

New Internship Programme introduced for Dublin and Glendalough Youth Council

Dublin and Glendalough Youth Council celebrated its 10th birthday on Saturday evening (September 21) with news of an exciting new initiative. DGYC has launched a new internship programme for 18–25 year olds and applications for the 2025 programme open next month.

The 10 month internship programme is geared to help young adults develop their skill sets and leadership capabilities through serving in church youth ministry around Dublin and Glendalough.

Speaking at the launch in Christ Church Cathedral, DGYC's Youth Ministry Development Officer Emma Fawcett had a

message for potential interns and the young people of thedioceses. "This internship is about investing in you and training you. We want to help you grow as a person, to deepen your faith in God and to leave with some brilliant experiences and great life skills," she stated.

Interns will be matched to a local church where they will help run and develop youth ministry. They will also be part of the DGYC team at regional and national youth events and will get to work alongside other Christian youth organisations around the country. There will be opportunities to go on retreats and attend Christian events. "We want young people to know that God cares for them, and that their lives can be better with Him at the centre. Recent C of I central committee decisions

The Standing Committee of the General Synod also met on Tuesday, 17th September, in Church of Ireland House, Dublin.


The Standing Committee approved the proposals of the Budget Sub Committee and recommended them for consideration by the Allocations Committee of the Representative Body.

September 25, 2024

As recommended by the Representative Body, the Standing Committee set the rates of **Minimum Approved Stipends** as follows with effect from 1st January 2025:

£37,310 per annum in Northern Ireland; and €45,640 per annum in the Republic of Ireland.

The increases in the Minimum Approved Stipend rates for 2025 are reflective of the Consumer Price Indices in the respective jurisdictions for the year ended 30th June 2024.



As recommended by the Executive Committee of the Representative Body and the Church of Ireland Clergy Pensions

£33,390 per annum in Northern Ireland; and €42,247 per annum in the Republic of Ireland.

In addition, as also recommended by the Executive Committee and the Trustee, the Standing Committee set the rate of levy to be paid by each diocese towards the cost of securing the solvency of the Clergy Pensions Fund from 1st January 2025, at the unchanged percentage rate of 3% of the Minimum Approved Stipend in force on that date.

The Standing Committee approved amendments to the Clergy Permanent Health Insurance (PHI) Policy and Guidelines, also approved by the Representative Body at its meeting on the same day.

The Standing Committee approved that the **General Synod** of 2026 will take place in the Slieve Donard Hotel, Newcastle, from Thursday, 7th May, to Saturday, 9th May.

A paper was presented on behalf of the Honorary Secretaries detailing a proposal for the introduction of an electronic voting system for in—person meetings of the General Synod to replace the voting card/teller system. This will be followed by a demonstration of the proposed system and an opportunity for the members of the Standing Committee to provide feedback.

- Mrs June Butler, Mr Stephen Trew, Dr Simon Woodworth, and the Revd Canon Gillian Wharton to serve on a working group to consider the motion passed at General Synod 2024 on how to articulate more effectively the voice of the Church on subjects relating to global conflicts;
- Ms Rachel Fraser to the Advisory Council to the Church of Ireland Centre at Dublin City University, in her capacity as a school principal;

- the Revd Rob Jones to the Commission on Ministry, representing the Standing Committee;
- Bishop Pat Storey (as Chair), the Revd Carlton Baxter, the Revd Canon Gillian Wharton, Canon Dr Kenneth Milne, Dr Raymond Refaussé, Mr David Ritchie, Mrs Janet Maxwell, Dean Nigel Dunne, and the Revd Alan Rufli to the Central Communications Board (with the Press Officer and the Dublin and Glendalough Communications Officer in attendance);
- Canon Dr Kenneth Milne (as Chair), the Revd Canon Peter McDowell, Dr Raymond Refaussé (as Secretary), the Revd Canon Ricky Rountree, Fr Bernard Treacy OP, Ms Cecelia West, and Mr George Woodman to the Literature Committee (a sub-committee of the Central Communications Board).

Youth workers and volunteer youth leaders are strongly encouraged to apply for the Church of Ireland Youth Department (CIYD) bursary fund – Next Steps – to boost their skills and bring out their potential.

The closing date for the current round is Saturday, 30th November 2024.

Next Steps has been set up – with the support of the Priorities Fund – to significantly encourage the number of people who lead our young people to undertake third level

professional qualifications and development within the wider youth ministry sector, the impact of which would benefit ministry in the Church of Ireland.

Qualifications can include undergraduate and postgraduate courses in relation to youth ministry, which might otherwise have been financially challenging. This is an Ireland—wide project with the hope that it will support many young people and young adults with a significant impact in ministry.

"CIYD's Next Steps programme has had a number of very grateful recipients thus far and we would love to see more – this is why the fund exists," National Youth Officer Simon Henry says.

"Vocational training and development in youth ministry is so essential and its impact on the Church can last for generations to come.

"Could this Next Steps programme benefit you or someone you know? We would love to see more and more people undertake professional qualifications and development in youth ministry and this support available could encourage those who otherwise would feel challenged in the current financial climate."

Royal Irish Regiment beat Retreat in St. Peter's Piazza at the Vatican recalling 1944 visit to the Pope





On 12 June 1944, the Massed Drums and Pipes of the 38th (Irish) Brigade performed a Beat Retreat in St. Peter's Piazza at the Vatican, following an invitation from Pope Pius XII.

Eighty years later, on 12 June 2024, the UK Embassy marked the anniversary of the Liberation of Rome with a special commemoration.

As part of the event, The Bugles, Pipes, and Drums (BP&D) of The Royal Irish Regiment recreated this historic occasion by performing during the General Audience with Pope Francis.

As they navigated through the crowd, the BP&D played Regimental tunes, including "Killaloe."

Following the General Audience, they were invited for a photograph with Pope Francis.

Chris Trott, the UK Ambassador to The Holy See, expressed how moved he was when the initial plan changed unexpectedly; Pope Francis asked them to play for him once more.

Trott noted that this was "unexpected and The Pope's own initiative," possibly inspired by The Colonel of The Regiment, Major General Colin Weir CB DSO MBE, presenting the Pope with a pipe banner featuring the



Regiment's crest on one side and the Papal Coat of Arms on the other.

Major General Weir described the event as "a tremendous privilege and one of the most moving and profound experiences" of his 32-year military career.

Pipe Major William Mitchell echoed the sentiment, describing it as a "hair-raising moment" to be part of the Bugles, Pipes, and Drums marching through St. Peter's Square, as our forebears did in 1944.
