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Bishops encourage prayer across Ireland for Synod on Synodality in Rome

The Standing Committee of the Irish Bishops'
Conference met this week in Columba Centre of Saint
Patrick's College, Maynooth.

The main item for discussion was the forthcoming universal Synod on Synodality, which will take place from 4 - 29 October in Rome, on the theme: 'For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation, Mission'.

Bishops reflected that, "The Synodal Process is about conversion, and we pray that all participants will be open in mind and heart to what the Holy Spirit wants of each individually, and collectively.

"In light of Pope Francis' comment that 'without prayer there will be no Synod', we encourage people of faith to unceasingly pray to God over the coming weeks at daily and weekend Masses, at home, and in religious communities, to intercede for Pope Francis and for all members of the Synodal Assembly."

Prayer texts have been made available to parishes as well as to the Association of Leaders of Missionaries and Religious of Ireland for the benefit of its members. Bishop Brendan Leahy of Limerick, and Bishop Alan McGuckian SJ of Raphoe, will represent the Irish Church at this global assembly.

In October 2021 Pope Francis convened the whole Church in Synod. Since that time there have been gatherings of the faithful at parish, national and continental levels. Following next month's universal gathering in Rome for the Synod on Synodality, a second universal gathering of this Synod will also take place during October 2024.

The aim of the Synodal Process is to provide an opportunity for the entire People of God to discern together how to move forward towards being a more synodal Church in the long-term.

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Church of Ireland launches humanitarian appeal for Libya

The Church of Ireland has launched a disaster appeal to its parishes in response to the catastrophic flooding in Libya, with an initial £10,000 donation sent from its central Bishops' Appeal funds, Billy Kennedy writes in the News Letter.

The Libyan floods, which were caused by an enormous Mediterranean storm, focused on the city of Derna where almost 4,000 people are known to have died and an estimated 9,000 are missing after huge torrents of rain and debris swept away entire districts.

Some 37,000 people in flood-affected areas have been displaced by the storm. This number highlights the immediate humanitarian crisis for survivors now facing needs of clean water, food, shelter, utensils and clothing, and into the coming months and years – rebuilding, reuniting, and acquiring safe shelter.

The Church of Ireland Bishops' Appeal will channel all funds through Christian Aid, whose officials are working with Dan Church Aid (DCA), its ACT Alliance partner, who have had an established presence in Libya since 2011.

This charity provides a confidence that those on the ground have a clear understanding of the situation and how money raised in Church of Ireland parishes can be used most effectively. "We are grateful for the confidence that this gives

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us that all money raised will be used to benefit those in greatest need," said a church spokesman..

Libya has a very complex political process, with power struggles leading to two opposing governments in the country and this has compounded the challenge of getting aid and support into the country.

DCA is providing medical support, helping to establish shelters to host homeless families, and distributing basic



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items such as blankets and bedding, sanitation and hygiene items and other essentials to these people who have lost everything.

Church of Ireland primate Archbishop John McDowell, calling on his parishes to support the appeal, said: "I thank those involved in Bishops' Appeal for their prompt reaction in making this provision and I would encourage the members of the church in Ireland to continue to give generously."

Dublin archbishop Dr Michael Jackson added: "The plight of children, women and men in Libya is unthinkable. It is also a reality. and members of the Church of Ireland working through Bishops' Appeal have always been generous in responding to devastation and need. I encourage all to pray for and contribute to this appeal."

Parishes across the 11 Church of Ireland dioceses, north and south, are asked to collect funds for the appeal for the next few weeks, and send all donations directly to Bishops' Appeal, Church of Ireland House, Rathmines, Dublin 6, D07 CF67.

Church of ireland Bishops' Appeal is registered as a charity in Northern Ireland and in the Irish Republic.

Tributes to Canon McKegney included the following from Rev Dr Bert Tosh former head of religious broadcasting at BBC N Ireland - "Having known John for 60+ years, since Foyle College days, I am extremely sorry to hear this. I produced a number of Broadcast services with him from Armagh and always enjoyed his company and crack. He

was properly proud of his family and may God give you comfort and support at this time".

Canon McKegney was a former president of the Railway Preservation Society of Ireland.

One friend, **David Walsh**, posting in Irish Railways Present and Past and other Interesting Railways, wrote: "John was many things to many people. To many of us he was very much committed both to the betterment of current public transport and celebrating its past, including that of his former employer, Londonderry and Lough Swilly Railway, where he worked as a bus conductor.

"He was a committed and respected clergyman in the Church of Ireland, with whom he served faithfully in many parishes in Northern Ireland and as a Synodsman.

"He was also a community man, who was approachable and a firm friend to many, and never afraid to help, support and say his bit.

