime club servant and former captain Courtney Lawes has left the club after 17 years.

Lawes garnered attention from Christian quarters in 2020,



when he spoke out urging people to marry before having children. His departure creates opportunities for leadership from other key players, including Alex Coles, who has previously spoken about how his Christian upbringing influences his life.

Northampton Saints begin this season's campaign on Friday 20th September against Bath - whom they beat in last year's final.

From his own experiences Jesus can empathise with victims of abuse - Major Derry conference told

The distinguished theologian and author, Rev Dr Helen Paynter (Photo above), has challenged the way some perpetrators of domestic abuse and gender-based violence invoke scripture to defend or justify their behaviour.

Dr Paynter, who's a tutor in Biblical Studies and Director of Bristol Baptist College's Centre for the Study of Bible and Violence, was in the Northwest at Bishop Andrew Forster's invitation to address Mothers' Union members, clergy and members of other Christian denominations. Her visit was



facilitated by Derry and Raphoe MU who for the last 10 years have been vocal in confronting domestic abuse.

The biblical scholar addressed three separate events in just over 24 hours, beginning with a presentation to Derry and Raphoe clergy in the Diocesan Centre on Friday morning. On Friday evening she addressed a mostly female audience in First Derry Presbyterian Church, just yards from the house where a Spanish woman had been murdered a fortnight earlier. And on Saturday morning she spoke to MU members and clergy in Glendermott Parish Hall. The stage in Glendermott had been adorned with 22 sunflowers signifying the number of women in Northern Ireland who had lost their lives to domestic abuse or gender-based violence since 2020.



In all three revealing – and sometimes uncompromising – presentations, the renowned academic denounced the way abusers distorted and misrepresented the Bible to justify their crimes. Dr Paynter said anyone who invoked the Word of God to defend their abusive behaviour was guilty of lying.

During her talks, the Baptist minister revealed how, in 2019-20, around one in 20 adults in the UK had experienced domestic abuse. Out of prosecuted cases, she said, 92% of offenders were male and 83% of victims female. Dr Paynter outlined how abuse normally manifested itself: physical abuse, sexual abuse, financial abuse, emotional abuse (including gaslighting), coercive control and spiritual abuse.

She told her audiences that through his incarnation, Jesus had also been subjected to abuse and was able to empathise with victims. Dr Paynter said the knowledge that




Jesus was innocent had allowed some victims to recognise that they weren't to blame for what had happened to them. The audience in Glendermott included volunteers from Foyle Women's Aid. After the third and final session, a presentation was made to Mrs Kay Clarke, MU's Faith and Policy Unit Coordinator who was revealed at the event as the incoming Provincial President of Mothers' Union (Photo above).


