

NIO minister Fleur Anderson praises community resilience after visiting arson attack Church

The Northern Ireland Office minister Fleur Anderson has visited the Church of the Holy Name in Greenisland to show solidarity following a recent arson attack.

The Church provides an integral service to local people through a community shop and a range of activities that involve all ages as well as offering a place for parishioners to gather.



It was badly damaged in a fire on September 1.

Minister Anderson, who is Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State at the NIO, spoke with the Rev Dr Isobel Hawthorne-Steele, Minister of the Church about the attack and viewed the scale of the destruction.

She also heard about the experiences of the community in the aftermath of the attack.

Minister Anderson said: "The discussions I had with Rev Dr Hawthorne-Steele were very constructive.

"It was sad to see the scale of the destruction to a place that is a beacon of hope for many in the community.

"It was encouraging to hear the positive support shown by local churches in Greenisland, the understanding shown to

the families of the young boys involved and the plans for the future rebuilding.

"I stand in solidarity with this entire community and I commend their resilience and forgiveness.

"I must also commend the quick response of the Northern Ireland Fire Service, and the Police Service of Northern Ireland, for their valiant efforts in tackling the blaze."

The Rev Dr Hawthorne-Steele said:

"Having met with the minister it was encouraging to learn that she is a fellow community practitioner with extensive experience in building community cohesion and promoting transformative grassroots initiatives.

"Having spent considerable time chatting and seeing first hand the devastation caused by the fire to our parish centre and church, the minister captured the full impact of the farreaching consequences on our church and the wider community that this disaster has caused.

"As a church, we greatly appreciate the fact that the minister acknowledged the efforts we are making to grow resilience in partnership with multi-faceted groups and organisations that work within this local area as we rebuild and renew our faith by revealing God's grace."

Meath synod hears of challenges facing church internationally and at home

Synod was chaired by Archdeacon Leslie Stevenson, as Bishop Pat Storey was unable to be present due to health reasons.

She asked that her love and good wishes be expressed to the synod.

The Diocesan Secretary, Ms Karen Seaman, was also unable to attend having contracted covid.

The Oak Centre in Dunboyne was the venue for Meath 2024 Diocesan Synod, held on Saturday 28 September. Prior to Synod beginning its business members joined together for a Service of Holy Communion at 10.30am, also held in The Oak Centre.

Presidential Address

During his Presidential Address, Archdeacon Stevenson reminded synod members of the challenges being faced internationally. Thinking particularly of the vulnerability of children in the midst of armed conflict taking place in various places across the world, he said they "remind us of the senselessness of war. And when we consume the news there is that sinking feeling of helplessness and anxiety about the direction in which humans are taking the world." Added to this was "apprehension over climate change."

Thinking more locally he mentioned "Challenges about the future of parish life" and those challenges "facing us here in Ireland".

These reflections led the archdeacon to pose the question, "What can we do?" As the way forward he highlighting the importance of hope"

He said, "Christian hope – what does that look like? It springs from our faith. Christian hope goes beyond secular hope that we hear in speeches given by politicians. God

makes promises for the future. Promises grounded in the resurrection of Jesus and the indestructible hope of eternal life. The promise of resurrection and renewal gives meaning to all our experience. It is the salvation of our soul, but it is also about the transforming of this world."

Thinking of how this hope can take shape for us Archdeacon Stevenson talked of how "An occasion like a diocesan synod not only gives us a chance to come together but it is also when we express our thanks in a public way."

He highlighted the encouragements of:

"What the diocese did last year in transforming people's lives. You find it on page 18 of the report, where almost €120,000 was donated to give hope to others."

Continuing to keep worship alive during vacancies.

The work of "ordinands, parish readers, diocesan readers, non-stipendiaries, OLM's and retired clergy for all that they do, especially on Sundays."

"To fellow clergy, thank you for taking on extra responsibilities. It is a blessing that the clergy work happily together in this diocese. That has been the case throughout my time in the diocese. I know bishop Pat would concur with these thanks."

In his speech Archdeacon Stevenson then talked of colleagues who have or are going to move on, describing how they "have all made their contribution not only to their


parishes but diocesan life as well. They have all been great colleagues." These include:

Dean Paul Bogle, who is retiring at the end of October. We wish him and Jane well in retirement.

The Revd Canon Alastair Graham has recently retired and again we wish him and Olive well for the future.

Fran Gresham who has moved back to England.

Luke Hawkins the diocesan youth officer, who is Southern Officer for the Church of Ireland Youth Department and also training for the stipendiary ministry. Drawing to a close the Archdeacon thanked "our part-time diocesan secretary, Karen Seaman. She carries quite a workload that would normally merit a full-time position."



He concluded by thanking Bishop Pat, saying, "Faith leadership is not an easy task in today's western society. The days in parish and diocesan life where a bishop can wave a crozier and all problems are solved have long gone, if they were ever there. 

Voice and Verse launch on National Poetry Day – Westminster Abbey

Westminster Abbey will launch a new season, Voice and Verse on National Poetry Day next month celebrating poets and poetry with a series of special events.

Voice and Verse, launches on Thursday 3rd October, National Poetry Day and includes special talks, tours, family events, and musical performances.

Highlights include poetry readings in the iconic Poets'
Corner, an online talk Across the Pond with the Very
Reverend Dr David Hoyle, Dean of Westminster Abbey and

Canon Hawkey in conversation with speakers from St John the Divine Cathedral in New York as they reflect on the significance and impact of a Poets' Corner within a place of worship.

There are talks on the lives of Women Poets, First World War poets, musical recitals based on texts by poets, a poetry workshop that takes inspiration from the emotions



stirred by Westminster Abbey's memorials and monuments and a bookbinding workshop too.

Among other events will be Voice and Verse tours on selected Saturdays, pop up talks in Poets' Corner, and activities for families.

Throughout the season there will be sermons and music reflecting the lives and works of poets remembered in the Abbey during Sunday services.



Although a very different place from what it was back in 1774, the first headmaster and his scholars would no doubt find some things familiar at Friends' School.



Archbishop of New York warns Harris of presidential loss after Catholic dinner snub

The archbishop of New York has warned Kamala Harris of losing the presidential election, after she did not turn up to the Al Smith dinner, which benefits Catholic charities, Anna Rees writes

Cardinal Timothy Dolan said he was "disappointed" not to host the vice president at the event, which typically sees light-hearted humour between two presidential candidates.

Donald Trump appeared at the event in 2016 and 2020, and Hilary Clinton and Joe Biden both attended during their election campaigns, albeit Biden's attendance was remote due to Covid.

Cardinal Dolan said: "We were looking forward to giving the vice president an enthusiastic welcome, and we were confident that she would find this – you know, she speaks

very much about high ideals and how it's good to get away from division and come together in unity and all.

"We're not used to this. We don't know how to handle it," he said, warning: "This hasn't happened in 40 years, since Walter Mondale turned down the invitation. And remember, he lost 49 out of 50 states. I don't want to say there's a direct connection there, but ... we're not giving up."

Harris' absence is due to her team wanting her to focus on the battleground states, rather than New York, which already sees a strong pro-Democrat vote.

Trump confirmed is attendance via his website Truth Social – although his 2016 reception was met with boos from attendees.

On his post, Trump claimed Harris "certainly hasn't been very nice" to Catholics.

Cardinal Dolan himself has spoken against the democrats, writing in the Wall Street Journal that the democrats had "abandoned" Catholics.

A Harris representative told the Mail that the group Catholics for Harris-Walz will be appealing to US Catholics in the coming week.