"Lastly, he was a friend to many and forever spoke with a smile on his face.

"To Patrick, Ruth and Karen, and to his many colleagues and friends, we send our thoughts and prayers at this time."

Downpatrick and County Down Railways described him as "a true friend of railways and railway preservation across Ireland".

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In a social media post, the organisation stated: "John latterly served as the chairman of the Railway Preservation Society of Ireland, leading the organisation through some very difficult times during the pandemic.

"Prior to this he had volunteered in various capacities, from making use of his own trademark white beard in a special December role to being the most professional guest presenter in the Belfast winter meetings, due to his infectious enthusiasm and his lifetime of practice at public speaking and keeping people awake from the pulpit!

"John was especially knowledgeable about the Armagh Disaster and appeared many times on television talking about it down the years. He was also not averse to diesel trains, even being spotted at a Downpatrick diesel gala on at least one occasion, and was very fond of the 80 class, and delighted that we managed to preserve two of them.

"Generous with his time, his spirit, and in sharing his collection of photographs from the old days of railways and his native Derry, John was widely respected across all heritage railway organisations in Ireland and beyond. He will be sadly missed by everyone, he was one of life's true gentlemen."

Barbados attacks Church's £7m slavery reparation offer from USPG

Daily Telegraph - A Church of England charity has offered £7 million in slavery reparations, prompting Barbados to criticise the "unilateral" decision of how much compensation should be paid.

Earlier this month, the United Society Partners in the Gospel (USPG) committed £7 million as a "reparations project" for its ownership of the Codrington Estate, once the site of one of the largest Barbados sugar plantations.

The Anglican mission agency, then known as the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, profited from slave labour on the Codrington Estate between 1710 and 1838, while operating as the Church of England's primary mission agency in North and Central America.

The announcement of the £7 million fund to be spent in Barbados over the next 10 to 15 years was hailed by the USPG as making amends for "its disgraceful links to the slave trade".

However, representatives from the Barbadian government's national task force on reparations have criticised the payments on the grounds that the USPG did not negotiate with them.

The move comes after The Telegraph revealed earlier this month that Caribbean nations are to formally demand slavery reparations from the Royal family, Lloyds of London and the Church of England for their role in the slave trade and plantation system.

David Comissiong, deputy chairman of the national task force on reparations, said: "We need to point out to the Church of England and all similar institutions that reparations are not about them unilaterally determining what compensation they are prepared to make."

Trevor Prescod, a Barbados MP, said: "The Church believes that it can do whatever it wants to do, without any respect to the agencies that the government has set up."

Duncan Dormor, the general secretary of USPG, said: "USPG is deeply ashamed of our past links to slavery. We recognise that it is not simply enough to repent in thought and word, but we must take action, action, working in partnership with Codrington where the descendants of enslaved persons are still deeply impacted by the generational trauma that came from the Codrington plantations."

A spokesman for the USPG said: "The project has been developed in close partnership with the Codrington Trust in Barbados, who own and manage the estates. Indeed, the programme proposals have come entirely from the Codrington Trust."

University ranked 814th forced to drop 'world-leading' claim

Daily Telegraph - Ulster University will replace advertisements describing it as "world-leading" after complaints saying it was misleading were made to the Advertising Standards Authority (ASA), James Crisp reports.

The posters, aimed at attracting new students, said "You are only 10 minutes away from a world-leading university", and were put up on approach routes to it in Coleraine, Northern Ireland.

One complaint to the regulator accused the university of "blatantly misleading" the public and "plainly false advertising" because it does not lead lists of the world's top universities.

Ulster is listed in the 600-801 bracket in the Times Higher Education World University ranking, which rates Queen's University Belfast joint 198th and Oxford first.

The US News puts Ulster University in 814th place in its global ranking, while The Times rates it as the 40th best in the UK.

The Belfast Telegraph reported that a former member of the university's staff made a complaint to the advertising regulator about the posters. "The posters first went up at least two months ago, possibly earlier," he told the newspaper. "I did contact Ulster University about them, but was literally laughed at down the phone," he said.

"This does strike me as massively misleading and a naked attempt to deceive. And in agreeing to replace the advertising, the university has effectively admitted to this."

The ASA said: "We spoke with Ulster University, and they provided assurance that they would amend the advert to make the claim clear and that they wouldn't exaggerate the evidence. As such, we considered the matter closed."

Ulster University is the largest university in Northern Ireland. A spokesman said: "There has not been any formal investigation nor sanction from the ASA... The university is, however, in the process of replacing this ad. The 'world-leading' reference in this ad was based on a number of factors and rankings, and particularly the Research Excellence Framework 2021 rating.


